with another fellow mostly help.
Herbert has got a job for a week or
so now, about a dollar a day,
after that I don't know what he
will do, his clothes are getting
very much worn, his socks all

worn to threads, long past mending
and I know he has no money
to buy more, I don't know what
he will do in a month or so,
we help him all we can, but that
is not a great deal, as you know,
he works hard and does not
grumble nearly so much as he

to get your letter telling me
what to do, she is getting so
interesting coos away by the hour,
everybody makes such a fuss

spends most of her time in the

heat very badly all last summer
and again this, Victor will tell
you what it is like; people have
it in India I believe; I have got
it and I certainly would prefer
measles. Don't think I have got
the blues, but you seemed to
want to know how Herbert really
stood and I have told you. I have
not heard from Tom for ages, but
I know he hates writing. We had
an earthquake here Aug 3, it
it shook the house for nearly
three minutes; it was horrid.
