June 10<sup>th</sup>

My dear Mauc

I got your letter telling me what to do with the little one, you can't think how glad I am to be told anything about looking after it, luckily all the children that are in Narcossee seem very strong and healthy and the foreman's wife (M<sup>rs</sup> Leach) has several very nice ones, and she is English and altogether a very sensible sort of woman, who I know would always help me if necessary; M<sup>rs</sup> Fell is as ignorant as myself about babies although she is very nice & kind, so if ever you think of anything I ought to do, mind you write & tell

me. I have been feeling pretty cheap for the last week, so I really hope it means to come this time, the full time as near as I can tell is up next Saturday, so I hope a few days after you get this you will hear of its arrival; I am just longing to have it to dress and carry round and show it to everybody, I wish you could all see it directly it arrives. The steam-boat is doing very well I am glad to say, and the boys were not very well the end of last week, but they quite well again now. Bill has had a bath-room added to our house since I left and a large bath put in it, a big bath is quite a luxury out here, the

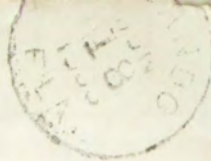
Americans don't know how

river yet, and has Rose found  
a house to suit her. Where is  
Phyllis, does she stay away

keep flannel next its skin,  
I always wear merino myself.
