A musically designed cake, made by the Orange Court hotel chef, and decorated with bars from a Rollins song written by President Holt attracted amateur photographers before being auctioned.

Prizes awarded during the two-day fair included a bicycle, which was won by Mrs. Nathan Starr, and three chances only on hose, won by the Misses Anna B. Treat, Constance Ortmayer and Mrs. Hugh Hannard.

Outdoor booths, including fortune telling by palmistry, graphology and cards; bingo, notions and art objects, were under the general management of Harold S. Lyons. Mrs. Henry A. ### An APPEAL to the PEOPLES of the WORLD

The atomic bomb and other applications of science and technology to modern warfare have made it so destructive that the outbreak of another war must be prevented.

Atomic secrets cannot be kept for more than a few years by any nation or small group of nations; nor can there be any adequate military defense against a surprise attack capable of paralyzing the country and peoples attacked.

There can be no absolute guarantee that peace will be maintained as long as any nation has the sovereign right to decide questions of war and peace for itself.

If nations live under the permanent threat of war each sovereign state will inevitably become more and more totalitarian; thus depriving its citizens of more and more personal liberty.

No nation-state can today hope to be strong enough, sovereign enough, to protect its citizens from war. Twice in one generation the United States has been forced to enter a war which the people wished to avoid.

Peace is not merely the absence of war but the presence of justice, of law, of order—in short, of government.

World peace can be created and maintained only under world law universal and strong enough to establish justice and prevent armed conflict between nations.

The only way by which a people can assure its survival and preserve its liberties is to create, with the other nations a world government—a constitutional federal government—to which shall be delegated the powers necessary to maintain the general peace of the world based on law and justice.

The United Nations as now constituted is a league of sovereign states. As such, it is not a world government, and therefore cannot by law prevent armed conflict between nations and establish justice and security. Nevertheless, it is the greatest step yet taken by mankind towards world peace. Since the Charter provides for amendments, every effort should be made to transform the United Nations into a world government.

Such objectives cannot, we know, be reached overnight. The difficulty of building support within each nation for a world government is multiplied by the diversity of cultures, governments, and institutions among the nations.

But a start must be made. It must be made now. It must be made with the tools at hand. It must be directed, in the first instance, at the removal of the haunting fear and suspicion with which atomic weapons and weapons of similar destructiveness afflict mankind. The United States has the opportunity and duty to take the lead in proposing such constructive measures as are necessary to that end. It is with these considerations in mind that we make the proposals which follow.

We propose that a General Conference of the United Nations be called as provided in Article 109 of the Charter to draft amendments accomplishing the following objectives:

1. That the United Nations be transformed from a league of sovereign states into a government deriving its specific powers from the peoples of the world.

2. That the General Assembly be reconstituted as the legislative branch of the world government, in which the citizens of the member states are represented on an equitable basis.

3. That the General Assembly, in addition to its present functions, shall have power:

- To make laws prohibiting or otherwise controlling weapons of mass destruction and, so far as necessary for that purpose, regulating the uses of atomic energy.
- To make laws providing for such inspection as is necessary or appropriate to the execution of the foregoing powers.
- To provide for appropriate civil and criminal sanctions for the laws enacted pursuant to the foregoing powers.
- To provide and maintain such police forces as are necessary for law enforcement.

4. That independent judicial tribunals be created with jurisdiction over cases and controversies arising under laws enacted by the General Assembly or involving questions concerning the interpretation of the Charter of the United Nations.

5. That a Bill of Rights be designed for the protection of persons affected by laws enacted by the General Assembly.

6. That the Security Council be reconstituted as the executive branch of the world government with the power (a) to administer and insure the enforcement of the laws, and (b), under the direction of the General Assembly, to perform its present functions as defined in the Charter.

7. That the powers not delegated to the General Assembly be reserved to the member states.

We believe these to be the minimum requirements necessary for the creation of a world government capable of averting the catastrophe of another war in the atomic era. The present United Nations Charter does not meet these minimum requirements.

The establishment of a world government representative of the peoples of the world must be accompanied by a broad program of mass education and the free exchange of knowledge among them. Only world government, even in the limited terms here advocated, can bring the peace in which the peoples can mature to the full responsibility by which they can realize their destiny as free men.

Unanimously adopted by the Rollins College Conference on World Government, at Winter Park, Florida, March 16, 1946.

## Open Letter to the Independents:

Singing joined the ranks of competitive "sports" at Rollins some years ago when the Independent group started sponsoring a yearly song contest. Originally the understanding was that each group was to sing one fraternity and one non-fraternity song, and it was later agreed that there would be no solo work as such. However, these rules, as far as we have been able to discover, were never written down, and in recent years competitors have tended toward very broad interpretations.

In song contests, as in every other kind of competition, fairness in judging is directly dependent on the knowledge and integrity of the judge and the explicitness of the rules. Singing being far less tangible than athletics, it is even more necessary that the rules be standard and clearly understood by participants and judges. This was not the case in last year's contest.

Dr. Honaas, director of the Conservatory now on leave of absence, wrote the Sandspur following last year's contest advocating standardization of rules and a judge's score sheet, and suggesting that one required song might be sung by all ensembles to further insure a fair basis for judging. He added that he hoped "something tangible would be done" before the next contest. "This contest is too significant to be taken lightly," he wrote. "It has developed through the years into an occasion of major interest."

Because of this great interest in the contest, and the fact that it, more than any other annual competition, provides an absolutely equal opportunity for every group to win, we strongly suggest that the sponsors of the contest, in collaboration with Mr. Walter, who has also expressed himself in favor of the idea, draw up a clear and concise set of rules to govern this year's contest, provide the judges with a scoring sheet containing definite items to be rated, and invite off-campus musicians to judge the contest.

## Sandspur Advertiser To Air Unique Show From Plane Over N.Y.

One of the most unique broadcasts in the long, colorful history of radio will be aired over the entire NBC chain on the Chesterfield Supper Club program at 7 P. M. EST, Friday, April 5th.

With the cabin of a 51-passenger TWA Constellation Starliner as the studio, the program will be brought to listeners as the giant plane cruises 20,000 feet above New York city.

Aboard will be the entire "Supper Club" entourage—singing stars Perry Como and Jo Stafford, the "Chesterfield Satisfiers," Martin Block, the Supper Club Host and the Supper Club orchestra under the direction of Lloyd Shaffer.

For the second time in 15 months, the radio editors of America have voted this program their favorite 15-minute program, in the Billboard 15th Annual Poll.

To date about 110 stars have been guests of the Club, among them the greatest names of stage, screen and radio. Recent guests were Marion Hutton, Boris Karloff, Vera Vague, Charles Coburn and Eugene List, the piano virtuoso who played for Churchill, Stalin and President Truman at Potsdam.

Radio experts rate the Club's young baritone, Perry Como, second only to the daddy of them all, Bing Crosby. His first recording, *Goodbye Sue*, sold more than 200,000 copies. Since then his records have topped the 5,000,000 sales mark.

Lovely Jo Stafford, the Club's co-star of song, is a Californian who got her start to stardom with Tommy Dorsey and overnight rocketed right to the top in radio and recording popularity.

Perry Como and Jo Stafford were chosen King and Queen of the Lake Placid Winter Carnival, and during the Supper Club broadcast from Lake Placid, an additional honor was bestowed on them. *Metronome Magazine* gave them the award for "Outstanding Achievement" in the

## 'Lady Precious Stream' Glitters, Sparkles, Amazes Reviewer

The reaction to Lady Precious Stream, Soo Yong production, which ran five nights at the Annie Russell, was first one of amazement mingled with wonder . . . then it buckled down to a fascination usually reserved for fairy tales. Done in classic Chinese manner, the glittering spectacle exceeded many fanciful dreams.

With due respect but no resemblance to what Confucius might have said, this humble reviewer shall expound on reactions occurring when westerner meets eastern drama. In a verbal nutshell—"gosh!"

The story of the Chinese maiden who loves a handsome gardener was enriched by the manner in which it was presented. Magnificent scenery, extravagant costumes, customs and traditional characters of the Oriental drama—all the make-believe of the Chinese stage was brought to the Annie Russell. It was interesting to see what the actors would do in and for such a background.

Much credit is due Soo Yong, assisted by Donald S. Allen, for imparting to the cast her understanding of Chinese customs, characterizations and graceful intricate gestures which the players, in turn, conveyed to the audience. Still more credit is deserved for having attempted the production with an all American cast, few of whom had probably ever seen a Chinese production.

It was, of course, impossible to expect an exact replica of the perfection achieved by the Chinese in their own theatre. The players were not in familiar territory, but then, neither was the audience. So both stood an even chance of success in their respective jobs. And when the actors took full advantage of audience inspiration and audience accepted what was so beautifully placed before them, things moved smoothly and surely.

The playgoer's imagination was a leading participant in Lady Precious Stream. Miss Yong told the audience of this in the beginning, presented the actors, and from then on the individual spectator was on his own.

Another novel feature was the presence of property men, C. K. Huang and Sam Burchers, who conveniently anticipated all faints by strategically providing pillows, constructed huge gates, and whipped up a necessary snowstorm. The amusing team was most successful in being so vital a part in the production, by deftly doing their work without detracting from the story.

Anita Rodenbaeck, in the title role, played her part well and R. Jack Kelly was properly dashing as the gardener who goes to seek his fortune and returns a king. Phyllis Starobin gives a most convincing portrayal of the mother who actually ruled the household despite the convictions of her husband, played pompously by Charles Stoer. George Cocalis handled his comedy part deftly and Luther Huage was equally at home in the role of General Su. Pat Underwood portrayed the serene Golden Stream and Betty Asher, delivering an endless stream of chatter, was Silver Stream. Ernest Kilroe provided a laugh-provoking characterization in his brief bit as a suitor of Precious Stream. As
