Mystery of Rollins Coxswain Cleared as Sally Stearns Admits Handling 1936 Tiller

(From the American Red Cross) **SOMEWHERE IN SICILY** — It took a well-known sports writer seven years to learn the truth about a mystery involving the coxswain of a Rollins College crew which defeated Manhattan College on the Harlem River in a big upset in 1936. And he learned the facts 4,000 miles from where the race took place.

When the Rollins College crew beat Manhattan by two lengths in the 1936 upset, it was suspected that the coxswain of the Rollins crew was a girl. It was a couple of weeks before enough of the details came out to at least partly solve the mystery, but the sports writer, Lt. James Burchard, of Syracuse, New York, now on the staff of the Army paper, Stars and Stripes, wasn't positive until he heard the admission from the coxswain herself in Sicily.

The truth came out in Red Cross headquarters in a large Sicilian city when Sally Stearns, of Peterborough, N. H., in Sicily with an American Red Cross clubmobile unit, admitted she was none other than the male-dressed girl who handled the tiller of the Rollins boat.

At the time of the race sports writers admitted it was one of sportdom's most tantalizing mysteries. It was suspected that a girl handled the Rollins tiller but the coxswain and members of the crew "didn't talk." The truth only leaked out gradually as facts were picked up and put together.

Sally, telling the story, said she always wanted to cox a crew. At Rollins, the boys took her out in the boat as a joke, but she proved so good at the job, and worked at it so hard for four years, she ended up as the best coxswain in the college. As a matter of fact, in 1936 she was the only coxswain. Followers of the sport knew the college had no coxswain of any consequence — they overlooked any such possibility that a girl might be handling the job—and that was the principal reason the win over Manhattan was so upsetting.

From Rollins Sally went to Yale for a graduate course. After that she worked a year for a civilian defense canteen service, and another year for the British Purchasing Commission. Before joining the Red Cross she did electrical design work on destroyers.

Water Color Exhibit By AAFSAT At Morse

Mrs. Marshall Clark Directs Paintings Executed At Local AWVS

The art department at Rollins College announced the opening of the Morse Gallery of Art on October 9, for the 1943-44 season. The first exhibition is a showing of water colors done by men in service at AAFSAT, Orlando, Florida.

These men have been painting in their spare time under the guidance of Mrs. Marshall Clark, using the class room and facilities offered by the AWVS in Winter Park. All but one of the contributors have had previous art training and experience, but have never tried water colors before. The results speak well both for the ability of the artists and for the inspiring help of their instructor.

The paintings are mostly of familiar scenes in and around Winter Park: well known buildings, beautiful spots along the lake shores, and scenes in colored town. Together they form a most interesting and worthwhile exhibit.

It should prove an inspiration to all to know that while being trained in the art of destruction, these men have chosen to give their free time toward re-creating the beauty they find around them, and in turn to pass it on.

The public is cordially invited to visit the Gallery which is open from two to five every weekday afternoon and from three to six o'clock on Sundays.

Nurse Educator To Describe Corps Work

Member of USCNC Will Offer Information Next Week

Of great interest to many Rollins girls will be the visit of a nurse educator of the United States Cadet Nurse Corps to our campus on October 25 or 26. She will give information about the training nurse for a profession that serves our country in peace time as well as in time of war.

In order to join it is necessary to be between the ages of seventeen and thirty-five, to be in good health, to be a graduate of some accredited high school and to have some college education, to be interested in science, to have an alert mind, deft hands, neat personal habits, and a sincere interest. Enrollment in the U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps gives one an education free, an opening to many kinds of specialized work, opportunity for employment after the war, and a direct way of serving one's country. The nurse educator will be here to answer all questions and to explain more fully the work of these nurses.

Rollins Oaths Taken By New Faculty, Freshmen; STAR Unit Presented

Matriculation Convocation exercises were held in Knowles Memorial Chapel today. The academic procession formed in front of Carnegie at nine-thirty. The Crucifier and the Chapel Choir entered the chapel first, followed by President Holt and Colonel Somers, Captain Kimball leading the STAR Unit, the faculty, seniors, upper division, lower division, and new students.

The ceremony opened with the Invocation by Dean Enyart. The choir then sang the Rollins Chapel Song.

The new members of the faculty took the oath of installation. Dean Stone, educational director of the STAR Unit, presented the unit to Dr. Holt who gave them the official welcome to Rollins College, giving them all rights and privileges thereof. The choir sang *Jerusalem*, by Blake, after which the upper division members took their oath and the new students took the matriculation pledge.

The program closed with the Alma Mater, sang by the entire student body and Dean Edmonds pronounced the benediction. The procession filed out to the horseshoe for the formal retiring of the colors.

Chapel Committees Organize, Outline Year's Schedule of Programs For Service

A meeting was held in the Frances Chapel for all those students who were interested in the chapel committees on Wednesday evening, October 13. The committees and their prospective plans for the year were set forth by old students.

First on the list was the Social Service Committee. This committee is just what its name implies—a committee for social service in the town. The committee plans to help the Hungerford school for colored, the day nurseries and various other organizations for the needy.

Last year there were two clubs which were very closely related—the International Relations Club and the Interracial Club. It was thought best this year to combine the two clubs in order to carry on a better and more varied program. Thus the World Relations Club came into being. This group will discuss economic, political, interracial and other interesting current questions. This group hopes to sponsor a student round-table discussion over one of the local radio stations at stated intervals.

Then there is the publicity committee to publicize the activities of the other chapel committees. This committee brings to note the activities of the other committees and the Sunday morning services.

The program committee plans the special programs such as those presented at Christmas for the Sunday services.

Last on the list comes the ushering committee. Because of the scarcity of men, most of the ushering is being done by girls this year. This committee officiates at the Sunday morning services, and any special services held at the chapel.

About sixty students have signed up for these committees. These committees should hold some interest for many more than that and Dean Edmonds would like to see further registration.

Council Elections—Att. Student Body

Nominations for president and vice-president of Student Council are to be made this coming Monday evening at the second regular meeting of that body.

To review history for the benefit of the new students—at the annual elections last May a member of the Marine Reserve Corps was voted president of the student government. In July, the reserves were called to active duty, leaving a vacancy in the roster of officers at the opening of college. Until this past Monday night, vice-president Margie Hansen served as acting president. At that time she tendered her resignation and announced that her sorority plans to nominate her to the presidency, thereby leaving the vice-presidency open. Until these offices are filled, secretary Tryntje Martin will serve as acting chairman.

The elections, which will be held Friday, October 29, concern every Rollins undergraduate. When nominations are announced, each student should, for the sake of his own interests during the year, investigate the records of the candidates. As soon as elections have been held, the questions of a possible Tomokan, the allocation of the Student Association Fee, the allotment of funds to provide the STAR Unit with the Sandspur, and others must be discussed and intelligently handled. Therefore, it is obvious that a well-knit, informed set of officers must be placed in office. In order to accomplish this end, every student should feel it his responsibility to authorize his group to nominate able candidates, and to elect the persons who will best serve them and the college.

What Are You Doing?

It was so you would be able to do something about it that Rollins instigated the defense courses such as, code, typing, shorthand, first aid, home nursing and others, and is cooperating with the AWVS, the Red Cross, and the Orlando Air Base hospital. The opportunities to help are almost countless. What are you doing?

Constitution of The Rollins Student Association

In accordance with the Preamble to the Constitution of the Publications Union and section 3 of the By-Laws of the Constitution of the Student Association, these Constitutions are herewith published.

To the end that the best interest of Rollins College be promoted and efficient self-government of the student body be secured, we the students of Rollins College establish this Constitution.

Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be the Student Association of Rollins College.

Article II. Purpose

The purpose of the Student Association of Rollins College shall be the organization of the student body in management of all student activities, the promotion of good fellowship and the enforcement of order in the College.

Article III. Members

Section 1. All students, upon payment of the Student Association Fee, shall become members of the Student Association.

Section 2. The members of the Student Association shall be entitled to all privileges extended by the Student Association and the benefits derived from departments subsidized by it.

Article IV. Rights

The members of the Student Association shall have the right:

- (1) To establish a democratic form of government;
- (2) To present student opinion in any formulation or revision of the curriculum; and to present student opinion at faculty meetings, when matters pertaining to the interests of the student body are to be discussed.
- Any member or members have the right:
 - (1) To organize and petition independently for furtherance of the interests of the student body;
 - (2) To trial by the Student-Faculty Discipline Committee;
 - (3) To freedom of speech and press;
 - (4) To peaceful assembly.

Article V. Student Council

Section 1. The governing powers of the Student Association shall be vested in a Student Council.

Section 2. The Student Council shall be composed of one representative, elected annually from each social fraternity and sorority; four independent representatives, at least one of whom must be a woman; one faculty; and the Treasurer of Rollins College. The faculty member and the Treasurer of the College shall serve without vote.

The student members of the Council shall be regularly enrolled undergraduate students of the College, in the Upper Division or students who have been regularly enrolled for five terms.

Section 3. Each student group having representation on the Student Council shall elect one alternate member. The requirements for an alternate are the same as those of a regular member. The alternate member shall serve on the council in the absence of the regular voting member. A new alternate may be chosen only with the permission of the Council.

Section 4. The Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary of the Student Council shall be elected separately from the regular members of the incoming Council by the vote of student body, every member of the student body having the right to vote. The person receiving the greatest number of votes for each office shall be declared elected to that office.

The Chairman shall preside over Student Association and Student Council meetings; call meetings of the Student Association or the Student Council; and appoint committees as designated by the Council; and shall serve as the President of the Association.

The Vice-Chairman shall act as Chairman in the absence of the regular Chairman, and shall serve as Vice-President of the Student Association.

The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the Association and of the Council meetings and have custody of the records.

No officer can succeed himself and no group can have representation in the same office in successive years.

Section 5. The Student Council shall have the power to determine the Student Association Fee and appropriate the Student Association Funds.

Section 6. The Student Council shall have the power to make appointments of student members to college committees on which one undergraduate body is permitted representation.

Section 7. It shall have the power to remove an officer of any student organization for incompetence, if said organization comes under the Council's control.

Section 8. In matters of emergency, executive authority shall reside in an Inner Council, composed of the three student officers of the Council, the faculty representative (ex-officio) and the Treasurer of the College (ex-officio), and two members, one man and one woman, to be elected from the Council by a two-

thirds vote of a voting quorum of three-fourths of the total number of group representatives.

Section 9. Upon a petition of three regular voting members of the Council special meetings of the Student Council shall be called.

Section 10. The Council shall have the power to make necessary and just laws for carrying out the aforementioned powers of the Council and all power vested in the Association by this Constitution, in so far as these laws do not conflict with those of the College.

Article VI. Amendments

Section 1. Any proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted in writing and passed by a two-thirds vote of the entire Council for further consideration. The proposed amendment shall lie on the table for a week before being voted on. A two-thirds vote of the entire Council is necessary to amend. The amendment must then be ratified by a three-fourths vote of those students present and voting at a Student Association Assembly. The amendment must be printed in the Sandspur prior to a Student Association meeting.

Section 2. The By-Laws may be amended or added to by a two-thirds vote of the entire Council. The proposed change must lie on the table for one week before final voting.

THE BY-LAWS OF THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION

1. A. Election of officers of the Student Association shall be held annually the first week in May. The election shall be conducted by the retiring officers of the Student Council.

B. In case of the resignation of any officer of the Student Association, a special election shall be called by the Inner Council to fill the office for the remainder of the term. The order of authority in the interim in such a case will be President, Vice-President, Secretary, Comptroller, Man and Woman Representative on the Council. This election should be called during the second week after the first regular meeting of the Council following the resignation. Any officer elected in a By-Election for a term of less than six months, shall not disqualify himself or his group from election to the same office the following year.

2. New fraternal organizations may be represented on the Council when they are recognized by the Administration and Panhellenic or Interfraternity Council.

3. The Constitution and By-Laws of the Student Association shall be published annually in the Sandspur during the first month of the College year.

4. Not later than May 15th, the retiring chairman shall prepare and read a report to the Council of the various activities and actions of the Council and Student Association during the past year, including all committees appointed by or operated under the authority of the Student Association. This report, together with any other material or ideas that may be helpful in providing continuity and efficiency to the business of the Student Association, shall be given to his successor, who in turn will place the report on permanent file.

5. The following procedure will regulate allocations from the Student Association Account:

A. All requests for funds from the Student Association shall be presented in person to the new Council the second week in May.

B. These requests should show the budget for the past year, and the probable budget for the coming year.

C. With these requests to consider and any other privileges which they might want to purchase and the estimates for a General Fund in mind, the Council shall fix the Student Association Fee for the coming year.

D. Each department requesting funds shall then receive notice of their probable allotment before the end of the school year.

E. The Council shall allocate funds early in October.

F. The Council shall send someone from its number to attend meeting (without vote) of all departments receiving funds. Council at least once each month, on the financial status of the department to which he is assigned. His report shall show the use of funds during the period and the comparison with the budget submitted by his assigned department when requesting funds.

G. Each department receiving funds from the Student Council shall be required to hold meetings at least once a month, and to keep complete records of its activities. It shall compile a monthly report from these records for the use of the Council Representative in his report to the Student Council.

H. Any department receiving funds whose monthly reports are in arrears shall automatically be denied any further funds from its submitted to the satisfaction of the Council. Such reports shall be submitted by the fifth day of each month.

6. Notices shall be sent to members twenty-four hours before all meetings.

7. Meetings shall be conducted according to "Roberts' Rules of Order."

8. During the fall term the President of Student Association shall call a meeting of the Senior Class for the purpose of electing a Senior Committee. All Seniors shall receive due notice of meeting at least 48 hours in advance. All nominations shall be made from the floor. The chairman of this committee shall be elected by the Senior Class. The duty of this Committee shall be to make Commencement arrangements, and transact the regular business of the Senior Class.

9. In May the Council shall elect a committee and its chairman to handle the reception of the new students and the "ratting" of freshmen students.

10. Alternate members who have the privilege of discussion, shall attend the meetings of the Council during the Spring term with the regular members.

11. Elections for Officers for the Freshman Class shall be held in accordance with the following regulations:

A. Elections shall be held during the fourth week after registration for the fall term, the date to be set by the freshman election board.

B. Election shall be conducted by a Freshman election board composed of the following members: the President of the Student Association, the President of the Interfraternity Council, the President of the Panhellenic Council, the president of the Independents, and a member of the faculty of the College who shall be chosen by the other four members of the board. The President of the Student Association shall serve as chairman of the board and shall preside over the election.

C. The place in which the election shall be held shall be designated by the Board.

D. Members of the freshman class who shall be eligible to vote for officers of the class shall be all entering students who come under the authority of the Rat Committee (these students being designated by the College Administration.)

E. The officers of the Freshman Class shall be President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer. These Officers shall take office immediately following the completion of the election of all the Class officers.

F. Election shall be by written ballot. Each candidate must receive a majority vote to be elected. If on the first ballot no candidate shall receive a majority of the votes cast, a second ballot shall be taken with the two candidates with the greatest number of votes running. In case any two shall be tied for second position on the first ballot, both shall be placed on the second ballot along with the first candidates.

G. All nominations shall be made from the floor. Any motion to close nominations must be passed by unanimous vote.

H. If anything shall be done in a manner contrary to the regulations here stated, or if there shall be any fraudulent or dishonest voting, or if any formal charges to that effect shall be made to the election board within forty-eight hours after the election, the election shall be declared temporarily voided. The Student Council shall consider the matter at its next meeting and shall decide whether the circumstances were such as to have changed the final results of the election. If the Council shall find that the final results have been altered, they shall confirm the voting of the election and shall set a date for a second election, which shall be conducted in the manner herein stated.

I. Notice of the time and place of the Freshman elections must be posted seventy-two hours in advance and published in the Sandspur of the week preceding the elections.

12. A. The financial affairs of the Student Association shall be under the general direction of the Treasurer of the Student Association, with the Assistance of the Comptroller of the Student Association. The duties of the Comptroller shall be: to keep all records of the finances of the Student Association; to approve all bills to be paid from Student Association funds before payment; to exercise a general budgetary control over the finances of all departments receiving funds from the Student Association; to prepare the annual budget for the action of the Student Council; to prepare and present a monthly financial report to the Student Council showing the expenses, income, and relative financial position of all departments receiving funds from the Student Association; and to make such recommendations to the Student Council as may be necessary concerning the foregoing matters.

All of the above duties shall be subject to the regulations of the Student Council.

B. The Comptroller shall be elected by the following procedure: Candidates shall submit applications before May 1 to the Treasurer of the Student Association. These applications shall be considered by the Nominating Committee composed of the Treasurer of the Student Association, the Professor of Accounting, the Assistant Treasurer of the College, the retiring President of the Student Association, and the retiring

Comptroller. The Candidates must meet the following qualifications:

1. Each candidate shall have taken two terms of Advanced Accounting and shall have received an average grade of at least "B" in all accounting courses taken in Rollins College;

2. Each candidate shall be a member of the Upper Division by the end of the term in which elected.

The Nominating Committee shall consider the following points and such others as seem important to them in making their nominations and shall evaluate their nominees in terms of these qualifications in their reports to the Council making nominations:

1. Participation in extra-curricular activities;

2. Participation in activities directly qualifying him for the Comptrollership, such as treasurerships and business managerships;

3. General scholastic average;

4. Scholastic average in accounting;

5. Interest and ability qualifying him for the Comptrollership. The Nominating Committee shall submit a panel of not more than three approved candidates with nominations in order of their choice and giving reasons therefore to the Student Council at the first meeting after the new officers of the Council shall take office. The Student Council shall then elect the Comptroller from the panel by a majority vote.

C. The Comptroller shall take office at the beginning of the College year in the Fall term and shall hold office until the next Comptroller shall take office the following Fall, except that the Comptroller to be elected in 1942 shall take office immediately upon election.

D. Immediately upon election during the Spring Term, the newly elected Comptroller shall consult with the outgoing Comptroller concerning his work, the financial position of the Student Association, and shall advise and aid him in the preparation of the Budget for the next year.

E. The Comptroller shall attend all meetings of the Student Council and the Inner Council and shall present his monthly report during the first ten days of the month following.

F. The Comptroller shall be responsible for keeping permanent records of the financial affairs of the Student Association in such a manner that they may be passed on to his successors as a permanent record.

G. The Comptroller shall receive a yearly salary of \$75, to be paid at the end of the year after the final report has been given the Council.

H. The Comptroller for the College year 1942-43 shall be elected as soon as possible after the enactment of this amendment. Applications must be filed within one week after its enactment, and the Nominating Committee shall submit its nominations at the first meeting of the Student Council thereafter.

The nominating committee of the Comptroller for the 1942-43 elections only shall be composed of: The Treasurer of the Student Association, the Professor of Accounting, the Assistant Treasurer of the College, the retiring President of the Student Association, and the retiring Chairman of the Financial Committee.

13. A. The management and direction of the Rollins Center shall be vested in a Board of Directors composed of the following members: The Treasurer of the College, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Secretary of the Alumni Association, the Manager and Assistant Manager of the Center, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Building Committee, the Comptroller of the Student Association, and the members of the Student Council. The President of the College and the Dean of the Faculty shall be ex-officio members. The Board of Directors shall meet semi-annually in October and in May to receive reports of its committees, make plans for the Center, determine policies, and take such other steps as it may consider necessary for the efficient handling of the affairs of the Rollins Center. Special meetings may be called by the Chairman at any time, or at the request of the Student Council or any five members of the Board.

The President of the Student Association shall act as Chairman of the Board of Directors. He shall call and preside over all meetings and perform such duties as are usual to the chairman of the board.

B. In the interim between meetings of the Board of Directors, the management and direction of the Rollins Center shall be vested in the Executive Committee composed of the following members: The Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Building Committee, the Manager and Assistant Manager of the Center, and the Comptroller of the Student Association. The Executive Committee shall meet once a month during the third week of each month, and at such other times as the Chairman may deem necessary. Special meetings shall be called upon request of any two

members. The Comptroller shall act as Secretary of the Executive Committee, and shall keep the minutes of all meetings and shall notify all members of meetings at least 24 hours in advance. The Executive Committee shall choose from among its Student members a chairman who shall preside over and call all meetings, and perform such other duties as may from time to time be assigned to him by the Executive Committee or the Board of Directors.

C. Active management and supervision of the financial affairs of the Center shall be vested in the Finance Committee, composed of the Comptroller of the Student Association, two Students to be elected by the Student Council, and the Treasurer of the College who shall be a member ex-officio. The Student Council shall choose from the student members of the Finance Committee a Chairman, who shall preside over and call all meetings, shall serve on the Executive Committee, and who shall serve as financial adviser to the Manager of the Rollins Center. The Comptroller shall act as Secretary of the Finance Committee, keeping the minutes and sending out notices of all meetings.

D. Active direction and supervision of all non-financial affairs of the Rollins Center shall be vested in a Building Committee composed of three students selected by the Student Council, and the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women as ex-officio members. The Council shall choose from among the Student members of the Committee a Chairman, who shall call and preside over all meetings, serve on the Executive Committee, and act as adviser to the Manager on all non-financial matters. The Committee shall choose from among its members a Secretary, who shall keep the minutes of all meetings and turn a permanent copy of the same over to the Secretary of the Executive Committee for filing with other minutes, and who shall send out notices of all meetings.

E. The Chairmen of the Finance and Building Committees shall submit a written report to the Executive Committee at its regular monthly meeting covering the activities of their Committees and of the related affairs of the Rollins Center during the past month. A copy of these reports shall be included in the minutes of the Executive Committee.

STUDENT-FACULTY COMMITTEES

Social Committee

The function of the Social Committee is to give general supervision to the social life of the College.

In order that conflicting engagements may be avoided, all social events connected with the College must be registered in the Office of the Student Deans and approved by the Social Committee, of which the Dean of Women is chairman.

The Social Committee, ordinarily, will not approve applications for social events unless they are filed at least one week prior to the date of the event. The Committee usually meets once a week.

Monday evenings are reserved for fraternity and sorority meetings.

The Student-Faculty Discipline Committee

The Student-Faculty Discipline Committee is constituted as follows: the Dean of the Faculty, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, two men professors, one woman professor, one alternate woman professor, two men students, one alternate man student, two women students, one alternate woman student.

The faculty elects its own members and alternate. Student members are elected from the upper division by the Student Council.

The Deans in no case have a vote, but the Dean of the College serves as chairman of the Committee.

When it appears advisable for a case to be heard by members of one sex, the Committee shall be divided as follows:

(a) For cases dealing with men: Dean of Men, chairman; two men professors; two men students and alternate man student.

(b) For cases dealing with women: Dean of Women, chairman; woman professor, alternate woman professor; two women students and alternate woman student.

The Student-Faculty Discipline Committee charged with the duty of passing upon all student cases involving possible suspension or expulsion from the College for moral delinquency, or upon any other case referred to it by the Dean of the College.

The faculty delegates to the Student-Faculty Committee authority to suspend or expel students from the College when the Committee feels that such action is warranted. The faculty further delegates to the Dean the authority to impose lesser penalties for moral delinquencies. The faculty reserves the right to review any action taken under the above authority.

The Committee may establish its own rules for procedure.

Assembly Committee

The Assembly Committee outlines the programs for all-college assemblies which are held once a week throughout the year.

Constitution of Publications Union

CONSTITUTION OF THE PUBLICATIONS UNION

Preamble

In order to place the student publications of Rollins College upon a sounder basis, to secure continuity of management, to reduce the cost of publication and to insure a larger subscription list, this Constitution is adopted by the students of Rollins College.

For the information of the Student Body, this Constitution and all subsequent amendments shall be published annually in the Sandspur in either the first or second issue at the beginning of the academic year.

Article I. Name and Object

This organization shall be known as the Rollins College Publications Union. The object of this organization is to conduct, manage and issue for the Student Association of Rollins College the Sandspur, Flamingo, Tomokan, "R" Book and such other student publication or publications as the Student Association may direct and subsidize.

Article II. Membership

The Sandspur, Flamingo, Tomokan, "R" Book and such other student publications as receive the endorsement and subsidy of the Student Association of Rollins College and the approval of the administration of Rollins College, shall be members of the Rollins College Publications Union.

Article III. Officers

The Officers of the Rollins College Publications Union shall be a Chairman to be chosen by the Board of Control from among its members, and the Secretary-Treasurer, whose duties shall be those usually performed by such officers, in addition to the duties more specifically prescribed by the Board of Control. This Board of Control shall be composed of the editor, business manager and faculty adviser of each member publication, a faculty adviser-at-large to the Board and of the following ex-officio members: Treasurer of the College, one representative from the Student Association, and the Advertising Commissioner.

Article IV

The Rollins College Publications Union shall meet once each month during the school year. Special meetings may be called by the Chairman and Secretary if they deem it advisable.

Article V. Amendment and By-Laws

Section 1. By-Laws—To aid in furthering the objects set forth herein, the Rollins College Publications Union may, by a two-thirds vote of all of the members of said Union, adopt such By-Laws as are consistent with this Constitution and with the rules and regulations of the Student Association and the administration of the college.

Section 2. Amendments—This Constitution and its By-Laws may be amended upon recommendation of the Publications Union, concurred in by a two-thirds vote of the mem-

bers of the Student Council of Rollins College.

(1) Proposed amendments must be published in the Sandspur one week before they are voted upon.

BY-LAWS

Article I

Section 1. The executive management of the Rollins College Publications Union shall be subject to the rules or regulations of the Student Association and the administration of Rollins College and shall be vested in a Board of Control composed of:

1. The editor and business manager of each member publication. (The Flamingo has no business manager.)

2. One faculty adviser for each member publication.

3. A faculty adviser-at-large to the Board.

4. The Treasurer of the College, who shall be a member ex-officio and shall serve as permanent Secretary-Treasurer.

5. One representative of the Student Association, who shall be a member ex-officio.

6. The Advertising Commissioner, who shall be a member ex-officio.

Section 2. All members of the Board of Control shall have a vote except the ex-officio members. All faculty members shall form a Board to which any person or persons may appeal his case concerning a qualification question. In such an instance the vote of the faculty board becomes final.

Article II

Section 1. Attendance at all meetings of the Publications Union shall be compulsory, and notice of each meeting shall be sent out forty-eight (48) hours in advance of time of meeting.

Section 2. If any member must for any reason absent himself from a regular meeting of the Publications Union, he shall notify the Secretary of his intention in writing not less than twenty-four (24) hours in advance of time of meeting.

Section 3. Violation of Section 2 above shall for the first offense draw a letter of censure from the Secretary, and for the second offense bring about automatic dismissal from the Board of Control, effective from the time of roll call at the particular meeting concerned.

Section 4. Notice of all meetings of the Publications Union shall be posted conspicuously on the college bulletin board at the same time written notice is sent out.

Article III

Section 1. The duties of the Chairman shall be to preside at all meetings to be called at least once a month for the reception of financial reports and other business.

Section 2. The duties of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to send out advance notice of all meetings prescribed in Section 1, to record the minutes of each meeting.

Section 3. The duties of the editor of the Sandspur shall be to supervise all work of that publication, to assume full responsibility for its contents, and to comply with all publication specifications set for him by the Publications Union. He shall cooperate with the Advertising Commissioner in arranging a schedule of publication dates for the year of their joint incumbency, this work to be completed not less than two weeks before the close of college or for the term of his incumbency.

Section 4. The duties of the business manager of the Sandspur shall be to transact all business relating to the publication, to authorize payment of all bills, to collect all bills outstanding, to prepare an annual budget, to direct and assume full responsibility for circulation, both local and mail, to promote the sale of subscriptions, and to act as an agent for the Advertising Commissioner, if agreeable to both parties.

Section 5. The duties of the editor of the Flamingo shall be to supervise all work of that publication, to assume full responsibility for its contents, and to comply with all publication specifications set for him by the Publications Union.

Section 7. The duties of the business manager of the Tomokan shall be to transact all business relating to the publication, to authorize payment of all bills, to collect all bills outstanding, to prepare an annual budget, to direct and assume full responsibility for total circulation, and to act as an agent for the Advertising Commissioner, if agreeable to both parties.

Section 8. The duties of the Advertising Commissioner shall be to solicit advertising for all member publications, and to supervise the work of his staff in all its branches, including solicitation, rendering of accounts, preparation of copy, proof-reading, layout, etc.

He shall assume full responsibility for the collection of accounts in his department, and shall present his books to the Treasurer of the College for auditing at the close of each term.

He shall present bond in the sum of at least one thousand (\$1,000) in a reputable bonding company, the premium for which is to be paid by the Publications Union.

He shall comply with all specifications which the Publications Union may set for the Advertising Commissioner, and shall be fully responsible for his entire staff in this respect.

Article IV

Section 1. The Advertising Commissioner shall operate on the following schedule of commission payment:

(a) The total commission shall at no time exceed twenty per cent (20%).

(b) On advertising solicited and received by the Advertising Commissioner, he shall receive full twenty per cent (20%) commission.

(c) On advertising solicited and received by a member of the commission other than the Commissioner himself, the 20% shall be divided as follows: the agent receiving the advertising shall receive 15%, the remaining 5% to go to the Commissioner.

Article V

Section 1. All editors and business managers shall prepare monthly reports of all work done and of financial transactions made on their respective publications during the period immediately preceding, and shall assume full responsibility for the accuracy of these reports, which shall be read to the Publications Union members at the first meeting following the date upon which the reports fall due.

Article VI

Section 1. Failure of any elected officer to fulfill his prescribed duties shall subject him on the first offense to a written reprimand from the Secretary, and on the second offense render him liable to immediate recall upon majority vote of all voting members of the Publications Union and concurred in by the Faculty Committee on Publications.

Article VII

Section 1. A candidate for editorship of the Sandspur must be a member of the Upper Division by October 1 of the year of his incumbency and must have worked for two years on at least 50 per cent of each year's issues as a regular reporter, feature writer, proof-reader, copy-editor, headline writer, news editor, sub-editor or make-up assistant. Experience as a fraternity or sorority correspondent does not count. The editor of the Sandspur is a voting member.

Section 2. A candidate for editorship of the Flamingo must be a member of the Upper Division by October 1 of the year of his incumbency and must have worked for two years on the Flamingo as a

regular staff member, or one year as a regular staff member and one year as a contributor. A regular staff member must have worked as associate editor, proof-reader or copy-reader for at least 50 per cent of the issues during each year as a staff member. A contributor must have material appearing in at least two issues during his year as a contributor. The editor of the Flamingo is a voting member.

Section 3. A candidate for editorship of the Tomokan must be a member of the graduating class during the year of his incumbency and must have worked for at least one year as a member of the Tomokan staff. A staff member must have worked as associate editor, photography editor, or as a makeup assistant, for at least 50 per cent of the time. The editor of the Tomokan is a voting member.

Section 4. A candidate for editorship of the "R" Book must be a member of the Upper Division by October 1 of the year of his incumbency and must have worked for one year as a regular member of the staff of some member publication. The editor of the "R" Book is a voting member.

Section 5. Candidates for the positions as business manager must be members of the Upper Division by October 1 of the year of their incumbency and must have worked for one year on the advertising commissioner's staff selling at least five advertisements during the year. Each business manager is a voting member.

Section 6. The advertising commissioner must be a member of the Upper Division by October 1 of the year of his incumbency and must have worked for two years on the regular business staff of one or more of the member publications. He is NOT a voting member.

Section 7. In fulfillment of the foregoing qualifications, a candidate may present a certified record of two years service as a regular staff member of a newspaper published by an accredited four-year college or a regular daily or weekly newspaper, provided he has served for two terms on the regular staff of the publication for which he is a candidate and is a member of the Upper Division by October 1 of the year of his incumbency. The certification of record shall come from the editor and/or faculty adviser of the publication on which he has served.

Section 8. The position of Business Manager for the Flamingo is abolished, thus limiting student voters to seven.

Section 9. The ex-officio faculty member is to be entitled to a vote as general adviser.

Article VIII

Section 1. Candidates for the positions of editor and business manager of the member publications and the advertising commissioner shall file a letter of the first meeting of the Board in April. The Board of Control shall pass upon the qualifications of the applicants as stated in Article VII of these By-Laws and shall submit a list of qualified candidates to be placed upon the Student Association ballot at the regular election of the officers of the Student Association. The editors and business managers and the advertising commissioner shall be elected by a vote of the members of the Student Association, the candidate for each office receiving the largest number of votes being elected.

Section 2. Associate editors of the member publications shall be appointed by the respective editors of those publications subject to the approval of the Publications Union.

Section 3. Faculty advisers of the member publications shall be appointed by the college administration.

Article IX. Further Regulations

1. The editor of the Sandspur shall prepare and publish in the Sandspur schedules whereby each candidate for the editorship, in alphabetical order, shall supervise one issue of the publication during the spring term.

2. The editor of the Flamingo, of the Tomokan, and of the "R" Book shall arrange that candidates for these positions, respectively, obtain full information on the editing of these publications and, if practicable, assist in some of the editor's work.

3. A candidate for a business managership shall confer with the incumbent business manager concerning his duties, and if possible assist in his work.

4. The Advertising Commissioner shall be chosen from applicants who have served with distinction in the business department of one or more of the publications.

5. Any member compelled to be absent from a regular meeting may submit his proxy vote to the secretary of the Publications Union. This proxy will be accepted if the Publications Union is satisfied with his reasons for absence.

Article X. Assumption of Duties

Section 1. The editor of the Sandspur shall assume his duties upon election.

Section 2. All other editors and business managers shall assume their duties at the beginning of the next academic year. The editor of the "R" Book shall be elected in a regular election at such a time as to give him a full year to complete his work.

Section 3. The Advertising Commissioner shall assume his duties at the beginning of the next academic year.

Article XI

Section 1. The Chairman of the Publications Union shall be elected at the first meeting of the Board after the election of new officers of the publication.

Basketball Rules Set For Coming Season

If you are a girl who is interested in sportmanship, fun, and losing a few pounds, then this article is for you. Basketball season is on, and here are the details:

Intramurals will start in about three weeks—open to all sororities and Independents, and everyone is invited to enter. There will be eight teams if all enter, and four practices are required before the games start. Entrants may go to basketball class for practice Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday at five-fifteen. Regulation dark blue shorts and white shirts must be worn in all games. Round robin games are planned and every team will play the others, thereby placing about twenty-seven games on the schedule.

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Five Freshmen Have Outstanding I. Q. Rating

Results of First Tests Reveal 'Superstudents'; One Scores Near Perfect

Professor Audrey L. Packham of the psychology department disclosed this week that, according to the results of the intelligence tests given to the freshmen on September 28, there are among the incoming members of the Rollins family five who are "superstudents," one of whom made a score so nearly perfect that it probably has not been surpassed by any college freshman in the country.

In addition to the intelligence tests, incoming students were given a psychological test, the scores for which are not yet available. This test will show the students' academic aptitude for college work in terms of language ability and ability to do quantitative thinking.

Beginning next week the freshmen will receive a series of achievement and aptitude tests, to be given at the rate of three a week for four weeks.

East of the Flagpole

(This is the first contribution by the STAR Unit to the Sandspur. Recognizing the ASTP men as members of the Rollins family during their stay on campus, the editors welcome offerings of this type to the paper. Arrangements have been made to issue copies to the men each week of their time here.)

The STAR Unit has undertaken to provide weekly blood plasma of 25 to 30 points to the Central Florida Blood Bank in Orlando. Every Wednesday the mobile unit arrives at the day room in Rollins Hall, equipped with two nurses and innumerable empty bottles. Last week the Rollins Nurses Aides helped by holding hands and bottles during the operation. Without the able assistance of these women the time consumed in blood-letting the previous week was three hours, but was reduced on October 13th to two hours, seven and three-quarters minutes.

Members of the STAR Unit never knew that women could become so excited by forty-two men who were executing special drills and flanking movements on the Horseshoe last week. They barely skirted the stock-ingless feet of some little maiden sitting on the grass in their line of march. When honored by the "eyes right" of the section leader, few understood the favor bestowed on them, and even fewer saluted as the boys went by. They ought to read up on military customs!

Bi-Monthly Forum Organizes, Discusses 'Personal Living'

Sunday evening marked a renewal of a dormant chapel activity—a forum to discuss questions of interest to Rollins students and to members of the STAR Unit. The first part of the meeting was devoted to the practical problems of organization. After much discussion, it was decided that the forum be held on the first and third Sunday evenings of every month, that a forum committee be appointed by the chapel staff to take charge of meetings, and that the general topic of forum discussions would be "Personal Living."

Dean Edmonds, who had been unanimously invited to be present at forum meetings, then read a letter from a former Rollins choir member, now a Marine. This letter brought up a problem facing many service men and civilians now: the question of "why God allows war in a world that could be so beautiful." The students and soldiers present agreed that they believed that God does not either permit or prevent war, but that man is very largely responsible for what happens to him; if man creates the conditions for a war, then it is up to him to take the consequences and do the best he can.

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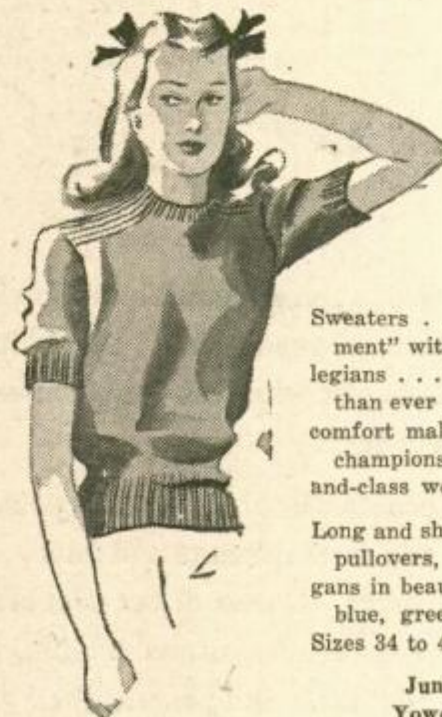
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ODK Admits Melcher To Membership

Originator of the Rollins Economic Conference, Dr. Melcher has served as its chairman since 1935. He is chairman of the Faculty Committee for the Orange County Progress Fund Campaign and the Student Aid Campaign. Dr. Melcher has contributed to various national educational and economics journals.

Dr. Melcher was Chairman of the Executive Committee for the direction of the 1943 summer term at Rollins. He is a member of the Ex-

ecutive Committee of the Florida Association of Colleges, the American and the Southern Economic Associations, and the Florida Academy of Sciences. He is also a Fellow in the Royal Society of Arts of London.

A member of Pi Gamma Mu, Social Science Fraternity, he has been secretary since 1940.
