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## Room Shortages Cause Problem

A boarding student at Rollins pays \$2,175 for the privilege of living on campus. For this amount of money, acceptable accommodations are to be expected, yet, many freshmen and transfer students arrived at Rollins this year to find their rooming situation far from ideal.

Fourteen triple rooms and one quad exist on campus. In fact, the dorms are so overcrowded this year that the pool room in McKean is temporarily being used to house three freshmen.

Joan Reitz of the Housing office explains that each year more students are accepted than the school can actually accommodate. The College takes this risk in order to insure that the necessary number of students will actually come to Rollins. This year more students came than the school had planned upon.

Mrs. Reitz says that Housing is working as quickly as possible to break down the overcrowded rooms. In the meantime, the students are stuck in uncomfortable situations.

In order to house more students, a new dorm was opened this year. The dorm was converted from a house previously used by Rollins as rental property, and located a short distance from Holt Hall. The dorm is called Pflug House and houses fifteen girls, twelve of whom are freshmen or transfer students.

Most of the girls seem to like the house, but they complain about the many disadvantages of living so far off campus. Some of the girls are finding it more difficult to meet people, and having to make the long walk to and from campus gets tiresome. The girls are

## New Election Process to be Tested

Yes, my friends, election time is upon us again, no sooner than five months after it originally took place. For as you 37% of the Rollins population know, the first set of elections fell quite short of the majority needed to constitute a fair election. Why? First, the basic governmental process, must be outlined. Two elections take place every April, one consisting of only the Presidential and Vice-Presidential

elections, and two weeks later a vote on the standing committees and student center chairmanships.

The Rollins Constitution states that the elections must take place during the early part of April, yet no specific date is ever mentioned. This point is what caused the bungle which occurred last year. The past Student Association Vice-President, Tim Webber (the Vice-President is also the elections chairman, and is therefore in charge of starting

the election process - he must appoint someone to do this job though if he is running for the office of President), for some undisclosed reason, held the Pres.-Vice-Pres. elections quite late.

These problems were further complicated by the need for a run-off to decide the presidential election. There is a mandatory two week waiting period after the first vote for campaigning which must take place before the second election can transpire. Now we

come to a very big gap in the election process which is being filled by the wrong person. As stated before, the Vice-President is elections chairman, so it almost seems natural that this person would continue after the first set of elections to administer and run the second set. Unfortunately the new Vice-President is thrust into the new position of elections chairman and has two weeks to get everything together. And as the first set of elections were late anyway, the

second set didn't take place until before spring break and during mid-terms. As Allison Zent, the present Vice-President, put it, "We ran the

Campus security is also concerned about Pflug House being so far off campus.

Sargeant Bob Ellis of Campus Security says that they were not consulted about the decision to open the new dorm, and he feels that it was a mistake to turn it into a women's dorm.

The rooms in Pflug House are not yet equipped with book cases, lamps, or towel racks which the girls find annoying.

They would also like to see a washer and dryer installed as well as a telephone closer than the Field House.

Both the overcrowded rooms and the disadvantages of Pflug House are problems that only the Housing department can solve. Unfortunately, the only solution they offer at this point is to wait patiently.

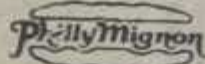
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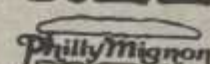


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# New Provost Brings New Ideas to Academic System

There is no name on the door of Rollins' new Vice-President/Provost, just an old brass plaque. His office furniture consists of a couple of old vinyl chairs: the kind that are quickly becoming obsolete across campus. But there is much to know about Dr. Marcus and the highly influential position that he has recently taken at Rollins. His job as Provost is that of "chief academic officer," and in the coming year he will be working closely with the administrative and academic deans which he says are just beginning to emerge from a differentiated state." He plans to complete the curriculum changes of the last two years with a reorganization of the faculty that Rollins has needed for some time.

Dr. Marcus came to Rollins from the State University of New York at Stony Brook, where he was the Dean of Undergraduate Studies for the past six years.

The faculty he worked with there numbered 1,000 (close to our total enrollment). He has a Ph.D. in History from Northwestern University and taught for several years at Stony Brook before assuming the deanship.

His decision to come to Rollins was largely based on the many things that impressed him while visiting the campus this past summer: "... the area, size, scale, and aspirations of Rollins, but mostly its people." He was not familiar with Rollins or any of its family when he was first contacted last spring by President Seymour. But he made up for that during the summer and recalls one weekend visit in which he attended 17 meetings in 2 days!! Rollins seems to me a place where terrific things are going to happen in the coming decade while other colleges will be having to cut back," he adds.

He finished his summer preparation for his new position by participating in Orientation Week, with Dr. Edge as his advisor. He was even given an orientation packet with a mock-schedule made up for him. The week, he says, "was just super, better than any other orientation program I've ever seen." He and his family, however, did have a little trouble in becoming oriented to Florida. "They warned us about the beaches, palmetto bugs, and everything else that moves but its the air-conditioning we cannot get used to."

While adjusting to Florida, Dr. Marcus' first responsibility will be the organization of a search committee to find a Dean of the College for Rollins. He believes the numerous activities and administrative posts that come under the category of "Student Affairs" are too loosely organized and a good Dean of the College can bring them all together. Another of his priorities for this year is the new library, which is still in the planning stage. He spent some time while on campus this past summer visiting Mills Memorial Library and judging its collections for himself. He also participated on a panel to select design plans at the time.

A dimension of Rollins that has so far made the biggest impression on Dr. Marcus, however, is the unequalled success he sees in the faculty develop-

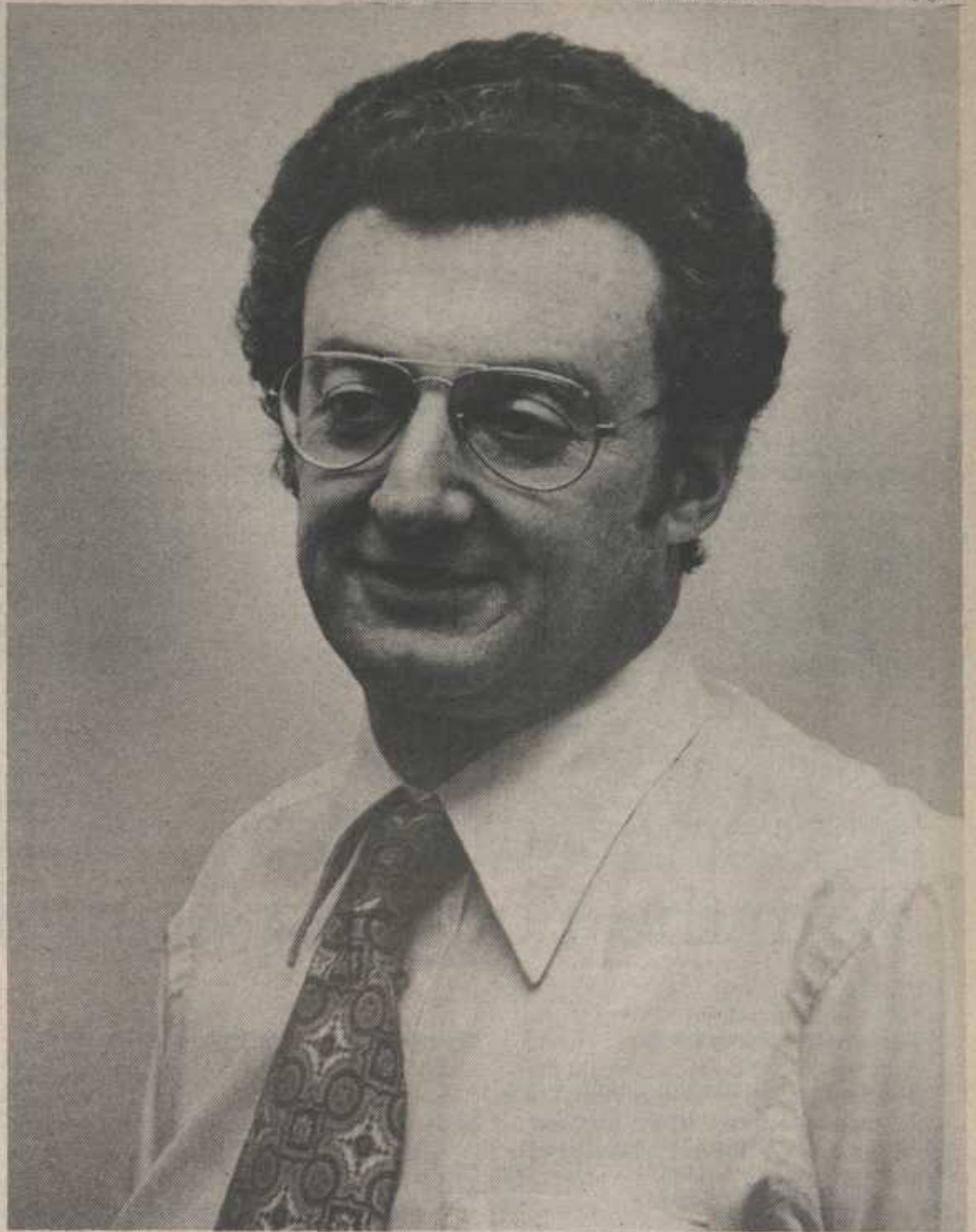

remarkable things in faculty retraining! So often faculty development ends up becoming nothing more than putting 'old wine into new bottles.' But here the faculty members have been excited about learning and communicated well with each other — that is a very rare thing to find on campuses today."

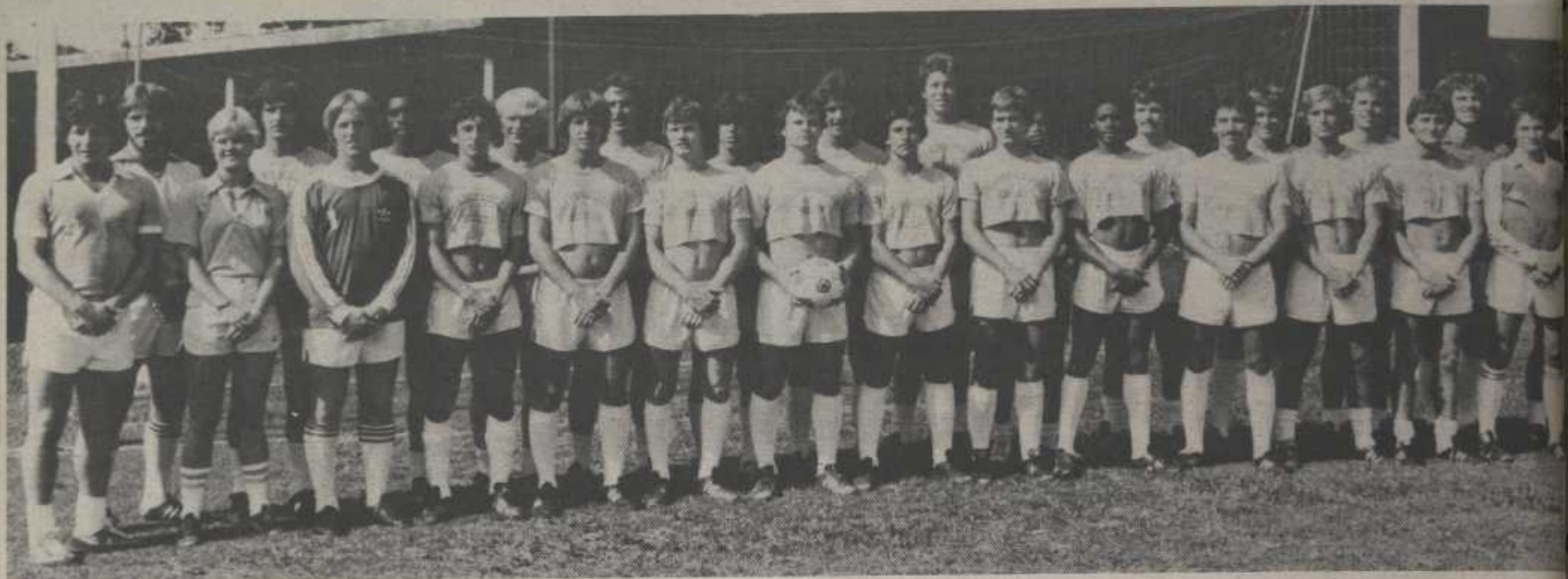
