### A Letter From The President

During my tenure as President of the Rollins Student Association, many important issues have been considered. The Student Association Legislative Assembly has been redesigned, the Visitation Policy has been liberalized, the idea for students and faculty on the Board of Trustees has been squarely presented to the Board with firm support from every sector of the College Community, Fred Lauten's Bill of Student Rights and Responsibilities will be decided this

spring, the Adhoc Committee for Alternative Housing Proposals has been established. It has been my privilege to participate in all of these issues this year. Beyond the accomplishments of the resolution of these issues, I believe the greatest contribution of this student administration has been in the area of organization and community involvement. However, the credit for this achievement cannot belong to a single individual. In my four years of work with the Student Association, I have never witnessed a better year of cooperation and community spirit. I believe that while the

Assembly system is far from perfect, it affords the Student Association the best possible means for democratic and responsive governance.

This Friday, March 14 the Student of Rollins will be selecting their new officers for the coming school year. There will be a least four candidates for both President and Vice President, so that means the possibility for a run-off is eminent. This means that each student should carefully consider the qualifications of each candidate. Dedication and character are vital assets, but nothing can replace the indicators of past performance and

experience. The President of the Student Association has little real authority, but the prestige of student opinion when exerted by a responsible student leader carries more weight than any of his enumerated powers. We need a President who is knowledgeable of the mechanics of College Government and who will most adequately reflect student opinion on the floors of the Student Assembly, College Senate, Council and before the Board of Trustees.

While being President of the Student Association is a great honor, no amount of personal aggrandizement could possible

compensate an individual for the time and work that a Student Association President must put in. Beyond the work in committees and in the Assembly, there are responsibilities that seem to grow as the year goes by. It is my hope that both the student electorate and the candidates will keep this in mind as they cast their votes. In closing, I can only say that serving as President in 1974-75 has been a rewarding experience that I could either trade or repeat.

This is one of my main reasons for trying to secure the office of President. It is my opinion that the Student Association has become ingrown and "top-heavy". I have come to this conclusion by watching some of the Association's Actions in the last three years. I think it is time for a new breath of fresh air, due to the fact that the governing body has alienated itself from the students. This can be overcome by an active effort of the Student Association to keep the line of communication open with the student body. It seems that everyone screams that apathy reigns on this campus, but one half the problem is that most of the students do not know what issues are being acted upon by the Student Government. To overcome this problem I will make a dedicated effort to be in touch and stay within the body. Also use the Sandspur as an effective tool of communication, this is one of the major aspects that will make the Student Association and the Student body closer.

I talked about the "top-heaviness" of the Association, let me quickly exemplify what I mean: for every thing that occurs here at Rollins it seems the typical solution is to form a sub committee to investigate the problem under the committee and report back in good time. My major goal would be to eliminate the majority of beaurocratic inefficiency.

I also think that it has come time to start some investigation on the budgeting, and financial responsibilities of groups on this campus. While some organizations slip in to receive their money and are not ever seriously questioned, there are others that operate on little funds and do a great job. (i.e. the B.S.U.'s Black Awareness Week) I think that a stronger support of Article 3 of the Rollins By-Laws, which states the group must account for all funds, is mandatory. While on the subject of investigation it is also

After three years of work with the student and college governmental

structures. I have seen some radical changes in the overall attitude and participation of students in their struggle to get legislation passed by the Senate.

I have felt the frustrations of red-tape and careful discrimination of what I have considered vital issues, alternative housing, visitation, alcohol on campus and scholarship. I have realized the necessity behind the investigation of each situation for solutions. With Tommy Newton and Fred Lauten, I worked to reestablish the Student Assembly so that the representatives would be directly responsible to a specific group of their peers. There are bound to be flaws in any new operation and the Student Assembly is no exception. The lack of communication that seems so blatant can be overcome by using one method-holding representatives to the commitments their offices imply and make them accountable to their constituents throughout the year.

The strengths of the Student Assembly far out weight its weaknesses. Any one can identify one of its major weaknesses, the tabling procedure. Robert's Rules of Order is fine in moderation, but taken to the extreme only creates more inefficiencies and time lapses between discussions and voting.

Budgets are the most important issue that should be examined by the students this coming year. I recommend an audit of all Student Association-funded organizations, as well as an open forum, an all-college meeting at which the heads of all student organizations can justify their budget requests and students can be involved in the actual allocation process. An open forum would at least give the students the opportunity to express their opinions. The fact of the matter is that students are seemingly unaware of the autonomy that some groups on campus have established over the years; for example the Student Center. Action must be taken to include student opinion in the location of funds within the Student Center. If more concerts are wanted, then the money should go to more concerts. It's about time that the Student Center had to own up to someone and become subservient to the students who financially support it.

my view that the Student Center should undergo some scrutinization, for the amount of funds they are given, they should be able to provide a higher degree of entertainment and activities.

One entering the office of President has to be not only in touch with the student body but also aware of present and upcoming issues. Ones ranging from: housing, visitation, faculty tenure, the trustee power-relations to the student body, to problems such as: parking, why the ski team gets little to no money from the school, the bookstore pricing actions, and why students have to all of a sudden pay to see their own theatrical productions. I could write on and on about great changes that are going to be or should be coming to Rollins, but let us all be honest with ourselves, change will not come overnight. I will not go into that office expecting to do away with this and that over a short period of time, not receive any sort of reaction from anyone, and then end up burning myself out. I will go into that office with the sincere promise that I will listen to the Student Body, keep steady progress rolling, and dedicate myself to be within and open to the Community of Rollins.

On an all campus college level, faculty tenure presently instituted at Rollins should also be regarded as a major concern to the students. With the nonreappointment of faculty and the granting of tenure, Rollins moves closer and closer to a critical situation—a 100% tenured faculty. Rollins has made faculty tenure, not an honor, but an obligation. We should ask for a moratorium on tenure due to the present economic situation until we can establish some new criteria upon which to evaluate faculty performance.

These are only a few of the areas which the Student Assembly and college committees should examine next year. How does the Student Association President fit-in? He or she must have the understanding of the college structure, procedural knowledge for making positive constitutional changes and prior experience dealing with students, faculty, the administration and Trustees. In the past, I have participated at all these levels of student and college government, from the Student Assembly, the college committees, the Senate, to the Board of Trustees.

When you are thinking about the selection of a New Student Association President look at the qualifica-

tions of each candidate as well as the personality. Experience is the best teacher and a lack of experience slows down the legislative process because an inexperienced leader has to learn the ropes before he or she accomplishes anything constructive. So be aware, ask around, seek out all the candidates running and take the time to talk to them, but most importantly VOTE because your ballot may make the difference.

the opportunity to deal with them.

One of the indicators that something is wrong in our community is the high transfer rate. The greatest percentage of those transferring are freshmen. The difficulties freshmen face are understandable, whether their problems be academically or socially related. But understanding is not enough. We must implement a workable program of counseling freshmen on the student level.

Apathy is a major problem that must be dealt with. Apathy is a result of the students belief that they, in reality, have no say in the functioning of this community, and I can not blame

students for this belief. After all, faculty membership almost doubles student membership on the senate (ten students to seventeen faculty), and on the various standing committees, the ratio of students to faculty is at best one to two. The faculty is has too much power in this school, not only over the students but also, to a great extent, over the administration. It is time for this to change.

Apathy was dealt a death blow when two alternative housing proposals were approved resulting in co-ed living facilities for next year. The student population now has faith that if something is wanted badly enough it can be attained.

One concern which is of major importance is faculty evaluation. The students are the ones most affected by the faculty, and therefore, to some extent, the faculty should be responsible to the students. The faculty staff in this community, however, is almost totally self perpetuating in that it virtually controls appointments, promotions, and dismissals. There is not one student involved with the Faculty Evaluation Committee. I believe it a necessity to form a student committee for faculty evaluation and to initiate student participation on the existing Faculty Evaluation Committee.

The Student Assembly is charged with the responsibility to budget the money paid by you in the Student

Association Fee. The majority of you know how much money you pay, but only a minority know where the money is budgetted and what purposes that money serves. Much of this money is wasted through inefficiency and ineffective spending. You must be made aware of where this money goes and your voice heard as to where you want it to go in the future.

Various other matters require immediate attention and results. We must push for the representation of students on the Board of Trustees. We must push to get the student Bill of Rights passed. We must strive to obtain a better relationship with the Central Florida community. The most important matter, however, is we must get you, the student, involved.

In closing, I ask for your support to place me in a position where I can directly deal with the issues I have presented in this platform. I also ask you to show your concern for our community by voting this Friday, and regardless of who is elected, please give him or her your support in order for Rollins to have more meaning and enjoyment for you and to treat you more justly.

# CANDIDATES FOR VICE-PRESIDENT

As Vice President of your Student Assembly I will be able to offer you a responsible and determined candidate whose major objective is not to be found in the context of previous campaigns. That is; to present legislation that will help make Rollins a more realistic and aware institution while promoting a more imaginative and egalitarian social calendar.

For almost three years I have been frustrated by living on the Rollins "Island of Idealism," and functioning in an antiquated atmosphere that could only exist on such an "Island". The passing of the alternative housing proposal represents a great step forward for our college. The precedent set by this advancement can not be ignored by the incoming government, for it is this type of social and intellectual reform that will prepare Rollins students for the real world of 1975. These advancements must continue! Rollins life must become more socially equitable for the Greek and non-Greek student, and more intellectually stimulating for all. The following is a brief statement of the steps that I would advocate to involve Rollins students in a more mature and realistic learning experience, and elevate our college's atmosphere to one on an equal plane with other fine institutions.

1. The allocation of Student Center money must be geared to a more socially stimulating and egalitarian program.

A. Imagination must be employed to establish social events differing from the typical Rollins Student Union dance. Off campus activities must be organized so that college social events will be different and exciting, thus attracting the student body more wholly.

B. The government must encourage Greek participation in functions offered to the whole campus. This will

provide the Greek system with an immediate method of becoming more beneficial to the College community. If fraternities and sororities would help promote activities, the social events open to all students could occur more frequently. This plan would increase student interaction and help break down many of the social barriers so prevalent on campus today.

C. The Student Center should bring in more large concerts. Last year's Bill Preston concert made money for the Student Center.

2. In order to break the invisible barrier between Rollins and the outside world, I would support allocating a larger share of the budget to bring in outside speakers, to present their views on the many pressing problems of the day. This is essential to any program intent on improving the intellectual awareness of the College.

3. To promote reform of the alternative housing caliber it will be necessary to continue the fight for student representation on the Rollins Board of Trustees. In the interest of establishing a functional rapport between the Board and the student body such representation is essential. I pledge all my effort toward this cause. Once this has been accomplished we can then attempt to secure the twenty four hour visitation which we as adults are entitled to.

4. The student body must be made aware of their governments activities. I propose that an addition be made to the Sandspur summarizing the activities of the Student Assembly each week. The student body and it's government must work in unison if progress is to be made. The first step toward unification is communication.

You have now seen my platform - please let me help!

The primary duties of the Vice President of the Student Association are to assist the President in his or her job and to serve as a member and an advisor to the Standing and AdHoc committees. His additional duties include sitting on the Board of Trustees meetings and helping to select the Student Center and the Student Court shairperson.

While at Rollins I have been involved with the school in several capacities. In this past year I have served as a member of the Academic Objectives Committee, the Student Assembly, the Board of Directors of the Student Center, an investigator for the Student Court, and a member of the housing staff. Because of these I have seen how student government at Rollins functions and am pleased in some respects, yet have found it frustrating in others.

The main purpose of a Representative form of student government is to serve the best interests of the greatest number of students. However, after participating in student government I have found this not to be the case because the Rollins Student government falters in two areas. There is a need of communication between those in student government and those whom are to be served such students rarely hear what is being done. This must be corrected. It is the right of the students to be informed as to the issues at hand, for example: where their money is being allocated and in general what is being accomplished. This gap is further widened by a lack of definition as to what specific powers are within the scope of the Student Association.

Not until this gap is bridged will students enjoy a true representative form of government, serving the best interests of the majority.

The main deficiencies I have noticed at Rollins lie in the areas of housing, visitation, the Student Center, absenteeism of representatives, slowness of committee action, the low number of students in the Senate in relation to faculty, and the infrequency of committee meetings.

It is my opinion that these problems need to be looked into and corrected, if necessary. However, little can be accomplished by a few individuals. If any progress is to be made it must come from a concerted effort by enthusiastic, dedicated and responsible representatives who are accessible to and responsive to their constituents. If I am chosen by the Student Body I pledge to you to work my hardest to fulfill the duties of Vice President and additionally, to channel my efforts for the purpose of improving the quality of Student life at Rollins College.

Some people talk about promoting change and providing effective leadership, I have already done so. It is crucial for the office of the vice-presidency to have someone who is qualified and experienced in manipulating the college avenues to the benefit of the student community. In elections such as these, one always runs the risk of putting into office candidates who are simply more popular but not necessarily the most competent and qualified to promote the interests of the students.

3) Student Association Representative to the Student Center, subsequently elected Chairman in charge of Special Projects. I am currently exploring the possibility of obtaining reduced air fares for groups of Rollins students for the summer break. This could save students \$65 on round trip fares to the Northeast and the Midwest.

So, examine all the platforms carefully. When it's time for your vote, decide on the basis of those who not only can talk about change, but who already have a proven ability to implement it for your benefit.

My major concern deals with the Rollins College Bookstore. Ever since attending Rollins, their exorbitant textbook prices and aggravating late book order have provided a poor service to the academic community. Some form of competition is needed, either from a student organized co-op bookstore or from one of the local bookstores in town. This competition will hopefully force the existing bookstore to operate more efficiently.

I am concerned with the relationship between Greeks and Independents on campus. This is an area that needs improvement as the present atmosphere is nothing but detrimental to all of us. I will work to make the Student Government responsive to all groups, to everyone's needs. The question of housing is an important issue and one that will receive my fullest attention. When changes are made I feel that it is important there be no unnecessary advantages for anyone. I would also push for more campus functions to emphasize that Rollins is a community in which everyone should be involved.

The student parking situation has

improved, but the system is far from perfected. I would like to see an increased communication link between the Physical Plant and the Student body concerning parking violators, maintenance problems, etc.

There are many other issues that remain unsolved and must be dealt with in the near future. It is therefore important to remember that for these to be successful elections a total student involvement in voting and supporting the elected officials will be necessary.
