Four Join Rollins Faculty

This year Rollins is pleased to announce the addition of four new instructors to the faculty. The new members include Dr. Carol Lauer, visiting professor of Anthropology; Ms. Deborah Mae Salisbury, Instructor of Philosophy; Dr. Julian W. Vincze, Associate professor in the department of Economics; and Dr. Billy O. Wireman, the newly appointed Dean of the Roy E. Crummer School of Business and Finance.

Dr. Carol Lauer, visiting Professor of Anthropology in the Behavioral Science Department, has both her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Michigan. She has been instructor in the Department of Anatomy, Hadassah Medical School, Jerusalem, Israel since the spring of 1976 and was awarded a research grant for 1977 by the Ministry of the Interior of Israel. Dr. Lauer has done field and research work in the western United States, the Peabody Museum, the American Museum of Natural History, and at Cavo, Santiago. A member of numerous professional societies, she has presented several papers at anthropological meetings and has published in various anthropological journals. Dr. Lauer arrived from Israel for the opening of the fall term at Rollins College.

Ms. Deborah Mae Salisbury, Instructor in the Department of Philosophy and Religion, earned her Bachelor of Arts degree at the University of Chicago, where she was elected to the Phi Beta Kappa Society. She was awarded

a Yale University Scholarship for 1972-1976 and has completed all course work for her doctorate at Yale. During 1974 and 1975, she served as a teaching assistant. Ms. Salisbury, a native Kentuckian, will make her home in the Winter Park area.

Dr. Julian W. Vincze, Associate Professor in the Department of Economics and Business Administration, received his Ph.D. degree in 1976 from the University of Bradford, Bradford, England. His areas of expertise are marketing, consumer behavior, and small business management. Dr. Vincze has had both academic and industrial experience. From 1970 to 1977, he was Associate Professor in marketing at Laurentian University of Sudbury, Ontario and was programmer analyst with Shell Canada, Limited, 1961-1967. He has traveled and studied in Europe, is a member of several professional organizations, and has researched and prepared

reports for numerous academic and government sponsored programs. He and his wife, Linda, and their two sons, Julian 4, and Christopher-2, will move to the local area.

Dr. Billy O. Wireman has been appointed Dean of the Roy E. Crummer School of Business and Finance. Dr. Wireman earned his doctorate from George Peabody College and at Peabody received the Alergon Sidney Sullivan Award for outstanding scholarship. He has spent twenty-one years in higher education, and as President of Eckerd College, he was an exponent of new ideas and academic excellence. Dr. Wireman has published one book and some fifty-two articles. He has acted as consultant and lecturer on national and international educational problems and has served on the Board of Directors of the American Management Association. He and his wife, Kathie Marie, have two children; Gary 18, and Emily 14.

Adams to Speak at Local Art Center

Ansel Adams, considered by many to be the greatest living photographer, is being brought to this area by the Loch Haven Art Center, the Orlando Museum. Adams will be present to lecture for the opening of the exhibit, "Ansel Adams: A Survey". The exhibit will be on display at Loch Haven from October 4 through November 6.

Adam's lecture will be given Tuesday evening, October 4, at 7:30 p.m. in the Loch Haven Art Center Auditorium. The admission price is \$7.00 for the lecture and reception following. Tickets may be purchased at the Loch Haven office. They are limited to 300 and are reported as going very fast.

The exhibit is free and the museum is open daily, except Mondays.

Students with a serious interest in photography are urged to have this contact with one of the giants in the field. Adams, who lives in Carmel, California, makes few visits to the east and this is his only appearance in Florida. Now 75, Adams is the developer of the Zone System of photography and his prints are sought for collections all over the world.

Concurrent with the Loch Haven exhibit, Galleries International in Winter Park will also have a limited number of Adams' prints in their shop at 401-B Park Avenue North. Galleries International will have a show from October 4 through 20 called "One plus Eight", featuring Ansel Adams' prints and photography by eight area artists who have been influenced by Adams. Galleries International is just behind Exotica Shop on the corner of Park and Canton.

When in Doubt, Call Security

One of the goals of the Department of Campus Safety is to fully educate the Rollins community of the potential of a criminal act being undertaken. To that end we have attempted to create awareness of persons who do not fit into the campus or whose behavior attracts attention. As a demonstration of the positive effects of this effort I would like to provide some information on suspicious persons who were reported and detained on campus.

Last spring, a white male was reported to be loitering around the entrance to McKean Hall, during the afternoon hours. Campus Safety officers detained this person while a computer check was made for a criminal or warrants history. It was found that he had been arrested nine times, including four sex offenses, burglary, dangerous drugs, obstructing police, and

obstructing justice. After a trespass warning was given, this person was escorted off campus. A few weeks after this incident, a black male was reported and detained at the bike rack by Rex Beach Hall. The normal inquiries resulted in information on eleven arrests, including three sexual assaults, stolen vehicles, property crime, public peace, damage to property, and obstructing police. Again, a trespass warning and escort off campus were provided.

The above two persons were reported by students who were aware of their responsibility to the Rollins community. If you see strangers around your residence, the bike racks, or in the parking lots, and suspicious activity is evident, call campus safety at once. Be sure to note and report as much information as possible. You may be the key figure in preventing property loss or physical harm to another member of Rollins.

Dr. Wavell Appointed Head of Department

Rollins College President Dr. Jack B. Critchfield announced recently the appointment of Dr. Bruce B. Wavell as the second holder of the William R. Kenan, Jr. Professorship.

Dr. Wavell, Head of the Department of Philosophy and religion at Rollins, has been a member of the Rollins faculty since 1959.

The William R. Kenan, Jr.

Professorship was established at Rollins in June of 1967 with a \$500,000 grant from the trustees of the charitable trust founded by the late North Carolina philanthropist.

The Kenan Trustees left it within the province of the College to select both the professor and the department with which he is affiliated, saying "it is our wish to support a college teacher whose enthusiasm for learning, commitment to teaching and interest in students will make a notable contribution to the College's undergraduate community."

Born in Hove, England, Dr. Wavell attended Christ's College, Cambridge. He later received his B.S. degree from London University where he also received the Ph.D. degree in Mathematical Logic.

From 1961 to 1965 Wavell directed the Rollins Mathematics Summer School, an institute sponsored by the National Science Foundation for gifted high school students. He is currently Professor of Philosophy and Director of the Honors Degree Program at Rollins.

Specializing in the philosophy of language, Wavell teaches courses in logic and the philosophies of law and science.

Wavell is the past president of the Florida Philosophical Association and a member of the American Philosophical Association. He is also listed among several Who's Who listings for scholars. Wavell's new book entitled *Language and Reason* will be out in October distributed by Humanities Press.

Firearms Lead to Unnecessary Deaths

The gun lobby is fond of proclaiming that "guns don't kill people; people kill people."

A recent gunshot death in Baltimore illustrates the lethal fallacy in the gun advocates' position. A woman heard what she thought was a firecracker exploding on the street, but she ran out her front door when her husband said it sounded to him like a magnum. When she got outside, she heard a neighbor shout an incredible warning: "Watch out! That little boy has a gun. He shot the other boy." And so he had. Blond, attractive Jeffrey Krauch, six years old, a gaping stomach wound inflicted by a powerful .357 magnum, lay dying in front of the woman's house.

Jeff's assailant had been a little boy, three years old. The three-year-old's six-year-old brother had gotten mad at Jeff and had gone to find a pistol he knew about, cocked it and put it in his little brother's hand.

It is hard to conceive of any other way the three-year-old, or the six-year-old, for that matter, could have killed Jeff other than with a gun. It happens that that particular handgun was regis-

tered in a state that has a fairly strict gun control law. But, the gun was left around carelessly by an adult in a society that is generally careless about guns and makes them sufficiently accessible to render the society substantially less safe than it would otherwise be.

Human beings are subject to murderous rages. The question is: What happens to that murderous intent while it consumes a person? It is quite clear that fists, feet, clubs and even knives are nowhere near as deadly instruments or even a fleeting murderous intent as are guns. If there had been no magnum, Jeff might have come away with a black eye, a scuffed shin and hurt feelings, but he would be alive.

Guns do indeed kill people.

Tough handgun control **does** work. For instance, Japan has the toughest gun control laws in the free world. In Tokyo, there was only one firearm killing in all of 1974. New York recorded over 1,000 gun murders during the same period.

The Student Legislation Action Center does support stiffer gun control laws. Please write your congressman and ask for a stop to these endless killings.

IN MEMORIAM

Rosemary Neff, as the Assistant Director of the School of Continuing Education, is personally responsible for many of the programs there — the Criminal Justice programs, the Fire Safety Administration major, the new accounting major, and more. When she died on May 26, 1977, though, she left behind more than programs, she left behind many dear friends at Rollins College.

Students from both the day and evening courses relied on her for advice, friendship, and even mothering. Dr. Riva, Director of School of Continuing Education, recounts: "She knew how to encourage the timid student who was fearful of failure, (and) she knew how to instill confidence in the insecure adult who had not been inside a classroom for twenty years."

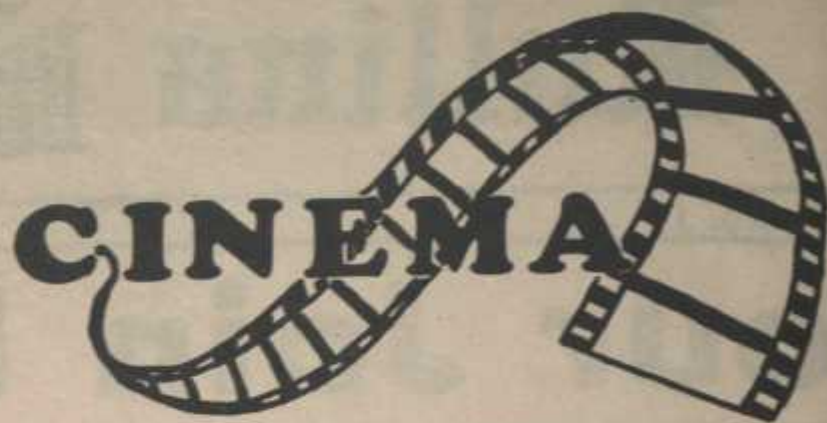


Buster Steinmeir

Reddick, who also serves as Assistant Professor of History and Coordinator of Minority Affairs at Rollins, will aid Rollins students seeking job opportunities following graduation.

A 12 day United Nations conference on desertification in Nairobi, Kenya, has ended after establishing six "transnational feasibility studies" to examine ways to halt worldwide expansion of deserts. Some scientist estimate that, due to human mismanagement, one-third of the world's arable land is in danger of becoming desert during the next 25 years.

The six transnational projects, involving 29 countries, include two projects to establish greenbelts to stop desert expansion on the north and south fringes of the Sahara; two monitoring plans linking groups of southwestern Asian and South American countries in satellite observations; protection of underground water sources shared by countries in northeast Africa and the Arabian peninsula; and a proposal for improved land

management in the Sahel region south of the Sahara.

Advocates of nuclear non-proliferation appear to have lost out again to the forces of economic and political self-interest. Last week France said it will fulfill a contract with Pakistan for construction of a nuclear fuel reprocessing plant, which produces plutonium that can be used in atomic weapons. Although the French insist the plant will be subject to international safeguards, India, using installations also supplied under safeguards, exploded a bomb in 1974.

A plan to "store" winter's chill for use in air conditioning systems the following summer has been proposed for the New York Kennedy Airport terminal complex.

If successful, the plan, which involves collecting cold water in a huge reservoir that lies beneath the airport, could lead the way for energy savings in other areas.

Looking for Help? Here's Where to Find It!

... If and when you need help, please ask for it. That's why we're here!

... The Bush Science Library has the biology, chemistry, mathematics, and physics collection. The Crummer Library supports the graduate business and graduate economics programs. "Everything else" is in the Mills Memorial Library.

... Learn to use the card catalog. There are about 590,000 individual cards for the more than 176,000 books in the three libraries. The cards are in one alphabetical order, for authors, titles, and subjects, arranged word-by-word, not letter-by-

letter (NEW YORK comes before NEWARK).

... Become familiar with the SUBJECT approach. Use the LIBRARY OF CONGRESS SUBJECT HEADINGS (two large red books, "under" the table by the card catalog).

... On an average working day a new book is added to the collection every 18 minutes, and an old one is permanently withdrawn every 20 minutes. (This emphasizes the importance of using the card catalog!)

... After you obtain the call number, go to the stacks and get the book. If you can't find it, ask about it at the Circulation Desk

— don't just go away annoyed! We will look for it, maybe it's waiting to be reshelfed — or if someone else has borrowed it, we will notify you as soon as it is available.

... When you need some research assistance, go to the Reference Desk (adjoining the Circulation Desk).

... Don't overlook the value of periodicals ("libraryese" for magazines). Ask a reference librarian about the various indexes and abstracts that point the way.

... Read the LIBRARY HANDBOOK

... Return or renew the books you have borrowed on time — don't waste your money on fines!

... Offer suggestions (blank cards available at the Circulation Desk).

... The Director of Libraries will be glad to talk with you "almost any time".

... A significant portion of all human knowledge is available in the Rollins libraries. The total cost of the three libraries is \$1 per student per year. Get your money's worth!

... If and when you need help, please ask for it. That's why we're here!

Peck Appointed Director of Writers' Conference

Rollins College announced the appointment of Robert Newton Peck, Rollins alumnus and author of the bestselling novel *A Day No Pigs Would Die*, as Director of the Rollins College Writers' Conference.

Waivers Available for GRE Test Fee

Some students may qualify for a waiver of the fee for the Graduate Record Examination. Student Aid Director, William Loving, announced that fee waivers are available for the GRE through his office.

By special arrangement with Educational Testing Service, fees for the GRE's may be waived under certain conditions. Loving stated that if the parents' contribution (based on the Parents Confidential Statement) was \$200 or less for the student's senior year (77-78) a waiver could be given. Each college is limited in the number of waivers it may grant and only 15 more remain for Rollins this year, according to Loving. Interested students should contact the Student Aid Office for an appointment.

The next application deadline for the GRE is November 9 and the fee waiver form must accompany the application. The Student Aid Office is located on the second floor of Carnegie Hall.

A 1953 graduate of Rollins, Peck has had eight novels published along with numerous poems and juvenile stories. His books include *A Day No Pigs Would Die*, *Path of Hunters*, *Millie's Boy*, *Soup*, *Fawn* and *Hang For Treason*.

A Day No Pigs Would Die was also published in the Readers Digest Condensed Book Series. A former advertising copywriter for American Home Products, Inc., and resident of Darien, Connecticut, Peck and his family now reside in Longwood. Peck is already developing plans for the Ninth Annual Rollins Writers' Conference to be held January 18-21, 1978. Its purpose is to provide an opportunity for aspiring authors to hear leading authorities discuss the writing, editing, and publishing of manuscripts in non-fiction, fiction, and poetry. The enrollment is limited and includes students, teachers, business and professional people, homemakers, and lovers of literature. The conference program consists of workshops, lectures, seminars, and panel discussions.

Discussion Group Set For October

There is a myth that separation/divorce is harder on young children than on teens and young adults. Reading excerpts from a recent commencement speech given by Virginia Smith, the newly-appointed president of Vassar College, I see that she calls for a liberal education that develops "a more rational, creative, problem-solving person." She hopes that Vassar and other effective colleges will graduate "people who can make good judgments, who can think critically, who can synthesize material, who can analyze and solve problems."

These are indeed admirable qualities, but not a complete portrait, I believe, of the humanely educated person. President Smith's leaning is towards the active and utilitarian (though not, she is careful to specify, the narrowly vocational). What is missing from this description is the contemplative, appreciative, and effective dimension of personality. Or, to say it more concretely: when all the critical problem solving is done for the day, what's left for the evening's leisure?

Where are some of the highest human pleasures prepared for in

an education so engaged and committed to conquest, rationally analyzing, synthesizing, judging, and solving problems? Or is it mere idleness to enjoy discerningly the best of the world's art and reflection in studying and delighting in the enduring literature, music, plastic and visual arts, philosophy, and history of the race? In such exercises, of both appreciation and creation, something more than creative rationality and even good judgment are called for something of sympathy and creative participation, rather than critical dissociation, is required—a joining with and working through the materials at hand, rather than a standing above and an operating upon them.

Such contemplative involvement is another dimension to the actively engaged humane personality, not an alternative definition. What President Smith desires to find in a liberal educated person is good, certainly, but not all-sufficient.

After a grueling three weeks of pre-season training, the Rollins Tars started their tough 1977 season last Saturday against Stetson on the Sandspur Field.

After a slightly nervous start, the Tars found their rythm, and began making their skills and superiority felt. Junior transfer Craig Kammien showed his excellent footwork, making some strong runs up the right wing, working well with Steve Larsen, playing his usual aggressive midfield game. Along with Kammien in the back line, co-captains Tommy Meyer and Walter Domijon, and Andy Leeker started the season playing their characteristic strong, steady, defensive game. They linked very effectively with the mid-field of Larsen, Peter Porto, and Bobby Hartman. The forwards, Lou Mocer, Emmett Mueller, and Billy McCalmont, quickly found their feet, and enabled the Tars to get off to a good start.

The first goal came twenty minutes into the first half on an incredible run from midfield by

Craig Kammien beating three men before chipping the ball into the center where Emmett Mueller, running in, blasted it into the back of the net.

The second goal, less than a minute later, was almost a carbon copy of the first, with Kammien again dribbling up the wing and centering it for Mueller once more to blast home.

Just into the second half, Emmett Mueller, hungry for more goals, running onto a through ball from Billy McCalmont, was brought down, and is expected to be out for two weeks with strained ligaments in his knee.

The third goal came twenty minutes from the end. After a steal and a shot by Eddie Waters, the ball was deflected out to John Clixby, who slammed the ball low and hard to end the scoring.

That was how the game ended; a very satisfactory result for Rollins, who played well on their opening game, and who we hope will continue to do so and take us through to the N.C.A.A. championship this season in Miami.

On Sunday, September 18th, Rollins Tars played host to overseas guests University College Dublin, with their reportedly strongest team in many years.

The game started with Rollins playing strongly in the midfield, controlling and pushing forward, creating early problems for Dublin, who were playing their second game in twenty-four hours. Dublin, though with many individual talents, never quite seemed to co-ordinate their play as a team. However, it was Dublin who scored the first goal at the Sandspur since the U.S.

Air Force Academy in 1975, ten games ago. It came from Pynton Drury, who took a beautifully placed through ball, and hammered it in with his left foot, from just inside the penalty box.

The Tars did not lag for long. Eight minutes later, Lou Mocer took a beautiful pass from Peter Porto, and hammered it under the goalkeeper for his first goal of the season. His second goal was a classic, taking the ball on an Andy Leeker pass just inside the Dublin half, chipped the ball over a back, and then over the head of the goalkeeper into the goal.

In the second half, the play was mainly a midfield struggle, with the supporters waiting for Lou Mocer's third goal. About twenty-five minutes into the second half, the goal came, from a Billy McCalmont pass to the right. Mocer took it round a defender, and banged it into the goal for his hat trick. Mark Nicolle came in for Dale Smith toward the end of the second half, and kept the Dublin team from scoring until the final whistle.

The next two games are being played on the road in North Carolina against U.N.C., Wilmington, and U.N.C., Chapel Hill on Friday 23rd and Saturday 24th of September respectively. Both games will be broadcast on WPRK, 91.5 F.M., starting at 3:45 p.m. Friday, and 1:15 p.m. Saturday.
