Miss Alice E. Guild, 88, of 419 N. Interlachen Avenue, passed away  
1949  
at her home Tuesday, June 28, following a long illness.

Funeral services will be held Thursday morning at 11 o'clock at the Fairchild Funeral Home with Dean Melville Johnson in charge. Internment will be in the family plot at Lowell, Mass.

Miss Guild, daughter of Dr. William A. and Laura Guild, was born in Lowell, Mass., October 16, 1860. With her father and mother and sister, the late Clara Louise Guild, she moved to Winter Park in 1883. She attended the Boston Art School and in the early days of Rollins College was asked by President Hooker to help organize an Art Department at the College. She taught art under Presidents Hooker, Ward and Blackman.

She and her sister were closely identified with many college and civic organizations. They were charter members of the Congregational Church and the Fortnightly Club. She is the last charter member of the Congregational Church.

In 1935 Rollins College conferred the Rollins Decoration of Honor on the Misses Guild at the Semicentennial convocation.

Only distant cousins survive her, Miss Carolyn Legg of Washington, D. C. and Dr. Willlam Guild of Chicago, Illinois.

Funeral services will be held Thursday morning at 11 o'clock at the  
Central funeral home with Rev. J. H. Johnson in charge. Interment

Miss Smith, daughter of Dr. W. H. Smith and Laura Smith, was born in  
Lowell, Mass., October 18, 1860. With her father and mother and sister, she  
attended Clara Louise Smith, the novel to appear last in 1922. She attended  
the Boston Art School and in the early years of Rollins College was asked  
by President Hoover to help organize an art department at the College.  
She and her sister were closely identified with the college and
