Jan 9<sup>th</sup>

My dear Maucia

I thank awfully for anything,  
you like to send me for the  
little article; I have got some  
calico (they don't know what  
longcloth is in Orlando) to make  
it a few nightgowns and I have  
written to two places in New York  
for patters of flannel & linen,  
I have been promised some baby  
clothes patters to copy from, as  
I have say I shall get on alright.

I should think a flannel roller  
a shirt & a nightgown ought to  
do for it for a month (I mean enough  
of them of course to be clean on  
every day) for it will be pretty  
hot even in April. We borrowed a  
buggy last Sunday and drove  
to Altamonte, we got alright to  
Deland but they have made  
new roads from there to Altamonte  
and as it was pitch dark, and  
we had no light we lost the way,  
and never arrived until eight  
o'clock instead of six, altogether  
we drove nearly fifty miles with  
only an hour & a quarters rest for

the mare, half way there, she was  
as right as anything next morning  
too; we stayed three nights with  
the Daniels, Herbert seems very  
well and happy, and came to  
Orlando with us on Wed. and  
stayed with us until we started  
back on Thursday morning; I saw  
the doctor there (Mullins of course)  
and he has promised <sup>me</sup> a very good  
nurse in April (a black woman).  
There is an awfully cold wind  
out today and strong enough to  
blow the house away nearly, everybody  
except myself is awfully cold,  
I never feel the cold, I can't  
even wear a flannel petticoat

regularly. Please give my love  
to all the others, I suppose they are  
all pretty cheerful just now. How  
is Lichy this winter, the cold  
never does him much good -
