Lessons and Carols For Christmas

The annual Christmas service for the Rollins family, "A Festival of Lessons and Carols" will be Sunday night at 8:30 P.M. in Knowles Memorial Chapel, amid the traditional pine boughs and Christmas ribbons put up by the Chapel last Thursday.

The candlebearers dressed in white, Jane Carrison, Ann Elmore, Jane Gittes, and Connie Griffin will lead the processional which will include the Chapel Choir, members of the Baroque Ensemble, and the Brass Ensemble.

The service opening will feature a harp solo by Danis Kelly. Traditional Christmas hymns will alternate with lessons from the Bible setting the background of the Christmas story. An outstanding choral presentation will be a selection

Handel's MESSIAH. French and German carols which are not usually heard will add variety to the service. "The Christmas Nightingale", "O, Come, Little Children" and "Christmas Day" are among those included. Before the recessional, the congregation will join in singing "Silent Night."

Lower Court Chairman Reports Busy Term

Phi Marion, chairman of Lower Court reported the following penalties were imposed during Fall Term:

Three cases of possession and consumption of alcohol on college property; penalty--social warning for one term and \$25 fine.

Two cases of aiding and abetting a woman to be absent from the College without permission; penalty--social warning for one term and a \$15 fine to social probation for two terms.

Two cases of violation of women's residence hall regulations (out of hours); penalty--ranging

from social warning for one term and revoked late hour privileges for one term to social probation for one term with review.

One case of deficient health records; penalty--social warning one term and a \$50 fine.

One case of possession of marijuana on College property; administrative suspension recommended pending defendant's appearance before the Court (defendant withdrew from the College).

One case of violation of women's residence hall regulations (male student in woman's room); penalty--ranging from social warning

for one term and a \$25 fine to social warning for one term and a \$50 fine with \$25 suspended.

One case of violation of men's residence hall regulations (woman in male student's room); also possession and consumption of alcohol; penalty--ranging from social warning for one term and a \$25 fine to social warning for one term and a \$50 fine.

One case of disorderly conduct and possession of alcohol on College property; penalty--social probation for one term and a \$50 fine.

Note: Where penalties differ for like offenses, the difference is

the result of differing circumstances. For the majority of the above cases there were multiple defendants. For 12 cases handled there were 22 defendants. Whenever possible, the Court gave the defendants the option of substituting a working obligation for payment of monetary fines.

Production Up In Smoke

The first Fred Stone production of the year has almost gone up in smoke. The female lead in Tennessee Williams, "Summer and Smoke", Alma Winemiller, is one of the finest roles which Williams, who is famous for his plays about women, has written. But at least it was our tree, and the great American Christmas descended on our apartment.

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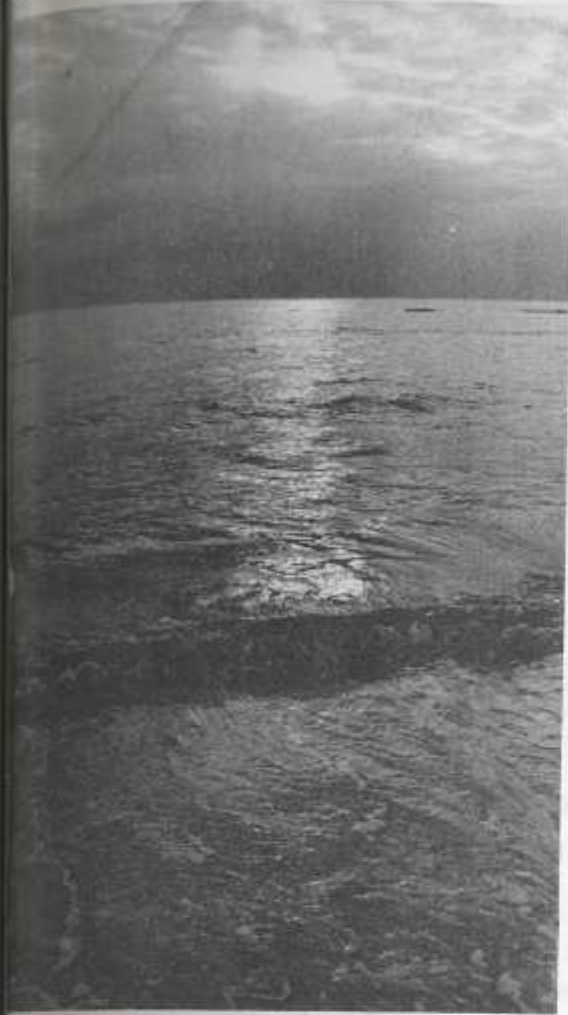
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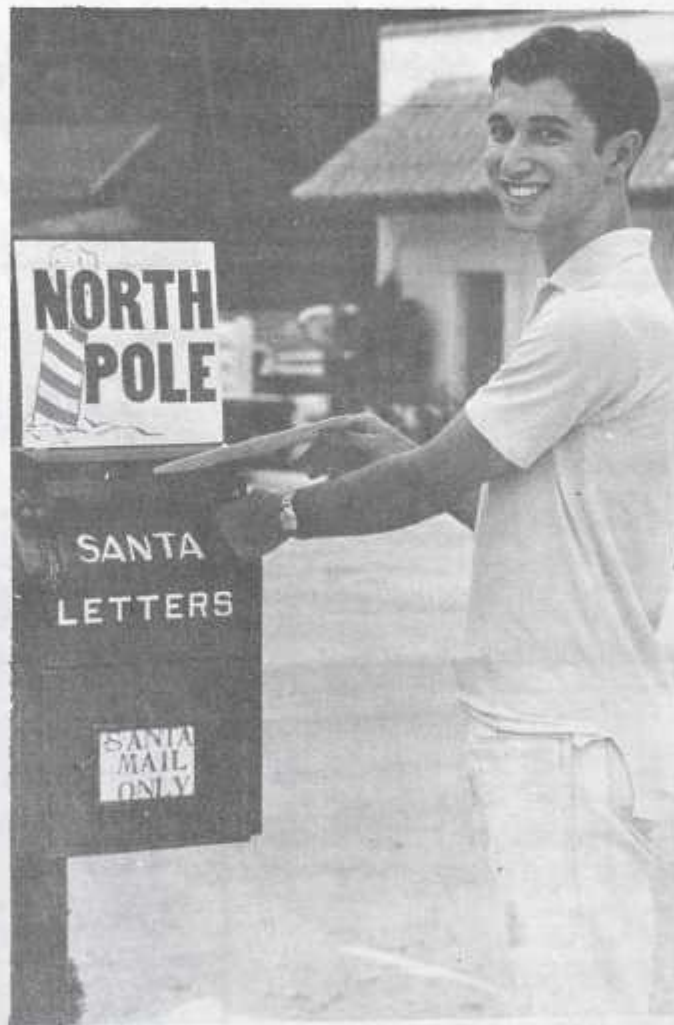


Viewing the coconut palms of the tropics, one remembers the date palms that surround Bethlehem.

The Rollins Tars held off a pressing Florida Presbyterian ball club Saturday night and went on to

win a close ball game 66-68. This win was the Tar's third in as many outings. This victory not only kept the Tars in the undefeated ranks, but it established a new team record; never before has a Rollins College basketball team won their first three games.

The Tars were plagued by 22 turnovers during the course of the game. However, hustle, desire, and a tremendous team effort made up for the turnovers. The Tars held the lead throughout the ball game. The lead stretched twice to ten points or more. Twice the Tars' lead was cut to two, but never surpassed.

Presbyterian was forced to press during the second half when the Tars scrambled to a 13 point margin. Frank Valenti led the Tar attack with quick passes to Jim Murphy, Rich Westfal and the bucket.

The Tars were also plagued by poor foul shooting. The team hit only ten out of 29. A stand-out for the Tars was Dwight Higgs, who played less than 12 minutes but came up with 11 rebounds, two blocked shots, and two points. Larry Martinez chipped in with five rebounds and 24 points.

Sigma Nu's Versus Tekes For Football Championship

Today the Tekes and the Sigma Nu's will meet on the Sandspur Bowl for the second time this year.

But this time the intramural championship will be at stake. The first time these teams met the Tekes emerged the victors, but since then many things have happened. The Tekes seemingly had the championship wrapped up, all they had to do was win their last two games, against the Delts and the Phi Delts. But the impossible happened and the Delts beat the Tekes by one point to set up the playoff. The Tekes have not been as sharp this year as in previous years and have tended to let scoring opportunities go to waste by letting passes fall incomplete. Buxbaum was a pleasant surprise, throwing the ball very well while Wenham, Myers, and Bill Hartog finally began catching the ball, and the Snakes now have a team that can and will score points.
