The Housing Office and campus chatter confirm that the annual rush of requests for and questions about single rooms for the Fall of 1981 is on! Private living units available on campus for the new term will amount to 151 for men and 133 for women; however, Holt Hall and the Greek houses claim most of these. Furthermore, due to the ever-increasing demand for campus housing, some of the private rooms at Rex Beach will be converted to doubles for next year. The breakdown according to dormitories, after deducting the single rooms reserved for Resident Aides, is as follows:

Study Housing Schedule for Strategy in Obtaining Room

eligible, a student will actually sign his name on a roster room form and know of his exact room assignment immediately. The waiting list that Joan Reitz has compiled at the Housing Office is merely for the purposes of disclosing demand for private rooms and who to contact if a single should become vacant in the middle of the year. It is a myth that the students on that list have first claim to the rooms: they will have to attend the sign up sessions required of all students desiring singles.

"Room sign ups", in fact, have been totally redesigned and reorganized by Dave Lord, Director of Housing, and very detailed explanations of the new procedure were mailed to students this week. The program begins on April 13, with that week largely devoted to fraternity, sorority, Pinehurst, and Fine Arts House housing. On April 15 and 16 all students must pick up their Room Reservation cards at the Housing Office. April 20-22 is designated for the sign ups for the (non-Greek) dormitories. Lord particularly stresses the importance of the April 13th deadline for the students' \$250 Reservation Fees to be submitted to the Cashier's Office. While this rule has been quite loosely enforced in previous years, it will be rigorously enforced this year. Students whose Reservation Fee is outstanding on April 13 will not be allowed to sign up for housing for Fall of 1981. Also, on-campus students planning to move off campus for the upcoming term must finalize their

decisions now and fill out an Off Campus Application at the Housing Office.

Though the traditional policy of "squatter's rights" (students have an unchallenged right to keep their same room next year) will continue, some students living in units which will have "limited visitation" next term may have to move if they do not desire the concept. These units include the fourth floor lakeview rooms in McKean, the third floor tennis court wing (rooms 301-308) in Ward, and the west wing of the third floor (rooms 307-320) of Elizabeth. Students moving out of these units will be given priority in finding a new room. Subsequently, next Fall Term, limited visitation will be strictly enforced in these assigned units.

Should several students desire neighboring living quarters in a dorm other than their present one, they are advised to attend the April 22 sign up sessions together or send the group member belonging to the highest class with the Reservation Cards and Student I.D.'s as explained in the mailed information. Upon entering the Student Center the group or group member should then inquire as to where there are multi-room vacancies on the sign up rosters.

One final change in housing procedure is that triple rooms, a space-saving arrangement which can no longer be avoided, will be offered to students at a rate lower than that of double-occupancy rooms. Room rates for the entire 1981-82 school year are as

follows:

Double	\$1200
Triple	\$ 975

A complete listing of important dates for Dave Lord's new "Housing Sign Ups" follows and should unquestionably be committed to memory in the strategy of obtaining your desired place of residence next Fall. 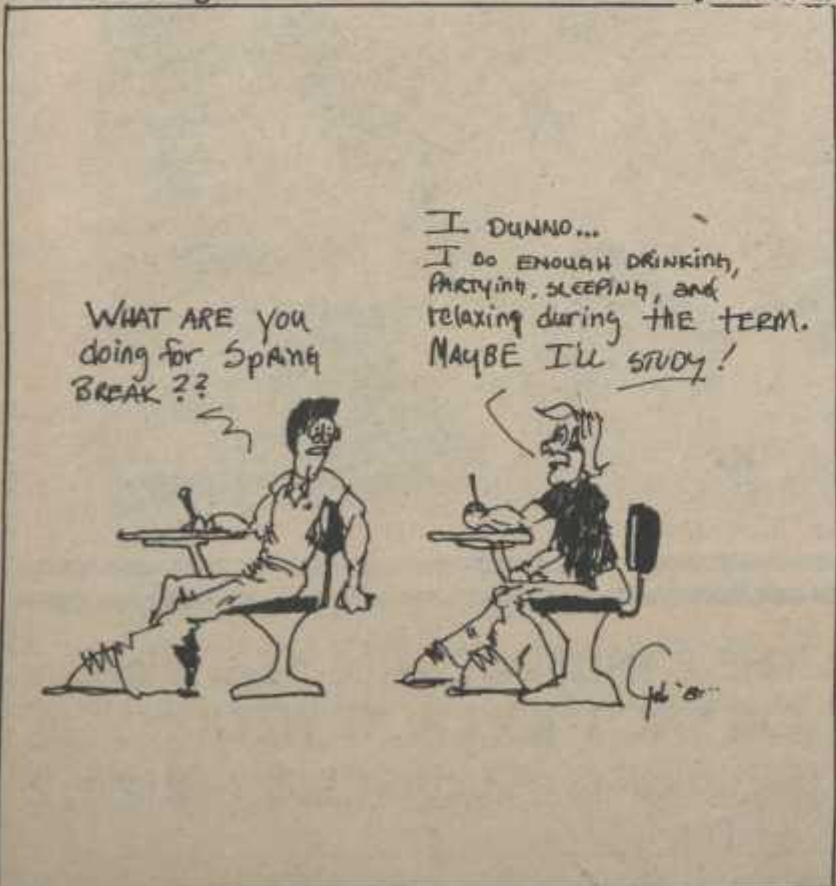

'Physics of Poetry'

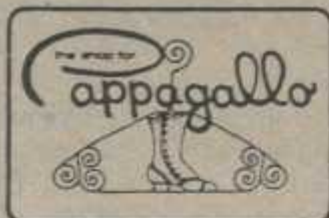

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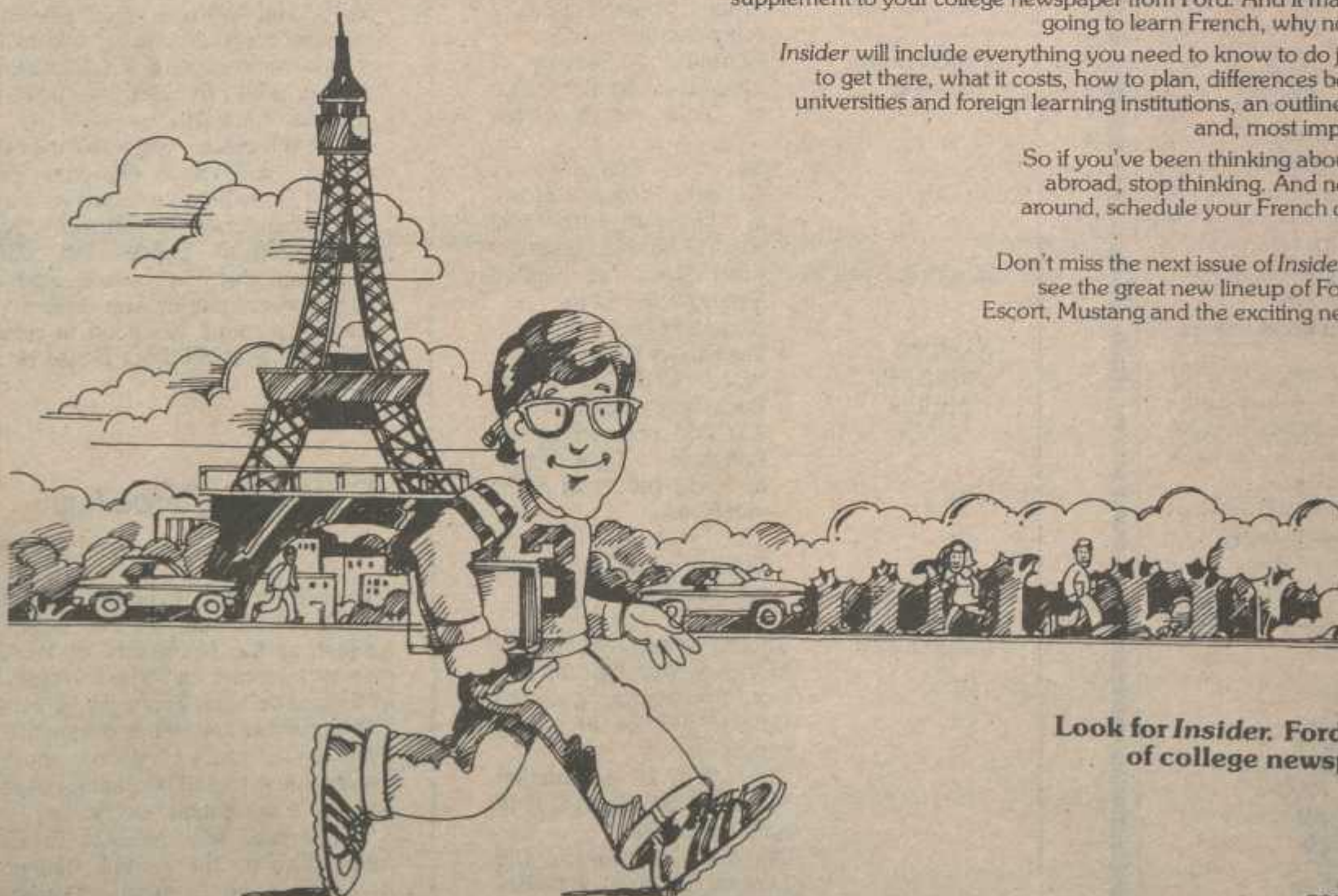
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
