## 'Miracle Worker' Slated Next ART Production

The current Rollins Players production at the Annie Russell Theatre is *THE MIRACLE WORKER*, by William Gibson, to be presented Jan. 31 through Feb. 4. Rollins student night is Jan. 30.

The story is that of Helen Keller, the drama of a young woman's dedication versus a deaf-blind child's obstinacy. "Is it possible to teach a deaf-blind child half of what an ordinary child learns?" asks Helen's mother. The task is not an easy one and the story is both terrifying and beautiful.

Annie Sullivan, played by Chris Forrest, is Helen's teacher. Nearly blind herself, she has developed a fierce dedication during her young life, which, combined with her natural Irish temper, make her the only person in the world capable, of the task which faces her.

One of the greatest obstacles in Annie's path is the overbearing love Helen's parents have for their afflicted daughter. Mrs. Keller, played by Chris Kelly,

cannot resist her mother's instinct to spoil the child that would seem to need love more than anything else.

Her husband, played by Bill McNulty, does his authoritative best to keep peace in the household. His son, James, played by Patrick Molloy, tries desperately to gain his father's love and respect, he too learns a great deal from Annie. Other members of the cast include Roger Miller as Annie's teacher and Nancy Butler as Aunt Ev.

Helen Keller is being played by Sandra Arnold. She is 11 years old and is in the 6th grade at South Seminole Elementary School in Casselberry. She studies dramatics with Doreen Jones, although this is her first actual experience on the stage. Sandy is also a member of the Girl Scouts and is taking piano lessons.

## Counselors Confer At Rollins Today

Friday, January 27, marks the beginning of the Eighth Annual Rollins Conference. The highlight of the conference will be the presence of James Cass, education editor of the *Saturday Review*. Mr. Cass has become particularly renowned since the publication of *Comparative Guide to American Colleges* which he and Max Birabaum wrote in 1964. This book is not merely a description of all accredited American four-year colleges, but is a true evaluation of each institution. The book provides information about campus life including cultural and social opportunities as well as academic environment. The differentiating factor between this book and others on colleges is that it evaluates the quality of the school, thus giving the prospective student on insight into the college as a whole. The conference is sponsored by the Rollins Admissions Office

for secondary school officials who counsel students in selecting an institution of higher learning. There will be fifty guests at Rollins this week-end from seventeen different states. The purpose of such a conference is "to arrange a week-end of activity and program during which these counselors get to know Rollins students, faculty, and curriculum." Of particular interest this year, will be the panel discussion Saturday of the New Curriculum. The essence of the week-end is the new knowledge the counselors will gain about Rollins due to their close contact with the students as well as the faculty. Student guides will be provided for campus tours Friday afternoon, and then Friday night the counselors will have an opportunity to question Rollins students on all aspects of campus life.

## Proposed Changes Call For Government Revamping

The Rollins government and judicial systems have become antiquated with respect to the large advances made by the academic educational programs of this college. To stay abreast with the ever improving academic endeavors the Rollins students, through their legislative and judicial branches have accepted the challenge to improve these systems, and are prepared to meet it by presenting their reorganization proposals to the student body, faculty and administration.

This is found to be not strictly local endeavor, but a national trend. The suggested improvements are not of a radical nature, but are a mature and educational approach to the problem. Three nationally respected organizations - the American Association of University Professors, the American Council on Education, and the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges - have recently reached the following conclusions:

"... the changes now occurring in the status of American Students have plainly outdistanced the analysis by the educational community, and an attempt to define the situation without thorough study might prove unfair to student interests, and students do not in fact presently have a significant voice in the government of colleges and universities..."

However, this same report went on to state that, "When students in American colleges and universities desire to participate responsibly in the government of the institution they attend, their wish should be recognized as a claim to opportunity both for educational experience and for involvement in the affairs of their college or university."

The immediate and pressing reasons for the reorganization were stated from several viewpoints in the December 2, 1966, issue of *The Sandspur*.

The diagram which appears in this issue is used to illustrate the organizational structure of the

proposed student government reorganization:

Mechanically speaking, the first goal to be obtained through reorganization is the removal of the long delay in transacting business between the faculty and the students. The second goal is the coordination of the purpose of the student activities through the newly created House.

The major changes to our present system are as follow: (1) The creation of the Council (read Article V, Section 2. of the constitution and Article III, Section 2. of the By-Laws.) composed of students, faculty and administration, this body has no legislative power, but can approve or reject legislation passed by the House. The Council will help communicate advice and knowledge from

the faculty and administration to be used for an improved Rollins.

(2) The patterning of the House is similar to the form of our Federal House. The newly reapportioned Legislature which will become the House, will remain the same in membership, but its legislative powers will be those listed in Article V, Section I, Subsection B of the Constitution. The reapportionment of the Legislature as found in Article V, Section I, paragraphs I and 2 of the constitution was passed by the students and faculty this fall. Many of the unofficial duties the legislature has assumed in the past have now been formalized in Article II, Section 2 of the By-

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## Court Chairman Reveals New Judicial Procedures

At the beginning of the school year the Lower Court met and decided that changes in the structure of the courts had to be made. We feel that the jurisdiction of all cases should be in the hands of the Lower Court. If a student is to be dismissed from this institution, for reasons other than academic, the students should be the disciplining body that asks this student to leave. We believe that the juniors and seniors that serve on the Court are mature enough to handle any type of case that may come before them. At present, the court can place on a student any sentence except dismissal or suspension. If the court has original jurisdiction in all cases we would also like to be able to place any and all penalties.

Many students have asked me several questions concerning these changes. I shall attempt to answer some of these questions.

QUESTION: What is the major change in the Court Structure and why?

ANSWER: a.) The major change in structure is the formation of the Faculty Court which replaces the Upper Court. The court is an appellate court which

will revise the entire operation of the Student Association. In rare instances will a case be referred to the Faculty from the Lower Court. The present make-up of the Lower Court will remain the same where as the Faculty Court will consist of five faculty members.

b.) The Lower Court will hear any case which breaks a campus code or "R" book regulation and requires disciplinary action. In the past a case could be referred to any disciplinary body, but now it must be heard by the Lower Court.

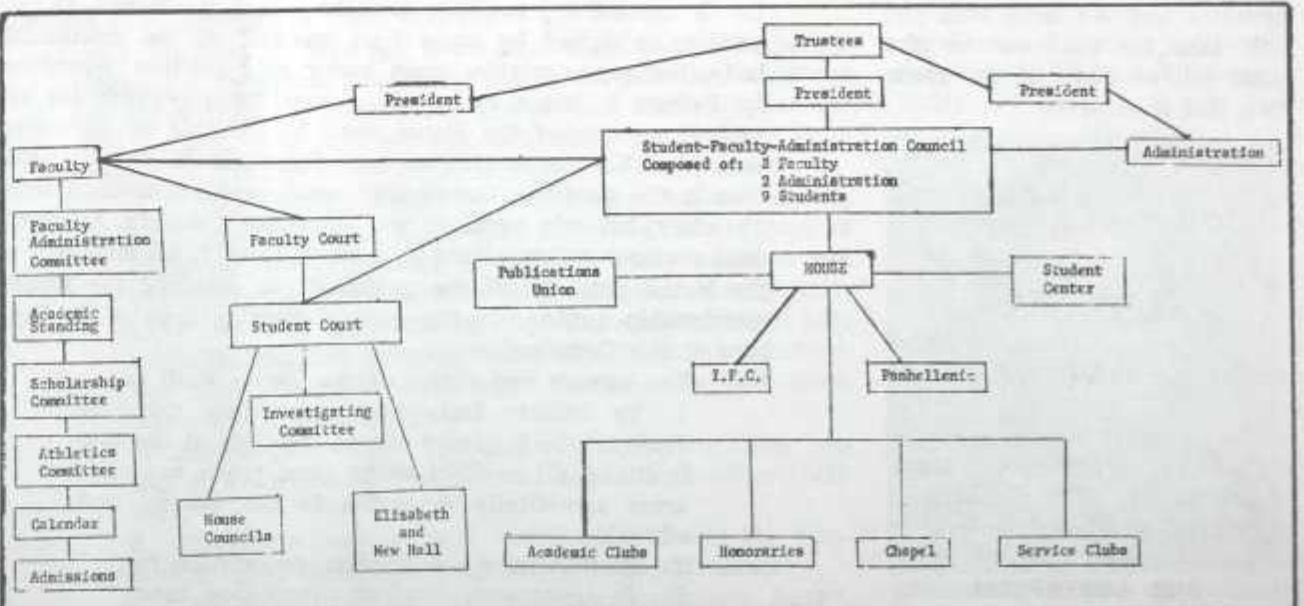
QUESTION: What about the privacy of the individual?

ANSWER: The confidentiality of the case is kept strictly between the members of the court and not at anytime will they disclose what has been said in the court room. The case will probably be investigated by a member of the court.

QUESTION: Why does the Lower Court want to have original jurisdiction in all cases?

ANSWER: In the past the case could have been referred by the appropriate Dean to one of the following a) Upper, b) Lower Court, c) House councils, or d)

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## Editor's Note

After a term of work and deliberation the Student Council Reorganization Committee has released its report. The report consists of a completely revised constitution and set of by-laws for the student association. The committee, appointed by the student council at the beginning of the year, was charged with the task of updating, improving, and codifying the constitution and by-laws of the Student Association. In practice this meant that many outdated and superfluous regulations were eliminated; at the same time several of the recently adopted rules of procedure were incorporated formally into the written constitution. Thus the end product is an up-to-date, clear, and accurate presentation of the rules governing Rollins student government.

More importantly, however, this committee has formulated a complete and far-reaching reorganization of student government. These changes will affect almost every area of student activity. Not only have the forms and procedures been altered, but the basic philosophy of student government has been modified.

The members of the reorganization committee were: Tom Sacha, Tim Brown, Sue Probasco, Leslie White, Bob Gustafson, Bill Blackburn, Dave Lord, Jud Curtis, Fred Gittes, and Norm Friedland.

Final action and ratification of the new constitution and by-laws will be considered by the Student Council at its next regular meeting on Monday night. A two-thirds majority vote will be required for approval.

Article III of the Constitution of the Rollins Student Association requires that notice of proposed amendments to the constitution appear in the college newspaper before final consideration. Thus, the *Sandspur* publishes the entire text of the new constitution and by-laws.

This explains the reason that several of the usual *Sandspur* features do not appear this week.

Also, at this time the *Sandspur* is publishing the Sections of the Rollins Code of Student Conduct that deal with the Administration of the Code. Specifically, these Sections outline the methods and procedures by which penalties for violating the Student Code will be determined. Like the Constitution and By-Laws of the Student Association, these sections of the code, as Tom Sacha explains elsewhere, have undergone vast change.

We do not expect this to be interesting or exciting reading; nevertheless this is important because these regulations form the laws for student government at Rollins. If the Student Association is to function effectively as a representative of the student body, every student needs to understand how student government operates and we hope that you will take the time out to give what follows some of the attention that it deserves.

# THE CONSTITUTION OF THE ROLLINS STUDENT ASSOCIATION

To promote the best interests of the student of Rollins College and to provide efficient self government of the student body in accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws of the College, we the students of Rollins College establish this constitution of Rollins College.

## ARTICLE I Purpose

The name of this organization shall be the Rollins Student Association. Its purpose shall be two-fold. It shall promote responsibility among the students and provide a means for the promotion and execution of effective self discipline in all areas of student life. It shall provide a sound, democratic governmental organization which will direct the academic and social aspect of college life not otherwise specifically delegated to the faculty and administration by the Charter or the By-Laws of the Administration.

## THE ROLLINS PLEDGE

I hereby pledge to uphold the provisions of this student association in all social situations and scholastic endeavors which might in any way reflect upon Rollins College, and to be individually responsible for adhering to the rulings of this body; and to execute effectively the purpose stated above, I pledge to make serious consideration at times of elections.

Furthermore, to the best interest of education, I pledge to utilize continuously the facilities of the Rollins Student Association to enhance the academic and social atmosphere of the College.

## ARTICLE II Membership

Section 1. All regularly enrolled students, upon payment of the Student Association fee shall become members of the Student Association.

Section 2. The members of the Student Association shall be entitled to all the privileges extended by the Student Association and the benefits derived from all departments subsidized by it.

## ARTICLE III Amendments

Any proposed amendment to the Constitution or By-Laws shall be submitted to the House in writing. The proposed amendment shall automatically be tabled for at least one week; furthermore, notice of the proposed amendment shall appear in the college newspaper before final consideration. A two-thirds vote is necessary to pass a proposed amendment to the Constitution or By-Laws in the House.

Any proposed amendment to the Constitution or By-Laws, after being approved by a two-thirds vote in the House must be approved by a majority vote in the Council.

## ARTICLE IV Meetings

Official meetings of the Student Association shall be called by the President of the Student Association when he deems it necessary and proper or upon petition of 10 per cent of the student body. There shall be no set quorum at Student Association meetings.

## ARTICLE V Government

The governing powers of the Student Association shall be vested in the Council, House, and Student and Faculty Courts.

Section 1. The power to initiate legislation shall be vested in the House.

A. The House shall be composed, during the fall term, of one representative for every fifty students included in a social group, the independent men boarders, the independent women boarders, the freshmen men, the freshmen women, two representatives-at-large for the independent day students (one man and one woman), the non-voting class presidents, and the non-voting chairman of the Women's Rules committee as elected by the chairman of the House Councils. Freshmen representatives shall be apportioned equitably by floor in their respective halls. If, in any case above, the remaining fraction after dividing by fifty is more than twenty-five, the respective group will be entitled to an additional representative.

At the beginning of the winter term, the House shall be reapportioned so as to compensate for fraternity and sorority pledging. The apportionment will be the same as in the fall, except that only independent freshmen men boarders and independent freshman women boarders will be represented on Student Council, as freshman pledges will then be included in the new apportionment figures for fraternities and sororities.

Any social group may petition its representative to vote for or against any measure brought before the House. If this petition is signed by more than one-half of the petitioning body, the representative must honor said petition accordingly. Failure to honor said petition constitutes grounds for recall. A quorum of the House shall be one-half of its voting members. All representatives have the right to express opinions in the meetings. Guests may speak upon recognition from the chair, but only members may introduce a motion. All meetings are open unless closed by a majority vote. All members of the House must fulfill the qualifications required for House membership outlined in the general election laws of the By-laws of this Constitution.

B. The powers and duties of the House shall be:

1. To initiate legislation concerning rules of conduct which govern the college life of the students in all matters other than those academic areas specifically delegated to the faculty and administration.
2. To determine the Student Association fee.
3. To appropriate Student Association funds.

4. To approve by a majority vote all appointments delegated to the Council and/or the Speaker of the House in the Constitution or By-Laws of the Student Association.

5. To dismiss all members of the House missing more than three meetings during the term of office.

6. To convene itself upon petition of three representatives.

7. To make By-Laws and amend the Constitution.

C. Powers and duties of officers of the House:

1. The Speaker of the House shall be elected by and from the members of the House at the last meeting of the House in the spring term. The Speaker shall preside over all sessions of the House; call meetings of the House to present legislation passed by the House to the Council for approval; with the approval of the members of the House, appoint the chairmen of all standing committees from among the members of the House (with the possible exception of the chairman of the Finance Committee), a voting member on the Publications Union, a Parliamentarian to assist the Speaker, a voting member on the Union Board of Directors.

2. The Secretary of the House shall be elected by and from the members of the House at the last meeting of the House in the spring term. The Secretary shall keep and publish the minutes of all Association and House meetings, serve as corresponding secretary for the House, and serve as a member of the Standards Committee.

Section 2. The final legislative power of the Student Association be vested in the Student-Faculty-Administration Council.

A. The Student-Faculty-Administration Council shall be composed of 14 members: 3 faculty members to be elected by the faculty for one year terms, 2 Administration members to be appointed by the President of the College for one year terms, and 9 student members to be elected in accordance with the By-Laws of the Student Association.

B. The power and duties of the Council shall be:

1. To act upon all legislation passed by the House.
2. To return to the House for approval any amendments to legislation passed by the House.
3. To give to the House the objections of the Council to any legislation passed by the House which is rejected by the Council.
4. To make into college law any rule, regulation, amendment, or other legislation passed by both the House and the Council.
5. To make all appointments, with the approval of the House, not specifically granted to the House or otherwise provided for.
6. To convene itself upon petition of three Council members.
7. To meet at least twice a month.

C. Powers and duties of the officers of the Council:

1. The President of the Council shall be the student member of the Council receiving the greatest vote in accordance with the election procedures outlined in the By-Laws of the Rollins Student Association. The President of this Council shall preside over all meetings of the Student-Faculty-Administration Council; shall be the President of the Student Association and as such represent and speak for the student body when the necessity arises; shall preside over all Student Association meetings; shall vote only in the case of a tie; shall draw up a list of nominees to fill council appointments; serve as a member of the Student-Faculty-Trustee Committee; call meetings of the Council & Student Association.

2. The Secretary of the Council shall be elected by and from the members of the Council during first meeting after the election of the student members of the Council. The Secretary shall keep and publish the minutes of all Council meetings, serve as corresponding secretary for this Council, and serve as a member of the Standards Committee.

Section 3. The judicial powers of the Student Association shall be vested in the courts of the Judicial System.

A. The Lower Court shall consist of a Chairman appointed by the Council with the approval of the House, who shall vote only in case of a tie, eight members (representing at least two classes) appointed annually by the Council with the approval of the House, and the non-voting Dean of Men and Dean of Women.

1. The Lower Court shall have original jurisdiction in all cases.

2. The duties of the Lower Court shall be:

- a. To receive and process all notices of rule infractions.
- b. To hear and decide all cases of violation of the rules of the college and to take appropriate disciplinary action.
- c. To impeach and try officers and officials of the Student Association on the presentation of charges in writing by three members of the House or Council to the Chairman of the Lower Court.
- d. To file under case number the results of all trials and to make these files available to the faculty, the trustees, to anyone who

has been directly affected by the court ruling, and anyone who has been given written permission to see the Court records by the Chairman of Lower Court or the Student Deans.

3. The duties of the Chairman of the Lower Court shall be to serve as a member of the Student-Faculty-Trustee Committee, the Standards Committee, to make all necessary referrals, to set the calendar, and to attend all legislative sessions and to be a non-voting member of the Rules Committee.

4. The duties of the Clerk shall be to record and to file the results of all court actions and decisions.

B. The Faculty Court shall consist of four faculty members elected for alternating (2) two year terms by the faculty. The Dean of the College shall act as chairman of the Court and shall vote only in case of a tie.

1. The duties of the Faculty Court shall be:

a. To review the overall operation and coordination of the Student Association and its communications with the faculty either upon its own initiative or upon request.

b. To review all rule changes, laws and constitutional amendments.

c. To hear and decide upon all appeals from the decisions of the Lower Court. The decisions of the Faculty Court are subject to review and reversal by the Trustees of the College.

d. To select a member of the Court to serve as a member of the Standards Committee.

e. To head cases referred to the Faculty Court by the Chairman of the Lower Court.

C. House Councils and Judiciaries of Residence Halls shall have original jurisdiction only in class involving regulations which are established by the dormitories or houses concerned. They shall also have jurisdiction in cases involving quiet hours, late minutes, and late hours. Any case involving infractions of regulations which are campus wide (except those listed above), i. e., affecting all dormitories and houses, or is established by a body other than the particular house council concerned will not be within the competence of house councils or judiciaries and will be referred to Lower Court. House councils or judiciaries may refer cases of continued or serious infraction of house rule to Lower Court. The penalties of House councils or judiciaries shall be at the discretion of the governing body. House councils and judiciaries shall keep a record of all cases handled by them. These records shall be available upon request at any time to the court system. House council or judiciary decisions may be appealed to the Lower Court.

## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I The Right to Organize and Petition

#### Section 1. Regulations

A. The right to organize and petition independently for the furtherance of the interest of the Student Association as set forth in the Constitution will be subject to the following regulations:

1. An exact duplicate of the petition must be registered with the President of the Student Association prior to the circulation of the petition.
2. The petitioners and/or groups backing the petition shall be named in the document.
3. The petitioners' purpose must be stated.
4. If any evidence or substantiating documents are being used, they must also be registered. (An exception will be the petition needed to call a special meeting of the House).

### ARTICLE II Meeting and Representation

#### Section 1. Rules of order

A. Meetings and proceedings of the Student Association, the House, and the Council shall be conducted in accordance with "Roberts' Rules of Order Revised" when these rules do not conflict with the Constitution of the Rollins Students Association and these By-Laws.

#### Section 2. New Social Organizations

A. New social organizations may be represented in the House when they are recognized by the Panhellenic or Interfraternity Council, the House, and the Council.

B. Any changes in the Constitution, By-Laws, or Articles of organization of a recognized student club or organization must have the approval of the Student Association.

C. The House shall have the power to:

1. Recognize and approve new student organization.
2. Withhold recognition and approval of new student organizations for due cause.
3. Withdraw recognition from existing student organizations for any cause.

#### Section 3. Notice of Meetings

A. The President of the Student Association must give a 48 hour notice, by generally accepted means, of all Student Association meetings.

### ARTICLE III Elections

#### Section 1. General Election Rules

A. All student elections shall be held in accordance with the following regulations:

1. Elections shall be conducted by the Standards Committee composed of the following members:

- a. Chairman of Lower Court
- b. Secretary of Council
- c. Secretary of House
- d. Member of Faculty Court

2. The exact time and date of any election shall be designated by the Standards Committee. The notice of the time and date chosen must be registered with the Secretary of the House.

3. Only those persons who have been asked to sit at the voting table by the Chairman of the Standards Committee shall have access to the voting list.

4. The Election Boxes will be put on the stage at the rear of the Rollins Student Center. These boxes are to be sealed and never opened except after the voting when the votes shall be counted.

5. Only members of the Standards Committee shall tabulate the ballots.

6. Two posters stating the time, place, and date of voting shall be provided by the Standards Committee. One poster shall be placed in the Dining Hall and one in the Rollins Student Center. The posters are to be placed in these positions two days prior to the elections.

7. No campaign literature shall be placed within thirty (30) feet of the election boxes.

8. If there shall be any fraudulent or dishonest voting or any formal charges to that effect made to the Standards Committee within forty-eight (48) hours after the elections, the results of the election shall be withheld. If the Standards Committee should find that the final results have been affected, they shall confirm the illegality of the election and set a date for a second election, which shall be conducted in the manner herein stated. A candidate violating the above rules will be referred to the Standards Committee and if found guilty, he will be disqualified in the said election.

9. No final election results shall be announced until any necessary runoff elections have been completed.

10. The election rules shall be distributed to candidates and election officials prior to each election.

#### Section 2. Election of Officials of the Student Association

A. Election of officials of the Student Association shall be held annually in April, the exact date to be set by the Standards Committee and announced three weeks prior to the elections.

1. To be eligible for any position in the Student Association, a student must have an accumulative grade point average of at least 7.0. No student on Academic or Social Probation or Warning is eligible.

2. All candidates for the Council of the Student Association shall have attended a minimum of 5 meetings of the House during the term of the outgoing President of the Student Association.

3. All candidates for Council of the Student Association shall make known their intention by submitting nomination papers with 75 signatures of members of the Student Association to the Chairman of the Standards Committee not later than the regular meeting of the House held prior to the announced election week.

4. Election of members of the Council shall be by written ballot. The ballot shall list in alphabetical order all of the students running for election to the Council. Each student voting will then rank in order the candidates which they wish to see elected from 1 to the number of candidates running for election. No ballot will be valid unless each candidate receives a numerical rank. The ballots will then be totaled with 10 points awarded to each first place vote, 9 for each second place vote, 8 for each third—and 1 for each tenth place vote. The student receiving the greatest number of points will be elected president of the Student Association and President of the Council. The next 8 students with the greatest total of points will be elected to the Council.

5. The President of the Student Association shall announce these rules to allow interested persons time to comply with the requirements.

6. In case of the resignation of any officer of the Student Association, a special election shall be called by the Standards Committee to fill the office for the remainder of the term of office.

#### Section 3. Election of Class Officers

A. During the third full week after registration for the fall term, the Standards Committee shall call individual meetings of the Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, and Senior classes for the purpose of nominating class officers. Class members shall receive at least 48 hours notice of their meetings.

1. Each class shall elect the following officers: President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The duties of these officers in addition to those normally required and expected shall be to foster by their initiative and integrity, their own class spirit and identity. These officers shall take office immediately following the completion of the election, and shall remain in office until the following year when new officers shall be elected.

2. Nominations shall be made from the floor. Any motion to close nominations must be passed by a three-fourth vote.

3. Elections shall be held in compliance with the General Election Rules as stated elsewhere in this article.

4. All those nominated for Freshman, Sophomore, Junior,

Laws. The new House will eliminate the inconsistency of responsibilities that now exists between the students, faculty and administration.

(3) The Judicial branch will undergo major changes. A detailed explanation can be found in another article, but basic principles of change are the creation of the new Lower Court which shall have original jurisdiction in all cases, the abolishing of the Upper Court and the initiation of a Faculty Court to hear and decide upon all appeals of Lower Court decisions.

I feel it is important to inform the students and faculty that the reorganization of the judicial and legislative branches can be considered as separate proposals and one could feasibly operate without the adoption of the other. However, it will be advantageous to Rollins if it adopts both proposals for reorganization.

The Reorganization Committee feels that the student body should be well informed on these strategically important governmental improvements. In attempting to keep the students up to date, representatives from the committee will speak to each fraternity and sorority by Monday, January 30. The independent men and women, will be informed further on these matters. The freshman men and women will also have meetings to discuss these important proposals.

Upon the passage of the reorganization plans by the student legislative body the plans will be coordinated with the faculty constitution and by-laws by the Student-Faculty-Student Relationship Study Committee whose chairman is Dr. Hellwegge. From there it will proceed to the Faculty-Administration Committee with final approval coming from the faculty.

I hope the students, faculty and administration will give these new proposals due deliberation and consideration. All improvements and suggestions will be welcomed by your legislators. The college will be kept well informed on the progress and or changes on these nationally prominent student government processes.

and Senior class officers shall submit their names to the Chairman of the Standards Committee no later than five days prior to the elections.

5. An appointed member of the Standards Committee, is to check on the eligibility of all Sophomore, Junior, and Senior class candidates. To be eligible for an office, a student must have an accumulative grade point average of 6.0. No student on Social or Academic Probation or Warning is eligible for office.

6. Only recognized members of a class may vote for officers of that class.

7. The presidents of all four classes shall attend House meetings as non-voting members.

### ARTICLE IV Committees

**Section 1.** The standing committees of the House shall be selected by the respective committee chairman from among the members of the House with the approval of the members of the House. The chairman of the committees shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House from among members of the House (with the possible exception of the chairman of the Finance Committee) with the approval of the members of the House. Each committee chairman shall submit a written report to the House not later than the last meeting of the retiring House. This report shall contain all activities engaged in by the committee during the year as well as possible suggestions for the future. These reports shall be kept on permanent file by the Secretary of the House.

**A. Finance Committee.** This committee shall be composed of three (3) members. The duty of the committee shall be to review or initiate all legislation to appropriate Student Association funds and keep a continual check on the financial operation of the Student Association and the use of Student Association funds. The Chairman of the committee shall serve as the comptroller of the Student Association and have the following qualifications:

1. Each candidate shall have taken a course in accounting and shall have received an average grade of at least 8.0 in all accounting courses taken at Rollins College.
2. Each candidate shall be a member of the sophomore or junior class at the time of the election.
3. The Comptroller shall take office immediately upon election and shall be assisted in office until the end of the year by the retiring Comptroller.

**B. Rules Committee.** The Men's and Women's Rules Committees shall each consist of 5 members. The Chairman of Lower Court shall serve as a non-voting member of the Rules Committee. The Chairman of the Women's House Council shall serve as a voting member of the Women's Rules Committee. The duties of these committees shall be to review and revise old rules and review and suggest legislation concerning the creation of new regulations or modifications of old ones.

**C. Beanery Committee.** This committee shall consist of a student chairman, the food service manager, and as many students as the chairman considers necessary to accomplish the work of this committee. The duty of this body shall be to handle all cafeteria problems of the students in accordance with the House.

**D. Spring Weekend Committee.** The Chairman of this committee and three members at large from the student body shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House during the spring term with the approval of the House. There shall be two faculty members and one administrative member appointed by the President of the College in the spring term. The function of

this committee shall be the overall planning, coordination, and responsibility of the entire Spring Weekend weekend in accordance with College regulations. One representative elected by each social group, one independent man, one independent woman shall serve on this committee beginning in the fall term.

**Section 2.** The Standing Committees of the Student Association shall be responsible to the Council of the Student Association.

**A. Student-Faculty-Trustee Committee.** This committee shall consist of the Lower Court Chairman, President of the Student Association and Speaker of the House.

1. This committee shall meet at least once each term and on call by anyone of the four chairmen as frequently as necessary.
2. The duties and functions of this committee shall be to discuss, investigate, and recommend action on common problems.
3. All general matters should come to this committee from the House, Council, Faculty, and the Trustees.
4. This committee shall elect its own secretary and minutes of all committee meetings shall be read in the House.
5. In addition to the above duties, this committee shall serve as an advisory group of student opinion to the Dean of the College.

**B. Standards Committee.** This committee shall consist of the Secretary of the Council, Chairman, the Secretary of the House, Chairman of the Lower Court, and one member of the Faculty Court. The duties shall be to review qualifications for class officers, Students Association officers, and be responsible for all student elections.

**C. Traffic Committee.** This committee shall consist of three students appointed by Council with the approval of the House. The duties of this committee shall be to act as a traffic court, under the supervision of the Lower Court, to recommend traffic regulations, to supervise their enforcement, and to otherwise handle the traffic problems of the college in conjunction with the Administration and the House.

**D. Judicial Investigative Committee.** This committee shall consist of eight students appointed by the Council with the approval of the House.

**E. Any student representation on faculty committees shall be appointed by the Council with the approval of the House.**

### ARTICLE V Financial Affairs and Appropriations

**Section 1.** Direction of Financial Affairs

**A.** The Financial affairs of the Student Association shall be under the general direction of the Treasurer of the Student Association, with the assistance of the Comptroller of the Student Association.

**B.** Near the end of the term of the outgoing officers, salary requests will be presented by them according to the work done and the financial state of the Student Association. The request must be passed by a 2/3 vote of the House.

**Section 2.** Appropriation Procedure - Student Association Fund

**A.** All requests from Departments for funds from the Student Association shall be presented in writing to the new House the first week of May.

1. These requests should show the budget for the past year, and the probable budget for the coming year.
2. With these requests to consider and any other expenses provided for and estimates for a General Fund in mind, the House shall fix the Student Association fee for the coming year.
3. Each department requesting funds shall then receive notice of its probable allotment before the end of the school year.

**B.** Early in the fall term as soon as the House knows the amount of the Student Association Fund for that year, the notice of the definite allotment will be sent to each department.

1. Business managers or editors of each publication and the Board of Directors of the Rollins Student Center shall give financial reports to the Student Association Comptroller at the close of each term. An estimation of the different budgets shall be submitted to the Comptroller at the beginning of fall term.

2. If a Publication or the Rollins Union fails to submit a financial report at the close of a term or if this report is inconsistent with the estimated budget, the Publications Union or the Board of Managers of the Rollins Union will be asked to correct its action and make a report within a week. If the Publications Union or the Board of Managers of the Rollins Union fail to do so, the House shall take appropriate action.

3. Any publication which exceeds its budget as approved by the House at the beginning of the fall term and has to request further funds from the House shall not be allowed to pay salaries to any of its staff members from money allocated by the House.

**C.** The editors and business managers of the various publications shall be present at the meeting of the House when the allocations for their publications are discussed and voted upon.

**D.** Any motion by the House to appropriate any sum exceeding \$50.00 shall automatically be tabled for one week.

### ARTICLE VI Annual Legislature Report and Publications

**Section 1.** Activity Report. Not later than two weeks after retiring from office, the retiring President shall prepare and read a report to the House of the various activities and actions of the House and Student Association during the past year, including all committees appointed by or operated under the

take action himself. Now we feel that all cases that require disciplinary action should start from on basic foundation, and then if necessary extend into other channels.

**QUESTION:** What is the addition to the Code of Student Conduct and why?

**ANSWER:** a) Basically the sections entitled Court Procedure (III) and Investigation Procedure (IV) have been added to the present code.

b) In the past there has never been anything written as to what actually takes place when Lower Court convenes. This is what we have attempted to do by explaining what takes place when a student is brought before the court. The investigation procedure explains the duties of the investigators to the student body. In other words, we are attempting to make the entire student body aware of what takes place when the Lower Court is called to order.

**QUESTION:** What are your proposals concerning the Social Review Committee?

**ANSWER:** This has been one of the major proposed changes. During the past summers a committee has met to decide whether a student record had met the standards set by the college. If they haven't, he was asked not to return or to withdraw. Under the proposed set up the power of review will be up to the appropriate Dean. The dean can only advise a student not to return. At the same time he must show the student his evidence against him. If the student decides to return to school he will then face a hearing in front of the Lower Court.

## Donations And Gifts Aid Library

A grant of \$15,407 from the Chauncey and Marion Deering McCormick Foundation of Chicago has been made to Mills Memorial Library at Rollins College.

The gift, according to Dr. A. J. Hanna, First Vice President and Consultant to the Library, is for librarian salaries and other urgent needs for the current academic year.

"This benefaction assists Rollins in approaching salary standards of the American Library Association and our regional accrediting organization," Dr. Hanna explained. "For example, Rollins has been unable to employ an Assistant Reference Librarian for the last three years because salaries elsewhere are higher by at least \$1,500.00," he said.

"The donation by this Foundation will likewise benefit Rollins in coping with the astronomical rise in book prices in recent years. Many books essential for collateral reading cost as high as \$30," he said.

The Mills Memorial Library serves the campus college, the Central Florida School For Continuing Studies, the Roy E. Crummer School of Finance and Business Administration and the three graduate programs at Rollins.

authority of the Student Association. This report, together with any other material or ideas that may be helpful in providing continuity and efficiency to the business of the Student Association, shall be given to his successor, who in turn will place the report on permanent file.

Section 2. Publication of the Constitution and By-Laws. The Constitution and By-Laws of the Student Association shall be published annually at the beginning of each school year by the House in some inexpensive form so as to provide House Representatives, Campus Leaders, Administrative Officials, and such other interested persons with an up-to-date reference to the Student Association's authority, rights, regulations, and duties. This publication shall also contain all current House Committees and their membership.

## ARTICLE VII Rollins Student Center

Section 1. Custody. The custody and general physical maintenance of the Rollins Student Center are vested in the treasurer of the College with the advice and assistance of the Rollins Student Center Board of Directors. The general control of the financial affairs and the authority to determine the policies governing the use of the Rollins Student Center and other facilities shall be vested in the Rollins Student Center Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE VIII

Section 1. Student Law. These By-Laws of the Student Association of Rollins College have been approved by the Administration and/or Faculty, and no right contained herein shall be abrogated without thirty days written notice being given to the Student Association by the Administration and Faculty or by the Trustees.

# THE ROLLINS CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

## II. ADMINISTRATION OF THE CODE

- A. Penalties for violating the Rollins Code of Student Conduct will be based upon the nature of the offense, the number of previous offenses, the seniority of the offender and on whether the offense involves a dereliction of duty by an officer of a recognized campus group, and will be referred to either the respective house council, the Lower Court, or the Faculty Court.
- B. The Procedural Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Lower Court and the student dean appropriate to the case. Its duties shall be:
- (1) To determine how cases not covered by the Rollins Code of Student Conduct shall be dealt with, and if, in the judgment of the committee, an addition or amendment to the Rollins Code of Student Conduct is required, it shall make a recommendation of this effect to the Rules Committee. However, any rules that are introduced by the Rules Committee shall not apply retroactively to offenses committed before the introduction of new rules.
  - (2) To determine referral of cases and the placing of cases on the Court calendar.
- C. 1. Lower Court  
Upon the discretion of this Court, any case may be referred either to the House Council, Faculty Court, or the Student Deans.
2. Jurisdiction
- a. Any on-campus or off-campus behavior by a Rollins student that reflects unfavorably on Rollins College or on himself and occurs during the official school year (i. e. from the beginning of Orientation Week to day of graduation, including the Christmas and Spring vacation) can be reported by anyone to the Lower Court.
  - b. Any infraction of the Rules and Regulations of the Rollins Code of Student Conduct.
3. Penalties
- a. Oral reprimand.
  - b. Written reprimand.
  - c. Social warning.
  - d. Social probation  
A student on Social Probation may not represent the College as a member of any athletic team, in an extra-curricular dramatic production, or in any other way. He is not eligible to hold any College or fraternity office, to participate in any public or intramural activities, to receive financial aid of any sort from the College, or own or maintain a motor vehicle, or to use the Pelican housing facilities. Women students will lose their late hour privileges, and senior women will lose the Senior Key Privilege. While on social probation, a student must comply with any additional restrictions outlined for him by the Student Deans or the Student Courts.
  - e. Monetary fine or working obligation.
  - f. Referral to house council.
  - g. Referral to Student Deans.
  - h. Suspension.
  - i. Dismissal.
4. Any decisions of the Lower Court may be appealed to the Faculty Court.
- D. Faculty Court
1. The decisions of this court are subjects to review and reversal by the trustees of the college.

2. Jurisdiction
  - a. Jurisdiction in cases of appeal.
  - b. Upon all cases referred to it by the Lower Court.
3. Penalties
  - a. All penalties of the Lower Court
- E. Women's House Councils
  1. Each House Council consists of at least three voting members, the non-voting Student Legislature representative, and the House Council Chairman who is elected for a period of one year.
  2. The House Councils shall have original jurisdiction only in cases involving regulations which are established by the dormitories or houses concerned. They shall also have jurisdiction in cases involving late minutes and late hours. Any case involving infractions or regulations which are campus wide, i.e. affecting all dormitories and houses, or is established by a body other than the particular house council will not be within the competence of house councils and will be referred to Lower Court except those listed above. House councils may refer cases of continued or serious infraction of house rules to the Lower Court. The penalties of house councils shall be at the discretion of the governing body. House councils shall keep a record of all cases handled by them. These records shall be available upon request at any time to the court system. House council decisions may be appealed to the Lower Court.
  3. The presidents of the respective House Councils shall serve on the combined House Council Board and shall elect a chairman who shall also be the Chairman of the Women's Rules Committee upon the approval of the Student Legislature. This board shall be the coordinating agent between the Dean of Women, individual House Councils, and the Women's Rules Committee.

Following instructions in the Bulletin, the student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided to SELECTIVE SERVICE EXAMINING SECTION, Educational Testing Service, P. O. Box 988, Princeton, New Jersey 08540. To ensure processing, applications must be postmarked no later than midnight, February 10, 1967.

According to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test for the Selective Service System, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file his application at once. By register-

ing early, he stands the best chance of being assigned to the test center he has chosen.

Humpty Dumpty sat on a wall. Humpty Dumpty had a great fall. And all the king's horses and all the king's men couldn't put Humpty together again.

Before Christmas vacation Rollins' basketball had taken a new look. Coach Boyd Coffie's Tars won three of their last four games in December, adding a 67-60 win over Biscayne Jan. 13 for Rollins' best start in 11 years.

Then the bottom fell out and the pieces just don't fit any more. Through Tuesday night the Tars had dropped four straight since the Biscayne victory, falling to Stetson 90-70, Georgia State 88-78, Mercer 83-70 and finally Florida Presbyterian 100-65.

Poor shooting and rebounding are killing the Tars, but, as if that were not enough, injuries began to take a toll last week.

Center Donnie Smith, Rollins' leading rebounder with 9.9 recoveries per game and averaging 10.3 points each contest, is out for the remainder of the season with a broken ankle suffered against Stetson. Guard Bob Chandler is temporarily shelved with a twisted ankle, while forward Ed Siemer is hampered by a broken nose.

Hot-shooting forward John Criswell and 6-4 jumping jack Harry Singletary spelled doom for the Tars Tuesday night as Florida Presbyterian exploded in the second half to turn a close game into a 100-65 rout.

Canning his first eight shots after intermission, Criswell sparked the Tritons as they outscored Rollins 36-8 in the first 10 minutes of the second half to widen a 44-34 halftime gap into an 80-52 budge.

Singletary tallied 24 points and grabbed 23 rebounds as

FPC dominated the backboards 63-37. Marvin Clemons and David Stone hit for 11 and 13 markers respectively.

Free throws kept the Tars in the game through the first ten minutes. After jumping to a 5-0 lead at the start, Rollins hung close until the Tritons snapped a 15-15 deadlock with 10 minutes gone. Rollins hit on just 29.3% from the floor.

Sterling Case and Dave Pearlman shared scoring honors for Rollins with 14 points each. Rick Loghry and Ed Siemer tallied 10 markers apiece.

### Georgia State 88, Rollins 78

An aroused Georgia State quintet rallied behind the sharp shooting of guard Jimmy Jacobs and the rebounding of Dave Witter and Tommy Mullins to avenge a pair of defeats by upsetting the Tars 88-78 Friday night in Atlanta.

Held to two-points a month before as Rollins whipped the Panthers 95-49, Jacobs nipped in 26 markers, while Witter and Mullins registered 16 points apiece and 11 and 10 rebounds respectively.

Trailing by as much as 15 points with a minute and a half left in the first period, the Tars rallied to carve the margin to 44-35 at halftime. Rollins battled back to pull within five near the seven-minute mark and stayed in range until Georgia State reeled off six straight points with two minutes remaining.

Guards Sterling Case and Rick Loghry led the Tar attack with 23 and 20 markers respectively. Forward Ed Siemer contributed 13 points and 11 rebounds.

The following night the Tars played better basketball but could not control Mercer's fast break as the once beaten Bears ran to an 83-70 victory.

Rollins led by as many as three points in the early going, but Mercer outscored the Tars 10-2 in a three minute period near the end of the first half to expand a 19-18 lead into a 29-20 gap.

At the start of the second period Mercer tallied nine markers to Rollins' two as they sped to a 50-34 advantage. In fact, Mercer led 83-63 before Rollins rammed home seven straight markers in the final minute of play.

Case again paced the Tars with 19 points with Loghry the only other player in twin digits at 10.

### F. Men's House Councils

1. Each House Council consists of students elected from their respective residence halls. The number of students on the respective House Councils shall be left to the discretion of each residence hall.
2. The House Councils shall have original jurisdiction only in cases involving regulations which are established by the dormitories or houses concerned. They shall also have jurisdiction in cases involving late minutes and late hours. Any case involving infraction of regulations which are campus wide, i. e. affecting all dormitories and houses, or is established by a body other than the particular house council will not be within the competence of house councils and will be referred to Lower Court except those listed above. House Councils may refer cases of continued or serious infraction of house rules to the Lower Court. The penalties of house councils shall be at the discretion of the governing body. House councils shall keep a record of all cases handled by them. These records shall be available upon request at any time to the court system. House Council decisions may be appealed to the Lower Court.

### III. COURT PROCEDURE

- A. Any undergraduate or graduate student, member of the faculty, member of the staff, or member of the administration may bring a rule infraction or issue to the attention of the Lower Court by communicating the nature of the rule infraction or issue to the Chairman of the Lower Court.

1. A rule infraction occurring during the academic year but upon which a formal charge has not been made during such time shall come under the jurisdiction of the Student Dean for appropriate action. They will respectively investigate the case so referred and if warranted by their findings may inform the party or parties concerned that they are advised not to return to Rollins. However, such an advisal is to include:

- a. The nature of the offense.
- b. The evidence on which the respective dean is acting.
- c. The rights and alternative the party or parties have in responding to the advise; namely, students may reply to the charge and evidence presented by the Dean concerned. If such reply satisfies the Dean concerned that the charges are unwarranted or the evidence inconclusive or misleading, the Dean may drop the charges. Failing to reply or convince the Dean concerned to drop charges, students may return to the college and be tried by the Lower Court knowing that the results will be placed on their records should such a court trial warrant suspension or expulsion, or they may voluntarily withdraw from the college knowing that such an action will have no effect on their record.

- B. Upon receiving information concerning a rule infraction, the Chairman of Lower Court, in consultation with the appropriate Student Dean, will decide whether the case be sent to:

- (1) Lower Court
- (2) Faculty Court
- (3) Another Judiciary Body
- (4) Not be heard

- C. Having chosen to hear the case, the Chairman of the Lower Court will place the case on the Court's calendar and:

- (1) Assign investigators to the case (who shall then investigate the case according to the rules established in this code.)
- (2) Assign members of the Court to investigate.
- (3) Send the case directly to Lower Court if he feels that a satisfactory investigation has already been completed.

- D. Upon receiving the Investigation Committee's report, the Chairman of the Lower Court shall issue the appropriate summons (including defense).

- E. The summons having been issued and the date set, the case shall then be tried. In trying a case, the following procedures will be followed.

- (1) The oath shall be administered by the Court's Secretary.
- (2) The charge shall be read to the defendant by the Chairman of the Lower Court.
- (3) The Chairman shall then ask the defendant how he pleads, guilty or not guilty.
- (4) The Chairman shall explain contempt of court.
- (5) The defendant will be asked to make a statement regarding the charges against him.
- (6) If the defendant makes a statement, he will be cross-examined. (When the defendant pleads not guilty, questioning by the Court will follow Step 7.)
- (7) Witnesses and evidence pertaining to the actual infraction or violation shall be heard first.
- (8) Then witnesses and evidence pertaining to the character of party concerned and/or mitigating circumstances, if there be any, will be heard.
- (9) The defendant or defendants may hear and question all witnesses whose testimony concerns the charge against him. Similarly, the defendant or defendants may see and question the Court about any material evidence concerning the charge itself.
- (10) The defendant or defendants may not hear or question witnesses or material evidence which is concerned with the character of the party or parties involved or mitigating circumstances.

- (11) The defendant or defendants may in the above instances introduce witnesses whom he has requested the Court to hear. He may also explain why he has asked that they be heard. He may hear their testimony and question them himself.
  - (12) After proceeding through steps 1-11, the Chairman of the Lower Court will ask the defendant(s) if he has any final remarks, at the completion of which the court room will be cleared and the Court shall come to a decision.
  - (13) After the Court has reached a decision, the Chairman of the Lower Court shall bring back in the defendant(s) and render the verdict to him before the Court.
  - (14) The Secretary of the Court shall record all that is said and happens from steps 1-13.
- F. The results of the case shall be filed by the Secretary of the Court with the records of the Court.
- G. The decision of the Lower Court may be appealed to the Faculty Court. If the Faculty Court agrees to hear the case, it may do so *de novo*, in which instance the procedures prescribed for the trial of the case in Lower Court shall be followed by the Faculty or the case may be reviewed by means of the Lower Court records.

### IV. INVESTIGATION PROCEDURE

- A. The Chairman of the Lower Court assigns the members of the Investigation Committee or the Lower Court he wishes to investigate a particular case.
- B. Having assigned the case, the Chairman of the Lower Court along with the appropriate Student Dean outline to the investigators the information already available about the case and the evidence and information still needed.
- C. The investigators then investigate the case using the following procedures:
  - (1) They contact the accused.
  - (2) They must inform the accused of the charge against him.
  - (3) Outline the procedures the Court will follow in hearing the case (See Court Procedure, Section E).
  - (4) Outline the defendant's rights (including defendant's right to summon his own witnesses).
  - (5) Obtain, if possible, a written statement from the accused regarding the charge against him.
  - (6) Make a list of all the persons and/or materials the defendant wishes brought before the Court in his behalf.
  - (7) Locate, interrogate, and report on any other individuals who might aid the Court in trying the case.
  - (8) Locate and list any documents and/or other material evidence which would aid in the trying of the case.
  - (9) Turn over to the Chairman of the Lower Court a list of all witnesses (including those for the defendants), files, documents, and/or other materials evidence along with all interrogation reports at the completion of the investigation.

Under the direction of college division baseball "coach of the year" Joe Justice posted a 23-9 record in 1966, earning trips to Ecuador and the NCAA's College Division Atlantic Coast regionals in New York City.

Opening the campaign in Tampa Mar. 4 against the University of South Florida, the Tars face a 33-game slate which includes such major college powers as Florida (four times), Connecticut, Rider, Amherst, Harvard, Duke, and Miami.

Rollins' annual Invitational Baseball Tournament, known as Baseball Week, features Notre Dame, Lafayette, Colgate and Rollins in six daily doubleheaders Mar. 27-Apr. 1.

Also barring Rollins' path to a post-season tourney are Florida Intercollegiate Conference foes Florida Southern, Tampa and Stetson.

Only catcher Chuck Olsen (.333 last year) and pitchers Rick Shotwell (5-1, 2.64) and Charles Schoene (5-4, 4.01) are gone from last year's squad, but their loss leaves serious gaps on the firing line.

Sophomore Jeff Burns (.333) and freshman Jeff Weaver will be given a shot at Olsen's backstop post with third baseman Gordy Lynch (.269), 1965 starter, available if needed.

Pitching is really the big question since junior Jack Ceccarelli (5-0, 2.33 in 1965), who hoped to comeback after being plagued with injuries last year, may be out all year with an injured knee.

With Ceccarelli, Shotwell and Schoene gone Justice must depend on sophomores Gale Coleman (4-1, 3.86) and Joe Lasorsa (4-2, 1.50), junior Ed McNair (2-1, 3.75) and senior Ed Siemer (1-0, 0.00 as a veteran nucleus.

In the next month Justice must find at least two starters from transfers Donnie Smith, Rick Loghry and Sterling Case and freshmen William Egolf, Bob Jonap, Dick Morrison and Eric Schwoebel. Justice has even threatened to test veterans Ken Hill and Tom Flagg on the mound.

Elsewhere the Tar lineup will be tough for freshmen to crack with veterans Don Phillips (.296) at first, Bob Chandler (.306) at second, Lynch at third, Pedro Font (.296) at short and Dorman Barron (.282) Bob Gustafson (.340), Flagg (.240) and Bob Schabes (.360) in the outfield.

Battling for infield berths will be veterans Hill and Danny Rosen and freshmen Don Hine, Marty Mathews, Thomas Mercer, Mark Miller, Morrison, Frank Valenti and Rich Westfal. Case joins freshmen John Harris, Chris Leedy and Art Wroble in quest of an outfield spot.

Case, Loghry, Chandler, Hill,

Morrison, Siemer, Valenti and Westfal are basketball players and must wait until the season ends Feb. 23 to begin baseball drills. Another cager, Donnie Smith, will start throwing as soon as a cast is removed from his broken ankle.

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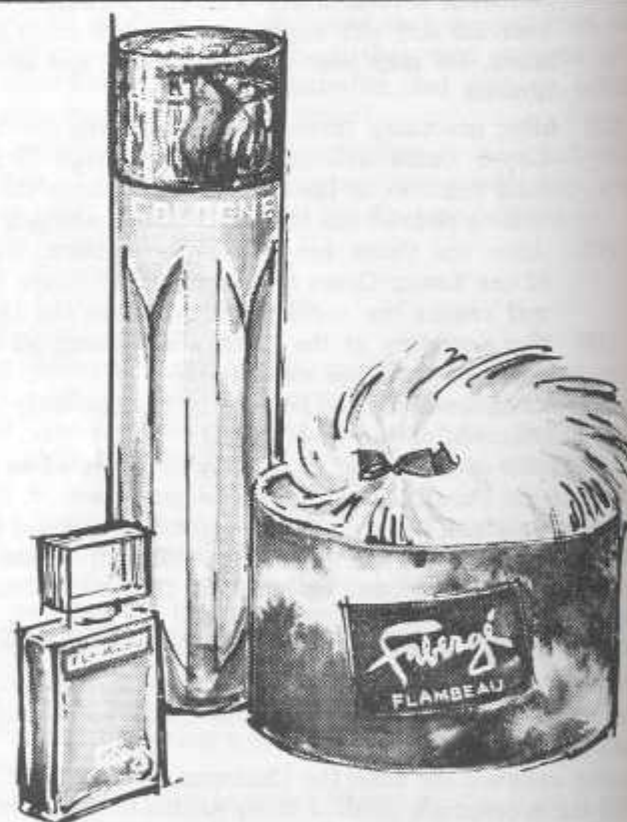
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
