## Tar Baseball Team Defeats Florida Gators in Ninth

Daugherty Pitches Entire Game, Backed Up By Good Fielding of Teammates

Rollins College defeated the University of Florida 4-5 in the opening game of their two-game home stand Tuesday, April 8, at Harpo, Sheppard Field, coming up with two sparkling plays in the ninth to squish a final Florida burst.

Bill Daugherty, sensational Tar right-hander, who went the route against the Gators, and First Baseman June Lingerfelt turned in slick fielding plays in succession, after Bobby Johnson had opened the ninth with a single to thwart the Florida uprising.

Daugherty's diving catch of Moore's punt, intended to sacrifice Johnson to second and into scoring position, and Lingerfelt's one-handed stab of a bouncer towards first that was good enough to double Johnson at second for the second out, put a quiblet on Florida's final scored effort.

The slappy fielding in the ninth by Jack McDowell's Tar nine effect their slip-shod work in the sixth, when Florida scored four runs off one hit, one error, two misplays and two walks. Only one of the four runs were scored as earned runs.

Rollins started off its ruminating in the second, when Bobby Byson parked a triple over center fielder Rick's head with Boston on base; Byson scored on an infield out by Daugherty, the next batter to face John Clevers.

The Tar added one more run in the third and put on a final three-run scoring burst in the fifth, when they needed three hits, two of them scruffy hits, with one walk to push the runs across the plate.

Daugherty, through seven innings, had eluded his way along with a steady three-hit brand of ball. He was reached for two hits in both the eighth and the ninth.

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## Rollins Co-eds Win League Championship

Basketball Team Defeats Parcell in Close Game

The Rollins College women's basketball squad captured the Orlando League Championship last Thursday evening at the armory from the Parcell Independents in a thrilling season's battle ending in a score of 33-31. It was the most closely contested fray of the league season.

Parcell set a terrific pace during the first quarter rolling up 12 points to Rollins' 2, both of which were scored on free throws. In the second quarter, the Tarlet defense tightened to hold their opponents to 14 tallies; while the offensive rejuvenated by close-in passing to break through the zone guarding, and greater accuracy in shots yielded 19 points to threaten Parcell's lead of 20 to 21 at the halfway whistle.

From the middle of the third quarter when the score was tied up at 33, the seasawing in leadership continued to the very last minute of play. The third canto was featured by the fouling out of two of Parcell's guards which left them with only free players. In good spirit Aris Ekmanski removed one of the Rollins guards and kept her out until the last few minutes of the game. The period ended with the score tied at 41.

At the start of the fourth quarter the blue and gold co-eds sprang to a two goal lead. It soon evaporated as the Parcell team crept back to a one point edge within a minute of the final gong. Two field goals and a free throw turned the tally in the Tarlets favor as their guard returned to the floor and Parcell was able to sink only one more bucket.

Stoddard, Jensen, Johnson, and G. Young played splendidly at grand positions. While Parcell had three players expelled from the game on fouls, Sis Young was the only Rollins victor of the rules when she fouled out during the first half. Sally McDaniel led in discharging the forward duties tallying 21 points; and she was aided by Hogan, Hagill, and Sturgis.

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## Recital of Modern Dance is Presented in Theatre Today

Deedee Hoenig Gives Three Solos at Annie Russell in Experimental Program

A recital of modern dances, featuring Deedee Hoenig, will be presented at 4 o'clock today in the Annie Russell Theatre by the Women's Physical Education Department. The recital, with both solo and class dancing, will be informal, entirely in the nature of a laboratory experiment.

Deedee will open the program with an explanatory discussion of the aims and history of modern dancing and how these principles are applied to work in class to aid in the development of poise, grace, and health. There will be demonstrations of body building and co-ordination exercises by Deedee and the other girls in the class.

The girls will wear their gym costumes, and every effort will be made to have the recital typical of a regular class.

First will come a group number entitled "Song of the Bayou." Following that will come three solos by Deedee, of varied style, covering a wide range of material. The accompaniment will be special musical recordings. The first will be "Gymnopedie," a modern adaptation of the ancient Greek Terpse Dance at Delphi, a religious dance carrying through the theme and ideas of the original. Next will be "Elegance," something resembling a gypsy waltz. Third will be a modern Bohemian Rhapsody in the style of "Night Must Fall." This will probably be the most popular number on the program, as all the college students who have seen Deedee dance will realize.

The program will follow the system of Miss Bern Milford Strasse, leading American modern dance exponent, under whom Deedee has studied. The whole program, open to the public, should be most instructive to all those who have any interest whatsoever in modern dancing.

Artists Asked to Submit Work For Strong Hall Exhibition

## Music Society is Offering \$720 as Prize in Contest

Musical Play, Revue, Opera Are All Accepted Media For Award Competition

Professor S. Stephenson Smith, educational counselor for the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, spoke to a completed group of seventy-five drama, music and general college students Monday in the Laboratory Theatre at Rollins College. Urging a stimulation of interest in a new field of playwriting, that of the "musical play," Professor Smith announced the establishment of the Asap Polytechnic Competition.

According to his announcement, competition for the prize of \$720 for the winning "musical play" is open to any one in this region. Students intending to compete may consider an original musical play, musical comedy, opera, light opera, operetta or musical revue.

The country has been divided into eight regions for this contest, one of which the \$720 prize will be awarded annually. Students intending to compete are required to file advance notice with their faculty, giving details of their proposed work. To qualify for consideration the work must reach a legitimate production before an audience of at least 200. The deadline is May 1st.

Urging competitors to be original, Mr. Smith pointed to the wealth of America's traditions and native lore as possible sources of comedy and tragedy, and counseled through research to make credible characters. The element of practicality is stressed with a view to ultimate commercialization on stage or screen.

Dinner Honors W. R. O'Neal's Fifty Years Service as Trustee

A dinner for Mr. W. R. O'Neal, celebrating his fifty years of service as a trustee of Rollins College, was held Friday evening, April 12, at the College Commons. About forty people were present. Judge D. A. Cheney acted as toastmaster for the occasion. Speeches of tribute were made by Dr. Holt representing the College, Irving Bachelder representing the Trustees, Dean Elgart representing the Faculty, F. H. Ward representing the Alumni and Dudley Darling representing the Student Body.

A beautiful brief case was presented to Mr. O'Neal by Mr. R. W. Caldwell on behalf of the Trustees. Mr. O'Neal responded by telling briefly of the founding and early history of the College.



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## Students May Elect Officers of Council

A movement is on foot to bring Rollins elections for Student Council officers within the interest of everyone. Heretofore, the campus as a whole has been ignorant to an astounding degree as to the method of electing the three highest officers. In the past this election has been conducted behind the all-too-closed doors of the Council.

Monday night the members of the Council voted to lay upon the table, pending ratification by the groups, the following amendment to the constitution:

"The chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary of the Student Council shall be separately elected from the regular members of the governing Student Council, by a majority vote of the Student Body."

The present plan will abolish the darkness surrounding the election of officers, and will create interest in council work through the speeches of the prospective candidates and the individual balloting. The Council was generally in favor of a referendum campaign to stimulate general interest in Student Council workings.

Provided this amendment passes the Student Council next week, an assembly will be called next Thursday, April 24, for the student body to vote upon it. If it is ratified by three-fourths of the students present and voting at that assembly, the elections will be open with individual voting.

The calendar will be as follows: April 21—Vote by Student Council to put amendment up before the student body.

April 24—Ratification of amendment by student body.

April 29—Names of all candidates presented to outgoing chairman of Student Council (Dudley Darling).

May 1—Speeches by each candidate for the three offices to show qualifications and ideas for next year's Council.

May 2—Balloting in Pinchewat conducted by Student Council.

May 4—Perhaps we might have an election dance with the returns announced. It will be sponsored by the Gamma Phi's (though they do not know at this time that they are doing so.)

ally be presented Chopin's familiar Polonaise, Op. 52, in A major; it was professionally done, its last note being covered by a tremendous blanket of applause from a more than appreciative audience.

Proving especially obliging, Mr. Haimowitz with the poise and stage presence of an experienced concert artist presented three encores which we enjoyed as much as the program itself. The first was the light, refreshing "Butterfly." The second, which we personally enjoyed more than any other number of the evening, was Liszt's colorful Hungarian Rhapsody. And the third was a Berlioz Nocturne from the left hand. I am sure that if an imaginary applause-meter had been placed in the Annie Russell Theatre for this season, the audience's appreciation of these three encores would have looked all previous marks. The remarks of "valentines," "genius," and the highest tribute of all — "hard worker" — which we overheard following the recital certainly apply to Ely Haimowitz, who gave us a truly wonderful evening.
