Swing an' Sway Kaye Offers \$1,250 Cash In Poetry Contest

A National Amateur Poetry contest, with over \$1,250 in cash prizes, is being sponsored by Sammy Kaye, orchestra leader. The first prize will be \$500; second prize \$200; third prize \$100. There will also be twenty prizes of \$25 each.

The contest starts October 1 and will close February 27, 1947, a date selected because it is the anniversary of the birth of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow.

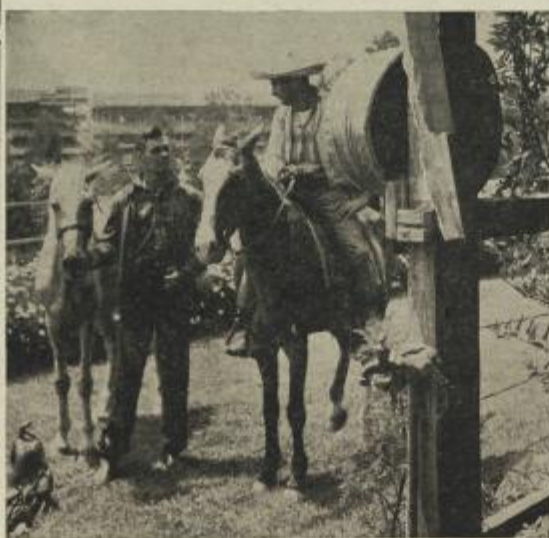
The winning poems will be read by Sammy Kaye on his Sunday Serenade program, which is heard over the coast to coast network of ABC every Sunday at 1:30 p. m. EST and will be published in the 1947 edition of the Sunday Serenade Book of Poetry. The first prize poem will appear in Pageant magazine.

The judges will be Kate Smith, one of the country's foremost women of today; Ted Malone, outstanding collector of American poetry and featured on the Westinghouse programs; and Vernon Pope, Editor of Pageant magazine.

In announcing the contest, Sammy Kaye stated:

"Writing poetry is one of the fine arts and should be encouraged as much as possible. We are particularly interested in receiving entries from college and high school students, as some of the finest poetry emanates from those sources. We are hoping that this contest will uncover poets who will thus be inspired to continue writing and achieve fame in this field."

Senores Burchers and Redding Still Plodding Through Mexican Sands

Editors note: Last week we left Jack Redding and Sam Burchers a short distance from Nuevo Laredo. They are riding off into the night through a trackless desert (except for the Pan-American highway), and have just spent an exhausting day floundering through the loose sands in search of Jack's spirited stallion, Hopalong. Eventually, they are bound for Mexico City.

Sam and I had never been in this section of Mexico, and we had no idea what was ahead of us. The burro was carrying enough food for a week, but our two canteens and two water bags would not supply us for long. Our biggest worry was water for the horses. The fact that my Spanish vocabulary consisted of less than fifteen words and Sam's even less, failed to daunt us.

A full moon, riding in a breezeless sky, illuminated the vast desert and made us aware of our smallness. We had ridden late into the night; a desert breeze blew up; the moon paled.

Noticing a few strays grazing on the mesquite, we began to follow hooftracks, which led us to an artesian well. We unsaddled, made camp, watered and fed the horses. Before turning in for the night, I bent the ground around our blankets to make sure there were no rattlesnakes.

The sun woke us up the next morning. I noticed a Mexican boy on a horse, just looking on, but no doubt wondering what two "gringos" were doing in such a place. I spoke; he spoke. I sputtered and stuttered, managing to tell him our destination. All he could say was, "Muy lejos." He later helped us feed and saddle our horses. I cooked our breakfast but could not persuade him to eat anything. He gave our equipment

a thorough inspection and asked for one of our knives. With water bags filled, Bud Dawson (our burro) loaded to capacity, we hit the trail. The boy rode with us a few miles. Through him, I got the first sense of Mexican hospitality and also my first Spanish lesson.

No breeze, no clouds, no trees tempered the hot sun. Dawson was giving us trouble. I had been leading him with my horse, but when he wanted to stop, he stopped. I couldn't get him to move either by pushing or pulling. I got so mad I slapped him. All he did was blink an eyelash; I got a skinned fist and discovered that I had a larger vocabulary than I had realized. Sam cut a long stick from a mesquite, and as I pulled, Sam did the rest. Dawson, pinned in between our horses, with a rope on one end and a stick on the other, didn't have a chance.

Over a small ridge, we finally spotted the twenty-six kilometer customs station. The officers, none of whom spoke English, checked our papers. Just as we were leaving, one of the officers noticed our saddles and stopped us. Since they were American saddles, we had to pay duty or have a permit from Nuevo Laredo. I had none.

I'll never forgive the Mexican government for making me take those saddles back to the border. I got a ride on a truck and was back in Nuevo Laredo in a matter of a few minutes. Washington, D. C., could take a lesson from the Mexican customs on distributing red tape. After two days I was forced to go to the American consul. He was very bitter on the whole subject. He said, "You haven't seen anything yet; you'll never make it." He did finally

You know, my overseas service in the army consisted of a couple of years in a port in Panama. Thus, I was in contact with some white women all the time. Even so, when I got back to the states, all the girls looked a lot prettier than I remembered. It both pleases and interests me that this tendency seems to have continued, and even now, as at very long last, I return to Rollins, all the girls seem to my admiring eyes to be, on the whole, much prettier than those of my former day. I can't say I mind, for of course it is always an improvement to life to see things one considers beautiful than things one considers ugly. Thank you, girls.

I note that Knowles hall is still full of a conglomeration of classes. Which brings to my mind something that happened once. One sunny day the sign you may now see over the door was put up: **KNOWLES HALL—THOMAS R. CONSTITUTION of STUDENT ASSOCIATION

In accordance with the preamble to the constitution of the Publications Union and section 2 of the By-Laws of the constitution of the Rollins Student Association, this constitution of the Rollins Student Association is herewith published together with the war-time amendments as established last year.

To the end that the best interests of Rollins College be promoted and efficient self-government of the student body be secured, we the student body of Rollins College establish this Constitution.

Article I. Name
The name of this organization shall be The Student Association of Rollins College.

Article II. Purpose
The purpose of the Student Association of Rollins College shall be the representation of the student body in the management of all student activities, the promotion of good student relations, the promotion of law and order in the College.

Article III. Members
Section 1. All students upon payment of the Student Association Fee, shall become members of the Student Association.
Section 2. The members of the Student Association shall be entitled to all privileges extended by the Student Association and the benefits derived from all departments subsidized by it.

Article IV. Officers
The members of the Student Association shall have the right:

(1) To establish a democratic form of government.

(2) To present student opinions in any formation or revision of the curriculum; and to present student opinion at faculty meetings, when the student body has the interests of the student body to be discussed.

(3) Any member or members have the right to organize and petition independently for furtherance of the interests of the student body.

(4) To be elected to the Student-Faculty Disputes Committee.

(5) To freedom of speech and press;

(6) To peaceful assembly.

Article V. Governing Powers

Section 1. The governing powers of the Student Association shall be vested in a Student Council.

Section 2. The Student Council shall be composed of one representative, elected annually from each social fraternity and sorority, four independent representatives, at least one of whom must be a woman; two Student Deans, the Dean of Women and the Dean of Men. The Student Deans shall serve as advisors and shall have no vote.

The student members of the Council shall be regularly elected in the Upper Division or students who have been regularly enrolled for five terms, and eligible to represent Rollins College.

Section 3. Each student group having representation on the Council shall elect one alternate member for every regular member. The alternate member shall alternate with the regular member. A new alternate may be chosen only with the permission of the Council.

Section 4. The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Student Council shall be elected separately from the regular members of the Council. The Secretary shall serve as the liaison between the Council and the Student Association.

Section 5. The Vice-President shall be elected separately from the regular members of the Council. The Vice-President shall serve as the liaison between the Council and the Student Association.

Section 6. The Secretary shall be elected separately from the regular members of the Council. The Secretary shall serve as the liaison between the Council and the Student Association.

Section 7. The Council shall have the power to remove an officer of any student organization for incompetence, if said organization comes under the Council's control.

Section 8. In making recommendations, the Council, composed of the three student officers of the Council, the Student Deans, and the Dean of Women, shall have the power to remove an officer of any student organization for incompetence, if said organization comes under the Council's control.

Section 9. Upon a petition of three regular voting members of the Council, the Council shall have the power to remove an officer of any student organization for incompetence, if said organization comes under the Council's control.

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Section 17. The Council shall have the power to remove an officer of any student organization for incompetence, if said organization comes under the Council's control.

entire Council. The proposed changes must be on the table for one week before final voting can be taken, and must be placed there by a two-thirds vote of the Council.

THE BY-LAWS OF THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION

A. Election of officers of the Student Association shall be held annually on the first week in April. The election shall be conducted by the retiring officers of the Student Council. All candidates for office on the Student Council should already have been Student Council Representatives or have attended meetings one term or more in the past.

B. In case of the resignation of any officer of the Student Association, a special election shall be called by the latter Council to fill the office for the remainder of the term. The officer of authority in the interim in such a case will be President, Vice-President, Secretary, Comptroller, Man and Woman Representative on the Council. This election should be called during the second week after the first regular meeting of the Council following the resignation.

C. Any officer elected to a term of less than one year, shall not disqualify himself or his group from election to the office after the same office has expired.

D. New fraternal organizations may be represented on the Council when they are recognized by the Administration and Faculty or Interfraternity Council.

E. The Constitution and By-Laws of the Student Association shall be published annually in the Sandspur during the first month of the College year.

F. Not later than April 15th, the retiring chairman shall prepare and read a report to the Council on the activities and actions of the Council and Student Association during the past year, including all committees appointed by or operating under the authority of the Student Association. This report, together with any other material or ideas that may be submitted, shall be read to the Council. The report shall be given to the Student Association, shall be given to his successor, who in turn will place the report on the agenda.

G. The following procedure will regulate elections from the Student Association Account.

H. A request for funds from the Student Association shall be presented in person to the new Council the second week in April. The request shall show the budget for the past year, and the probable budget for the coming year.

I. With these requests to consider and any other privileges which they might want to purchase and the estimates for a General Fund in mind, the Council shall make a decision on the probable allotment before the end of the school year.

J. The Council shall allocate funds only in October.

K. The Council shall send someone from its number to attend meeting (without vote) of all departments receiving funds from the Student Association. His report shall show the use of funds during the period and the comparison with the budget submitted by the department when requesting funds. The Council representative shall hold office for one year in departments receiving funds from the Student Association.

L. Each department requesting funds shall then receive notice of their probable allotment before the end of the school year.

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DD. Each department requesting funds shall then receive notice of their probable allotment before the end of the school year.

7. Meetings shall be conducted according to "Roberts' Rules of Order."

8. During the fall term the President of the Student Association shall call a meeting of the Senior Class for the purpose of electing a Senior Committee. All Seniors shall receive the notice of meeting at least 48 hours in advance. The meeting shall be held from the floor. The chairman of this committee shall be elected by the Senior Class. The duty of this committee shall be to make Commencement arrangements, and transact the regular business of the Senior Class.

9. In May the Council shall meet a committee and its chairman shall have the meetings of the Council with the regular members.

10. Elections for Officers for the Freshman class shall be held in accordance with the following regulations:

A. Elections shall be held during the fourth week after registration for the fall term, the date to be set by the Freshman election board.

B. Election shall be conducted by a Freshman election board composed of the following members: The President of the Student Association, the President of the Interfraternity Council, the President of the Phi Kappa Psi Chapter, the President of the Independent, and a member of the faculty of the College who shall be elected by the Freshman class.

C. The place in which the election shall be held shall be designated by the Board.

D. Members of the Freshman class who shall be eligible to vote for officers of the class shall be all entering students who are members of the Freshman Class Committee (these students being designated by the College Administration).

E. The officers of the Freshman Class shall be President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer. These Officers shall take office immediately after the completion of the election of all the Class officers.

F. Election shall be by written ballot. Each candidate shall receive a majority vote to be elected. If on the first ballot no candidate shall receive a majority of the votes cast, a second ballot shall be taken with the two candidates with the greatest number of votes running. In case any vote shall be held for a second candidate on the first ballot, both shall be placed on the second ballot along with the first candidates.

G. If anything shall be done in a manner contrary to the regulations here established, or if there shall be any fraudulent or dishonest voting, or if any formal charge to that effect shall be made to the election board within forty-eight hours after the election, the election shall be declared temporarily voided. The Student Council shall consider the matter at its next meeting and shall decide whether the circumstances were such as to have changed the election results. If the Student Council shall find that the final results have been altered, they shall confirm the ruling of the election board and shall conduct a second election, which shall be conducted in the manner herein stated.

H. Notice of the time and place of the election shall be posted in advance and published in the Sandspur of the Student Association. The election shall be held on the day specified in the notice.

I. The financial affairs of the Student Association shall be under the general direction of the Treasurer of the Student Association, who shall be elected by the Council. The Treasurer shall be assisted by the Comptroller of the Student Association. The duties of the Comptroller shall be to keep a record of the financial affairs of the Student Association; to approve all bills to be paid from the Student Association funds; to prepare the annual budget; to prepare the annual report for the action of the Student Council; to prepare and present

a monthly financial report to the Student Council showing the expenses, income, and relative financial condition of all departments receiving funds from the Student Association; and to make such recommendations to the Student Council as may be necessary concerning the foregoing matters.

All of the above duties shall be subject to the resolutions of the Student Council.

B. The Comptroller shall be elected by the following procedure: Candidates shall submit applications before May 1 to the Treasurer of the Student Association. These applications shall be considered by the Nominating Committee composed of the Treasurer of the Student Association, the Professor of Accounting, the Assistant Treasurer of the College, the retiring President of the Student Association, and the retiring Comptroller. The Candidates must meet the following qualifications:

1. Each candidate shall have taken two terms of Advanced Accounting and received an average grade of at least "B" in all accounting courses taken in Rollins College.

2. Each candidate shall be a member of the Upper Division by the end of the term in which elected.

3. The Nominating Committee shall submit the following points to each other as seem important in making their nomination and shall evaluate their nominees in terms of these qualifications in their reports to the Council making recommendations:

a. Participation in extra-curricular activities;

b. Participation in activities directly qualifying him for the Comptrollership, such as treasurership and business management;

c. General scholastic average;

d. Interest and ability qualifying him for the Comptrollership. The Nominating Committee shall submit a panel of not more than three approved candidates with names and brief biographies to the Student Council at the first meeting after the new officers of the Council shall take office. The Student Council shall then elect the Comptroller from the panel by a majority vote.

C. The Comptroller shall take office at the beginning of the College year in the Fall term and shall hold office until the next Comptroller shall take office in the following Fall.

D. Immediately upon election in the Spring Term, the newly elected Comptroller shall consult with the outgoing Comptroller concerning his work, the financial affairs of the Student Association, and shall advise and aid him in the preparation of the Budget for the next year.

E. The Comptroller shall attend all meetings of the Student Council in the Junior and Senior years and shall present his monthly report during the first ten days of the month following.

F. The Comptroller shall be responsible for keeping permanent records of the financial affairs of the Student Association in such manner that they may be passed on to his successors as a permanent record.

G. The Comptroller shall receive a yearly salary of \$15, to be paid at the end of the year after the final report has been given to the Council.

H. The nominating committee of the Comptroller shall be composed of: The Treasurer of the Student Association, the Professor of Accounting, the Assistant Treasurer of the College, the retiring President of the Student Association, and the retiring Chairman of the Financial Committee.

I. A. The management and direction of the Student Association shall be vested in a Board of Directors composed of the following members: The President of the Student Association, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Secretary of the Alumni Association, the Manager and Assistant

Manager of the Center, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Building Committee, the Comptroller of the Student Association, and the members of the Student Council. The President of the Student Association shall be ex-officio members. The Board of Directors shall meet semi-annually in October and in May to receive reports of its committees, make plans for the Center, determine policies and take such other steps as may be necessary for the efficient handling of the affairs of the Rollins Center. Special meetings may be called by the Chairman at any time, or at the request of the Student Council or any five members of the Board.

The President of the Student Association shall act as Chairman of the Board of Directors. He shall call and preside over all meetings and perform such duties as are usual to the chairman of the board.

B. In the interim between meetings of the Board of Directors, the management and direction of the Rollins Center shall be vested in the Executive Committee, composed of the following members: The Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Building Committee, the Manager and Assistant Manager of the Center, the Comptroller of the Student Association, and the Comptroller of the Student Association. The Executive Committee shall meet monthly on the third week of each month, and at such other times as the Chairman may deem necessary. Special meetings shall be called upon request of any two members. The Comptroller shall act as Secretary of the Executive Committee, and shall keep the minutes of all meetings and shall notify all members of meetings at least 24 hours in advance. The Executive Committee shall choose from among its student members a chairman who shall preside over all meetings and perform such other duties as may from time to time be assigned to him by the Board of Directors.

C. Active management and supervision of the financial affairs of the Center shall be vested in the Finance Committee, composed of the Comptroller of the Student Association, two students to be elected by the Student Council, and the Student Council shall choose from the Student Council members of the Finance Committee a Chairman, who shall preside over and call all meetings, shall serve on the Executive Committee, shall act as Secretary of the Finance Committee, shall keep the minutes and send out notices of all meetings.

D. Active direction and supervision of the non-financial affairs of the Rollins Center shall be vested in a Building Committee composed of three students selected by the Student Council, the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women as ex-officio members. The Council shall choose from among the student members of the Committee a Chairman, who shall call and preside over all meetings, shall serve on the Executive Committee, shall act as Secretary of the Building Committee, shall keep the minutes and send out notices of all meetings.

Rollins, Stetson Clash in Orlando Tonight at 8:15

GWU Beats Tar Eleven, 13-0 In Gala Homecoming Tilt Friday Under Lights

A completely revamped and revitalized Rollins 'Tar' eleven will clash with Brady Cowell's Stetson 'Hatters' tonight in the Greater Orlando Stadium with kickoff time set at 8:15. The 'Tars', slight pre-game favorites in the local bookie houses, despite their setback last week at the hands of the George Washington 'Colonials', view their second game of the season tonight with much concern.

While the 'Colonials' were out-running, out-passing and out-gaining the 'Tars' last Friday, Stetson was playing host to a powerful Alabama State Teachers' college eleven from Troy in the DeLand stadium and bowled the 'Red Wave' over with a final 15-12 score paced by Stetson's Brinsington and Davies in the scoring division. Traditional rivalry will be present more than ever tonight as the two schools resume their inter-collegiate grid relations under the lights in Orlando.

Head coach Jack McDowall ran his charges through a series of drills Monday and Tuesday afternoons that concentrated on sharpening the offensive patterns in both the line and backfield, and in ironing out the numerous rough spots that Friday night's battle disclosed.

George Washington took advantage of two costly fumbles in last week's tilt and battered their way to a 13-0 victory. Twice in the second period, Rollins passers faded deep in their own territory for desperation passes and fumbled each time, setting up both 'Colonial' scores.

The Blue and Gold will be out there 33 strong in their new uniforms awaiting the invasion of Brady Cowell's highly touted eleven from DeLand. And there's not one hit of cockiness in the McDowall squad. Stetson earlier in the season looked like a royal pushover, but after their win last week over a tough Alabama State Teachers' college at Troy, 15-12, the McDowallmen are beginning to wonder, it's going to be a hard fought battle all the way tonight with Rollins on the favored end by a few important points.

Practice sessions at Harper-Shepherd field this week indicated that coaches McDowall, Justice and Waite were concentrating on sharpening the 'Tars' offensive pattern and bring out the rough spots that the movies made of the GWU encounter disclosed. Wartel film productions handled the filming of last Friday's initial battle and produced a very interesting play-by-play account for the coaches and players to study. The usual color and excitement that predominates in all Rollins tilts will be on tap in the stadium during game time tonight, and we hope to view a solid Rollins turnout from the press box.

NOTES BETWEEN THE NOTES:

There's little we can add to the comments around campus in re: last weeks GWU tussle. It was just a case of opening night jitters versus an experienced eleven that the Saturday previous trounced a powerful Merchant Marine squad 38-17. George Washington rolled into Orlando Thursday noon on the streamliner and quartered at the nearby Angebilt before running through a series of light drills in preparation for the big game. There was nothing cocky in their camp prior to the game. Ed Cook of the Washington News and Merle Whittles of the Washington Star told us during the half in the press box that there was little guynety on the ACL that brought the 'Colonials' down Thursday. They were plenty worried about the 'Tars', since we were a mystery team as far as they were concerned.

The mystery is solved now, and we think Rollins has a good chance to take the remaining games on the schedule if they don't get careless again. When mentioning the GWU game it would be far better to forget the statistics. They were that bad!!! In rushing, GWU outgained us 144 to 23 yards with Don Frazier and Calvin Peacock leading the 'Tars'. First downs were 8 to 3 which wasn't too bad, but the passing department is where it was all one-sided. In twelve attempted passes we completed three for 17 yards while the 'Colonials' completed six for 64 yards.

The second quarter was the stumbling block for the 'Tars' when two Rollins passers faded back deep in their own territory and gambled on passing instead of running. Both fumbled and George Washington recovered setting up the two scores in the battle. The fourth play of the second quarter showed the potential power and ability of the Rollins squad when Dick Darty shot an aerial pass to Orville Thomas who dashed across the goal for an apparent touchdown only to have it called back for an illegal-use-of-hands penalty. And that was it as far as the 'Tars' were concerned Friday night. Tonight's fracas should be an entirely different story . . . we hope so!!
