Synthetic Success

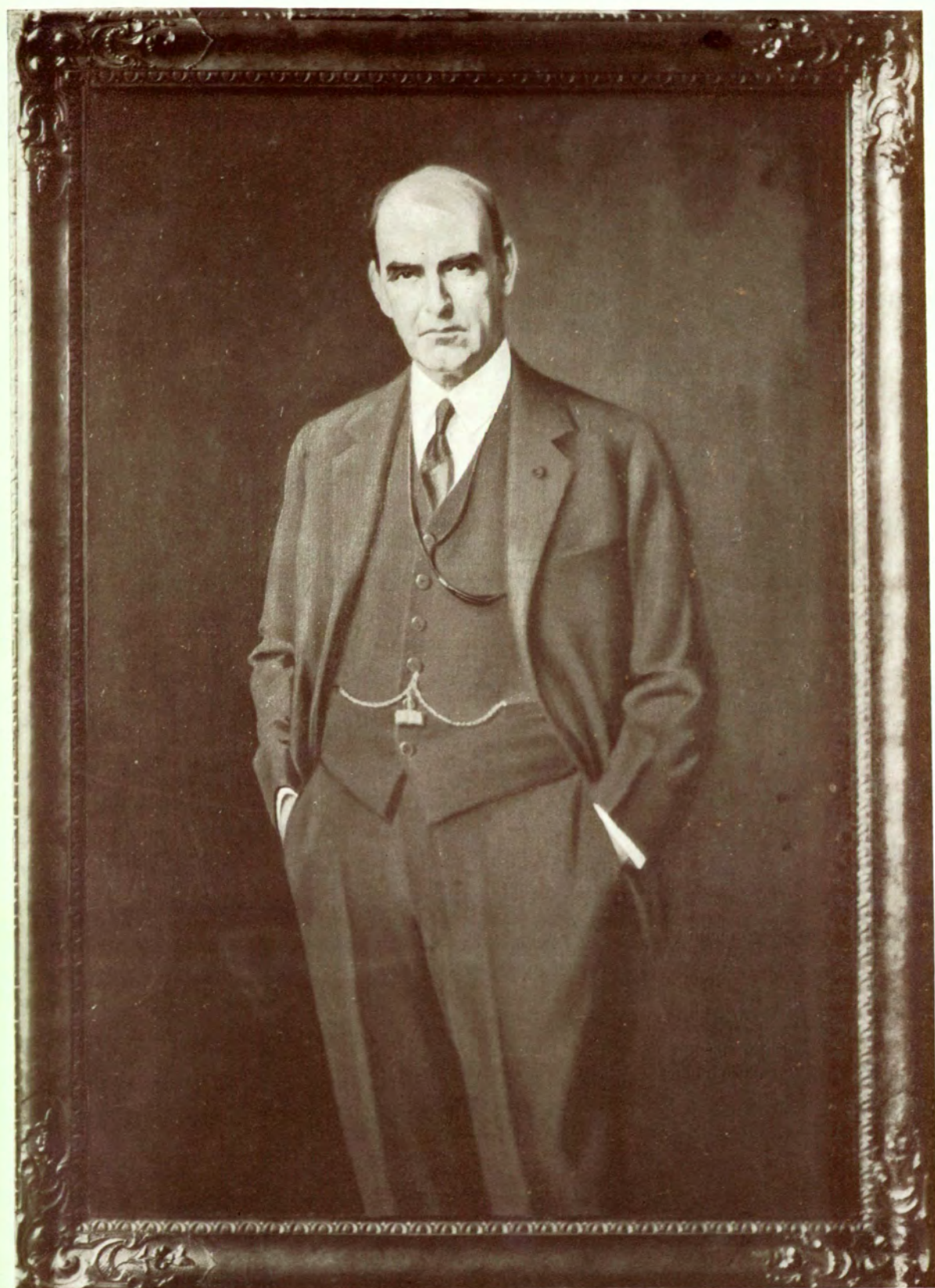

TO the Class of 1930 sincere congratulations and best wishes for the future.

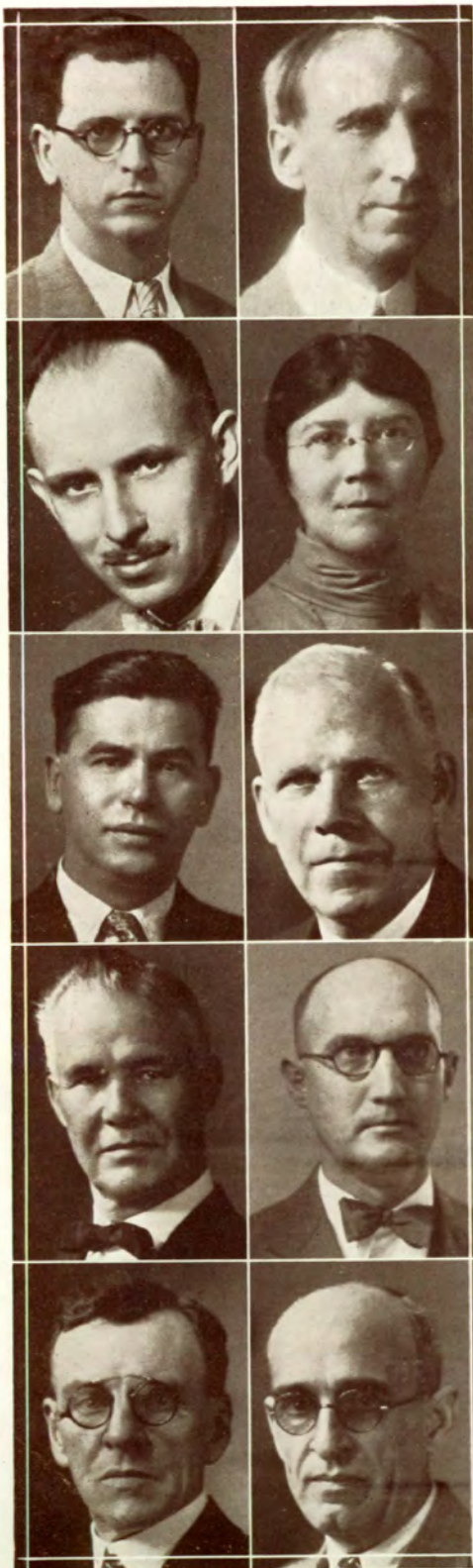
You have been splendid in aiding the college to shape itself toward the ideal expressed by Doctor Holt, a goal which could not be reached without the co-operation and effort of the student body.

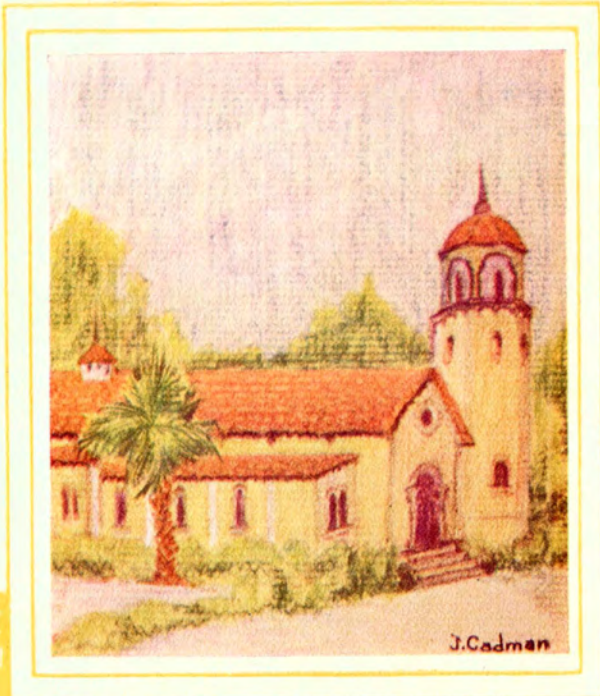
Why Anti-Fraternity Sentiment?

ANTI-FRATERNITY sentiment has often been engendered by those who have a superficial knowledge of the fraternity system, those who have become embittered or those who have a bigoted idea of democracy. Careful investigation of the subject proves that the scholarship of the fraternity man or woman is not lower than that of those who do not belong to Greek-letter societies—oftentimes it is higher. Snobbishness may characterize an individual but seldom an organization. The principle of campus democracy is instilled into the freshman; the emphasis on that very quality is supplied by the national officers; the very strength of the organization is tested by its attitude to those within the circle. Careless conduct of a member never passes unrebuked; careless conduct of a chapter would mean instant action and penalty from those in authority. The distorted view of sorority life gained through sensational articles, cheap magazines, lurid novels, and melodramatic movies is dispelled by the presentation of indisputable facts of sorority supervision and training, and by a practical demonstration of the value of constructive chapter criticism and of the promulgation of high ideals and special service.

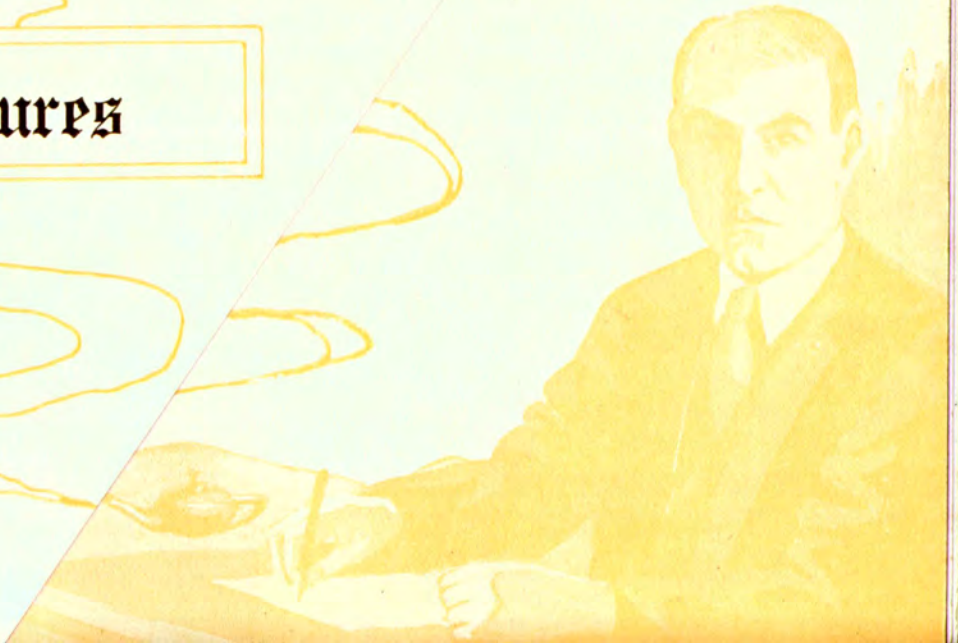
Fraternities will disappear only when the undergraduate member does not desire to join them. They are necessary and valuable on the college campus; they help men and women to broaden their outlook on life; they give united support to college traditions, institutions, and enterprises; they receive in return the friendly co-operation of college authorities. A recent article upon the fraternity system states: "There are today about 6,000 such fraternity groups that furnish home life to more than 200,000 young men and women. There are fifty-seven fraternities and more than forty sororities national in scope that exercise a control over their chapters that is wholesome, and have a code of morals, and ethics running through their rituals inculcating the highest lessons of right thinking and nobility of life."

A sorority is a compact, well-organized, wide-spread body transacting its own business, negotiating its own loans, investing its own money, building its own houses; of necessity, a chapter member must receive a business education which is invaluable. Aside from the practical advantages, the main purpose of the sorority is to impart to the college girl the highest ideals; to grant her the truest of friendships; to bestow upon her the benefits of the entire Greek-letter world; to interpret for her the beauty of knowledge.

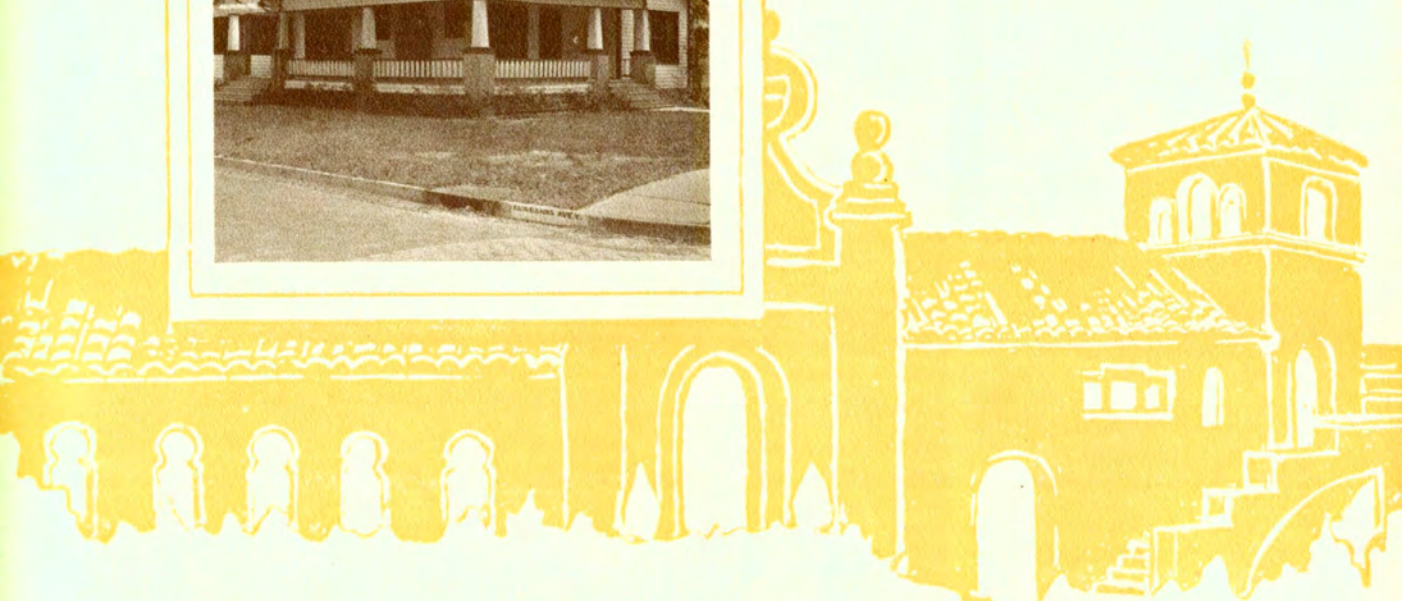
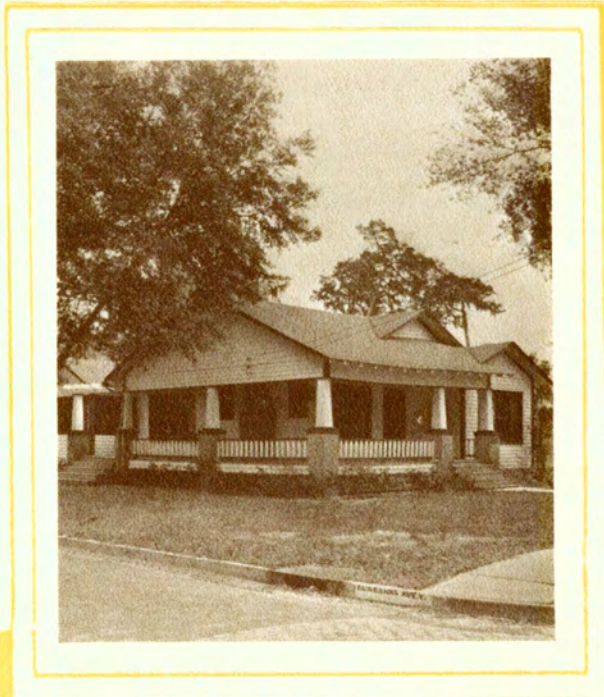

Rollins, a Modern Bologna

IN my report three years ago to the Alumni Association I told of a discovery. I had visited our beloved Alma Mater and found the old girl kicking over the traces at an astonishing rate. Recitations had been stopped forever. The lecture system was gone. There were no longer any fixed examinations. As a result of the Two-hours Conference Plan, Rollins had gone far toward abolishing the classic definition—"Student: One who does not study"—and the time-honored game of outwitting the professor, which we played with youthful gusto in my day, was at an end, for the professor had ceased to be a boss and became a servant.

Now I am free to say that if our beloved Alma Mater had suddenly bobbed her hair and shortened her dress, the transformation could hardly have astonished me more. What skittishness—in a lady of her years. A new college with everything to gain and nothing to lose, might have risked it without startling one so much, but to see dignified old Rollins tightening her black bonnet-strings, re-adjusting her hoop-skirt, and cutting loose like a flapper was—well, a sensation, to say the least, and so it seemed to outsiders, the country over.

Have patience with those outsiders. They don't know half—nor did I, until recently. I know, of course, that this *enfant terrible* among colleges was in reality well on in years, but it had never occurred to me that the Rollins idea—in its essence, at least—was eight centuries old. It is, I know because I have lately had access to an outline of the history of the University of Bologna, an institution which might be termed the Rollins College of the Middle Ages, just as the Rollins of today might be termed a Little Bologna.

In essence, the Rollins idea originated at Bologna, most ancient of European universities. There, just as in Winter Park, the professor was the servant, not the boss, of the students.

At Rollins, this happy arrangement has been brought about by the revolutionary horse-sense of President Holt, but at Bologna it developed naturally, for in the beginning the University of Bologna consisted entirely of students, with no professors at all. The students came there because it had got talked around in Europe that there were books in Bologna and that anybody who was in earnest about it would be allowed to study the books. Later, when older students had been at the books long enough to know them thoroughly, these older students found that they could turn a penny by helping out beginners, and then started the evolution of the professor.

At the University of Paris, which opened shortly after the University of Bologna did, the professors organized. Once organized, they ran the whole show. At Bologna, however, the students got the drop on the professors, and it was the students who organized, the students who ran the show. From the first, the professor was the servant, not the boss, of the students.



At the head of the students was a rector, himself an undergraduate, and the rector had the right of hiring and firing the professors. When he took on a new man, he made him deposit cash as a guarantee of good behavior. At the close of the student year, professors received their money back, minus fines—quite a string of them.

If a professor came late to a lecture, he was fined. If he skipped a chapter, he was fined. If his course failed to cover the ground in the stipulated time, he was fined. If he kept on teaching after the end of the hour, any student who failed to get up and walk out was fined. When a professor wanted to leave town, he not only had to get the rector's permission, he had to put up a special bond, in money, to insure his return. The year 'round, he was required to keep the floors swept and the windows mended, and when a newly elected rector rode in grandeur through the streets, the professors tagged along behind like captive barbarians in a Roman Cæsar's triumph.

This system, which remained in force at Bologna for close on three centuries, was a little too rough on the professors, I admit. I am far from advising Rollins undergraduates to treat "golden personalities" like that. Also I am aware that the situation at Bologna was at certain points very different from ours. Instead of being adolescents, the students at Bologna were grown men, some of them as much as forty years old—old enough to shoulder a lot of responsibility, one would say. But—albeit unconsciously—Rollins has borrowed Bologna's main idea, that is, of making the professor the servant, not the boss, of the students. So, in very real sense, it is an eight-hundred-year-old flapper who is now scandalizing the conventional educators; for, essentially, Rollins is today very much what Bologna was eight centuries ago—namely, an institution of learning run in the interest, not of the faculty, but of the students.

This, then, is the discovery that I want to report today. It delights me. Better still, it is coming to delight many an outsider. That is why Rollins was made a beneficiary of the Hubert Fund. Also, it is why Rollins has received more notice in the magazines this year than any other six colleges put together. President Holt has put Rollins on the map—in the limelight, too, and she ranks today as beyond question the most interesting educational experiment station in America.

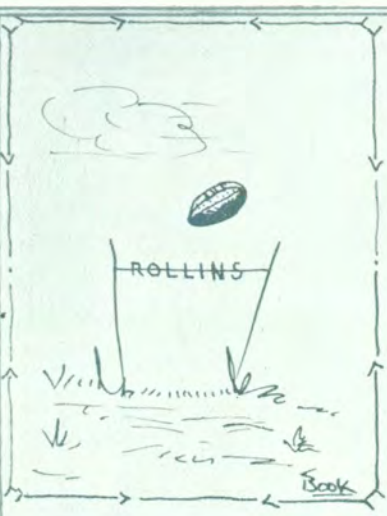

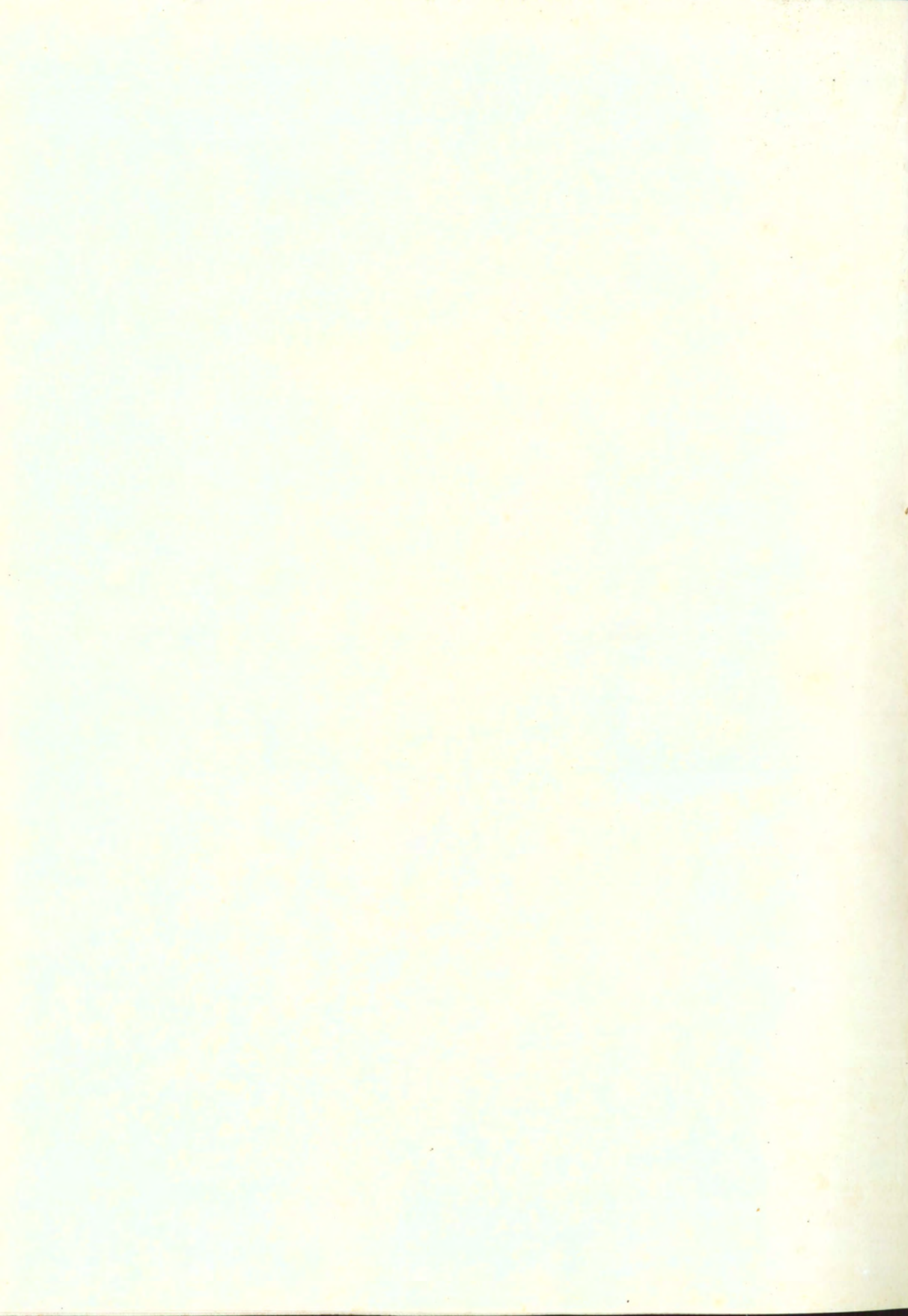
