## "STAGE" DOOR ACCLAIMED BY LOCAL CRITIC

"Stage Door" which is playing its week at the Annie Russell is one of the most entertaining shows seen on stage and off, that has hit Rollins in a long time. Starring a cast of 31 students, directed by Edward Bailey, the play was written by George F. Kaufman and Ed. A. Ferber and is the story of the typical struggle of actresses to attain success on Broadway. The plot, designed by William Dorrell and built by the members of the stage craft class, are duplicated in the interior of a girls' club in New York and contribute greatly to the production. Dick Hill was stage manager, assisted by Patry and Lynn Lahr as well as a large stage crew.

The disappointment experienced by the cast when it was learned that the Rollins Dangle would not be able to come, was quickly suggested by admiration for the beautiful job which Virginia Estel had in taking her place. Ginny is vivacious and lovable as Terry and lives the role of the vivacious and unfathomable which it required. Lary Maunz as Jean furnished the necessary contrast with a capable performance as a beautiful but slightly mysterious Hollywood actress. Bill Barker and Jimmy Lahr, who star as the male leads give the parts the proper touch in their usual debonair manner. Mary Delano as the comely head had performed a satisfactory job in this season.

The delightful peculiarity of the play is that there is not a rotten note in the crowd. Each role, no matter how small, is done with care and the complete flow is wonderful. Character parts done by Beverly Carter, Joanne Staschul, Jerry Hinkler, Derek Dunn-Banks, Meg Smith and Fred Taylor deserve particular notice. Perfectly cast were Joe Whitford, Carol Grady, and Virginia Barr who furnished a large share of the comedy interest. Bob Davis, Ken Fenderson and Chap DeBenedictis were their usual sidekick allies with a new cast mate, Nancy Walker.

The remainder of the cast furnished an equally charming variety of each added her own particular touch to the picture. Carolyn Alford, the dancer, Lee Gilroy, the pianist, Susan Tate, Rhoda Knight, Tony Drinkwater, Percy Crane, Ann Banchus, Betty Garrett, Cynthia Crawford, and Nan Van Zile as actresses. Elinore Nelson and Betty Pettigrew both furnished excellent incidents.

Dick Hill and Cameron McCarrall did excellent work back stage and were authentic in their walk-on roles.

"Stage Door" is the kind of show that is terrific entertainment but is enjoyed more when produced as "every one" both from the standpoint of the audience and the actors. But I'm sure the cast as well as the audience will look forward eagerly to the "next one".

Berliners in the Western Sector will vote Sunday for city officials. The Russians have refused to allow the citizens in their sector to vote and have announced that they will not recognize the election returns. It is expected that after the new officials have taken office that Berlin will have two separate city governments.

Mrs. Chiang, wife of China's Generalissimo is planning a trip to the United States to seek aid for her country. And President Truman has revealed that the Generalissimo has written him stating that U.S. blunders at Yalta oblige the United States to aid China at the present time.

Dr. Sun Fo, China's new Prime Minister, has asked for a general such as MacArthur to map out and direct China's campaign against the Communists.

The heart attack of Green Presidential Theodosius Sophocles promises a new crisis in Greece.

The Federal Security Agency predicted that employment will remain high well into 1949. And Robert C. Goetz, director of the Bureau of Employment Security, reported that unemployment during October was below 2% of the civilian labor force.

Needless to mention first that the spirit of the Homecoming Weekend enveloped most of Winter Park, including the police department and many town merchants.

## TARS and FEATHERS

I read last week that Rollins needed something like 150 grand a year to defray operating expenses. Now I am going to suggest a good way of raising this sum. It isn't an original idea—it comes up every year for various reasons, and every year it is tossed in the waste-basket as impractical. I refer to men's varsity basketball at Rollins. I say that basketball can be put in this category with very little expense. I say that it would be good from financial and advertising standpoints.

Rollins is a small school and it operates on a slender margin. It has a football team but from a financial angle it isn't a paying proposition, for several reasons. Football requires many scholarships—basketball doesn't. Football requires much medical care—basketball doesn't. Football seasons are limited to 10 games—basketball to 30.

Adolph Rupp put basketball on a big-time basis at the University of Kentucky. He did it by giving good scholarships and getting the right type players. I believe that Rollins could put basketball on the same plane as it has put tennis. Look at Shirley Fry, Nancy Morrison, Jean Clarke, Doris Jensen, Gardiner Larsen, Buddy Behrens, and all the other tennis stars who are here now or who have been here in the past. Most of them came here because of the tennis reputation of the school. Rollins has become a big-time tennis school. By the same token, it can become a big time in the basketball world.

All that is needed for a starter is a few brick houses. If somebody would set a match to Red Hall, we would automatically have ground space for it. Gymnasiums are relatively cheap—concrete blocks, flooring, and a couple of steel beams and there you are. For \$30,000 you could put up a modern gym with a seating capacity of 3,000 cash customers. With the gym we'd have to have a team. Give me Art Swacker, Pete Pava, Harry Hancock, Harvard Cox, Paul Klusefelter, Oscar Cashwell, Ed Metcalf, and several others around campus and I'll guarantee you that Rollins could tame just about any Florida team. When we had won about 18 games in a row, the new field house would be packed every night. If we played 26 home games that would run about \$180,000 a year. Chew on that a while.

For those of you who claim my scheme is impractical, I reply that football is probably the most impractical sport that Rollins could have found. Look at the record, say five feathered friends and you will see what I mean. Losing tennis do not pay off, Central Florida is not big enough to give financial aid and comfort to a college football team. The picture is mighty poor.

I do not mean to imply that football should be discontinued at Rollins. I think that football is as much of a college life as anything else but I also believe that basketball is just as important. There is a little town up in the hills of Kentucky which has nothing but a good basketball team. There aren't but a or 5 hundred people in the town if you counted the jail birds, but when there is a basketball game their gym is packed to the rafters. The people pour out of those hills and their gym holds 2,000 people. So, Good Friends, if you want to pull these crackers out of their graves and create a little spirit, then get you a basketball team.

I invite criticisms and/or suggestions from my readers.
