## A New S.G.A. Constitution

### Voting Thursday and Friday in the Galloway Room

In order to implement major changes in its operating structure, the Student Government Association needs the student body to approve the new constitution by a referendum vote. Voting will occur Wednesday, October 25 and Thursday, October 26. At least 50.1 percent of the students must approve the constitution, so all students must cast a vote.

Last year I wrote some critical articles about the S.G.A., complaining that they were ineffective and almost as apathetic as the student body. This year, however, there is a tremendous amount of energy and excitement, because the S.G.A. has big plans to transform the Rollins Community. The S.G.A. and its leaders deserve our wholehearted respect and admiration. Therefore, as one of the editors of The New Sandspur, I offer my endorsement of the new constitution, and I encourage the members of the student body to take the time to vote. Don't let the S.G.A. down: This is your chance to make Rollins a better place for the students.

The new constitution now appears in full:

#### PREAMBLE

We, the students matriculating in the College of Arts and Sciences of Rollins College, in fulfillment of the right to participate in the governance of the college, and in recognition of the responsibilities inherent in such a right, do hereby set forth this Constitution of the Rollins College Student Government Association. Furthermore, let it be known that the right to representation and participation in this government and its activities shall in no way be denied or restricted on the basis of field of study, religion, race, color, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or handicap.

#### I. NAME AND PURPOSE

##### A. Name

This government shall be known as the Rollins College Student Government Association, hereafter referred to as the S.G.A.

##### B. Purpose

The purposes of the S.G.A. shall be:

1. To provide a sound democratic student government as a participant in the decision-making processes of college life;
2. To represent student opinion to the Trustees, Administration, Alumni, Faculty, and Staff;
3. To promote the welfare of the student community by providing an avenue for student expression, social interaction, cultural awareness, and student services;
4. To provide a forum for the discussion of issues which concern the student body;
5. To facilitate due process in an attempt to advance the academic and social standards of the College and heighten awareness of the responsibilities inherent with membership in the college community.

#### II. GOVERNMENT

##### A. Branches

The S.G.A. shall be composed of three branches: the Executive Branch, the Legislative Branch, the Judicial Branch. Each of the three branches shall exist separately with independent powers. The responsibilities of each branch, enumerated in the Constitution and By-Laws, shall serve as a check and balance on the other branches. All branches of the S.G.A. are responsible to and for the student body as provided for by the Constitution.

##### B. Executive Branch

1. The executive powers herein granted shall be vested in the President and the Executive Committee.
2. The President shall appoint a Cabinet for advisement at his/her discretion, according to appointment procedures outlined in the By-Laws.
3. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the following officials:
  - a. The head of each branch of the S.G.A., chosen in a manner specified by the By-Laws: the President, the Vice-President and the Chief Justice;
  - b. The Chair of each agent of the Executive Branch, chosen in a manner specified by the By-Laws: the Publications and Broadcast Union Chair, the Rollins College Productions Chair, the Student Services Committee Chair, and the Cultural Affairs Committee Chair;
  - c. The Comptroller and the Public Relations Chair, chosen in a manner specified in the By-Laws, providing their expertise as required;
  - d. The ex-officio member, the Director of Student Activities and Organizations.

##### C. Legislative Branch

The legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in the Vice-President of the S.G.A. and the Senate. Additional officers of the Senate shall be the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Parliamentarian, and the Clerk, chosen in a manner specified by the By-Laws.

##### D. Judicial Branch

The judicial powers herein granted shall be vested in the Chief Justice and the Student Hearing Board (SHB), and lower courts as deemed necessary. The SHB shall be composed of the Chief Justice, the SHB Judges, the SHB Investigators, and the SHB Secretary, chosen in a manner specified by the By-Laws.

#### III. LIMITATIONS

All students of the College of Liberal Arts and organizations of said college retain the right to express their concerns directly to the Trustees, Administration, Alumni, Faculty, and Staff.

#### IV. EFFECTIVE DATE AND AMENDMENTS

##### A. Effective Date

This Constitution shall become effective upon:

1. Ratification by a two-thirds majority vote of the Senate, and
2. Ratification by a campus-wide referendum. Ratification by referendum is constituted by a simple majority of votes with the participation of a simple majority of the student body.

##### B. Amendments

A proposed amendment to the Constitution may be submitted to the Vice-President by any undergraduate. To become effective, such an amendment must be approved by a two-thirds majority of the Senate and ratification by campus-wide referendum according to procedures outlined above.

## Update on Housing

Last week The New Sandspur reported, based on information received from Pat Polley, Chairman of the Campus Life Committee, that the Housing Review Proposal had not been fully approved by the faculty, and would go for a vote next week. Mike Lawrence, Director of Residential Life, disagreed with Polley's statement in an interview on Friday. Lawrence said that the proposal has been approved by all related parties, including faculty and the Board of Trustees (during this past week's board meetings). Apparently, there are personal issues playing key roles various persons' understanding of the issue, so a call to Saki O'Sullivan, Chair of the Faculty Steering Committee, revealed that the proposal has indeed been approved by the faculty, and no further vote on the issue will be necessary.

So the proposal is no longer a proposal. The housing review policy is in effect, and Residential Life has already begun the review preparation process with the seven stage 3 groups. This past Thursday the Stage 3 group representatives met with members of residential life staff to discuss goal-setting, for the group goals and objectives are due to Residential Life by November 15.

Lawrence does not think it would be appropriate to have all groups start at Stage 3 this year, explaining "there's too much paranoia out there. Let the groups who have had good reviews and have not received involuntary reassignment stay where they are. They will all be reviewed, just not at Stage 3." As for possible

## Rollins Students Participate in Statewide Rally at Kennedy Space Center

On Saturday, October 21, several Rollins students participated in a statewide rally at the Kennedy Space Center to protest the use of plutonium in space. NASA and the Department of Energy recently launched the Galileo deep-space probe onboard the Space Shuttle which utilizes plutonium as its main energy source. NASA plans 100 such launches in the near future.

Students and various protest groups from around the nation congregated alongside delegations from Canada and Japan at a site just outside of the Space Center. Many speakers addressed the issue of plutonium's use in space and its projected impact on a global scale in the event of a mishap during a shuttle launching. The members of the delegation from Japan recounted the experiences of

relatives who had survived the atomic bombings of Nagasaki and Hiroshima.

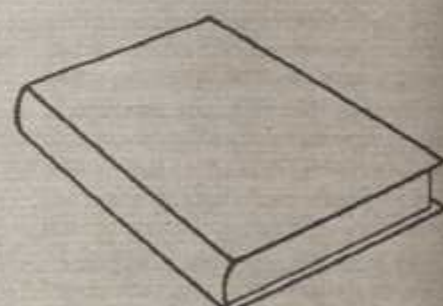

## X-Clubbers Voice Opinions on Housing Review Process

In response to your question of whether or not this year's housing review process is fair, the answer is "yes", it is fair, *on paper*. There will be constant review of all Status Three groups smart enough to utilize it, there will be more students than administrators voting, and the group making the recommendations will be the group that has had its finger on the issue for the whole year. That sounds like a system that is fair to those involved. There is, however, a potential down side.

The first thing we feel is wrong with the housing review process is that not all groups are involved. All groups, Greek and otherwise, should be on Status Three in this, the inaugural year of the new, fair housing review process. Groups not on Status Three essentially have this year off in terms of the housing situation; all they have to do is make sure they don't get into serious trouble this year, and then get back on the stick next year. The other problem with this year's process is Dr. Pat Polley. There are many people in the Rollins Community, including students, faculty, administrators, and alumni, who feel that his presence on the Campus Life Committee taints the whole process due to biases, etc., that many people seem to think he has. The X-Club has no opinion on this; our focus remains the same this year no matter who is

on what committee. But the responsibility of the Campus Life committee, as stated in this year's *R-Times*, is to work "to establish an optimal learning environment for students." The problem is not that Dr. Polley is unqualified to be on, or even to be the chair of the committee; he is certainly an intelligent and capable man. The problem is the negative feeling on the part of many people that is created by his presence on the committee. In other words, although he surely is working to achieve that optimal learning environment in word and deed, his very presence on the committee undoes all the good work that he is doing, and then some. We aren't asking Dr. Polley to step down from the Campus Life Committee, that is his decision. We do encourage him to think about how the community would feel about his stepping down from the committee and that it just might be his larger responsibility in all of this. Assuming that he will be on the committee making the decisions, however, we can only hope that he will stick to his promise that he will not stray too far from the recommendations made by the people most qualified to make them.

Although the Housing Review in our eyes is not quite perfect, the members of the X-Club support it and we look forward to what should be, and hopefully will be, the fairest Housing

Review process in recent memory.

Along the lines of tying the communication ties of Rollins, Warren informed me about the station's involvement in bringing bands on campus through promotion on the air. This is a direct result of their relationship with the entertainment division SGA has just begun.

One interesting piece of information I discovered was that the station has no current budget to work with and has not had one in the past. He added that their album library has been basically established through handouts.

I had previously asked two DJ friends of mine why they did their shows. Noel Villajuan replied, "It gives me a chance to let people listen to the type of music I like. Woody answered with a grin, "Because it's fun."

I ended the interview with Warren by repeating the question to him. His answer was, "For the enjoyment."

Thanks, Warren, and to all the students who work so hard to make our radio station work for us. Tune in!

This week's theatre spotlight is one I am not very familiar with but which proved to be an interesting endeavor for me. I was going to keep you in suspense until the end of the article, but why be cruel, right? My sentiments exactly.

Costume Design is an important aspect of theatre. Those who benefit most from having costumes are the actors. There is nothing like being able to transform oneself physically into another personality. Costumes allow audiences to be submerged in a world of make-believe as well.

Remembering the many performances I attended as a child makes me realize how little I knew about the way in which costumes are designed, constructed, fitted and finally worn. Personally, I have worked on the costume crew at Rollins only once, but it has made an immense difference in my perception of costuming.

My experience with costumes was, to my surprise, fulfilling. Previously to joining the crew, I had never attempted to sew. The closest I had ever gotten to doing so was when I threaded the needle once for my grandmother. I was slightly hesitant to learn, but found it second nature upon trying.

My favorite part about working on costumes was when we had to find accessories for the outfits. There was a lot of looking through boxes and shelves for the perfect gloves or earrings!

Costume Designers work with the director and other designers of the production to formulate a concept for the costumes for the show. The Costumer realizes the ideas of the Costume Designer by doing the actual physical work involved. The crew members act as little helpers (much like Santa's elves).

Some students view the work as less demanding than shop work, but in reality the work is equally as time-consuming, with the only difference being that you don't damage your clothing or get sweaty.

Personally, I find costume work interesting and challenging. I obtained a sense of satisfaction after having worked costumes, especially when viewing the finished product as an audience member. I am sure many of you out there would feel exactly as I did. And I am even more certain that working costumes for a production at Rollins sounds "muy" tempting!

I am often asked by well-meaning friends, "Why do you do theatre, Cindy? You spend every night at the theatre, you have no free time, you have to do your homework in 20-minute intervals. Why?"

If you're not in the show, you have shop calls every night, weekend crew calls, and a heck of a lot of work to do when you finally do get home. Plus, it does get frustrating when you get to that point in the production where you just don't think it is ever going to come together - and believe me, that point is inevitable. Not to mention the fact that you're stuck with the same little group of people hour after hour, night after night, for at least a month. We just opened our first show of the season and are, as of this writing, in the throes of auditions for the second. We close "Hotel Paradiso" on Saturday, strike the set following the performance, and will be in rehearsal and shop calls Monday night. The pace is hectic, the work difficult and frustrating. So why, why, would anyone in their right mind do it?

Well, I don't have any easy answers to that. To be perfectly honest, I don't know. It isn't just because the people are wonderful, which they are. There are plenty of wonderful people running around campus. It isn't just so that I can make a tangible contribution on this campus - I am already involved in several other extracurricular activities. And it isn't even because I love plays and drama so much. I don't. There are more than a few plays that I believe the world could easily do without. (The collected works of William Inge spring to mind. I hate William Inge.)

I was wondering this last night as I sat in auditions, waiting for my chance to step on stage and prove I could do it better than anyone. Maybe it's because it feels like

magic when I step into the theatre. There's an energy in the air that seizes hold of you and won't let go. Maybe it's because I need to prove to large amounts of people I've never met that I can be someone else, in some other place and time, if only for an hour or two. Maybe it's because there's nothing like the feeling you get when you're working on a production and you're tired and hungry and you want to go home, you haven't read your Li Po and Tu Fu poems for Dean Wettstein, you haven't seen TV or a movie, or even a newspaper for longer than you can remember, but then, (there's always a but, isn't there?) you look around and see this new world that you're helping to create. And you know in two weeks, or two days, or even two hours, that an audience is going to walk in the theatre and feel that magic, too. Maybe it's because, "Oh, for a muse of fire... a kingdom for a stage, princes to act, and monarchs to behold the swelling scene!"

I sat in the house (that would be theatre talk for auditorium) last night, half-listening to Tchaikovsky on my Walkman, half-listening to the students on stage auditioning, wanting to be up there, bringing this character to life as best as I could, wondering what all my friends and family wonder - why? Because I want to bring this play to life. Because even if I don't particularly care for the play, I want to see the characters, the settings, the sounds, the world of the play evolve onstage. Because you can't imagine what it's like to work on a production, in any area, and see it happen because you made it happen. Because I can't imagine not doing it.

Maybe Stanislavski had it right all along. "Learn to love, not yourself in the Art, but the art in yourself." Maybe it's because theatre lets me love the art in myself. Three years of hard work only makes me look back and wish I'd somehow done more, grown more, learned more, loved the art of theatre just a little more.

So that's why I do it. That's why we all do it. Not because we're weird. Not because we can't do anything else. I hope especially not because we're out to feed our own egos. Because we're learning to love the art in ourselves.

That being the case, wouldn't you do it too?

## Nationals a Rollins Showcase of All-Americans

As reported in last week's edition of the *New Sandspur*, the Rollins jumping team performed above expectations and helped solidify the Tars' first water-ski National victory.

"Betting people were betting on UCF going by Rollins (and winning the tournament)," said coach Warren Witherall. "That was the drama of the tournament, but we can't forget what got us there."

And isn't that the fact. The first two days of the National Tournament in Milledgeville, Georgia, was dominated by a Rollins showcase of World-class slalomers and trickers. So much so, that at the end of the slalom and trick events, two weekends ago, the final standings saw the Tars' women's team capturing two firsts and the men taking home a first and a second, in slalom and tricks respectively.

That is quite an accomplishment with teams such as NLU, winner of the last nine consecutive National Titles, and UCF in attendance.

The Rollins women's trick team is by far the most impressive. It most likely is the best team ever assembled in the history of collegiate water-skiing.

"Our women's trick team," said Witherall, "Runs away with the world."

The Tars' one-two punch of twin sisters Tawn and Britt Larsen are ranked first and third respectively, in the world. Senior

Helena Kjellander is tenth and Jane Peterson is also in the top 20 in the world. Sonia Villea fills out the squad. The trick team is so loaded, Brenda Nichols doesn't even get an opportunity to compete on the trick ski.

"She could be first on any other team," said Witherall. "But unfortunately she doesn't even get a chance to ski here."

The Tars didn't disappoint in the Nationals. Rollins took home four of the top five places, with only Christy Overton of UCF slipping into third between Tawn and

Britt Larsen (first and second) and Villea and Kjellander (fourth and fifth). Although Peterson fell on her third trick, she still finished 16th overall.

The Tars' men's trick team captured an impressive second place, behind only UCF, 1,930 points to 1,840, and in the meantime made it exciting.

The first Tar tricker off the dock fell early—a coaches' nightmare. That meant all four remaining trickers had to stand.

"Coaches get ulcers watching tricks,"

said Witherall. "If any of these guys make a mistake now, we're out of the whole tournament. It's stand up or pack your bags."

And stand they did—even under the most extraordinary of conditions. Just ask tricker Andrew Ross. When Ross jumped into the water to prepare for his run, he didn't plan on one of the lake's hundreds of catfish swimming around to be in the precise spot he jumped. But it was. Not only did he hit one of the catfishes' poisonous barbs, but he hit it with his ring finger where he grips the handle.

The sting sent Ross into a state of dizziness and made it hard for him to breathe. But rules are rules, so Ross had to either ski or forfeit his run.

With a swollen hand Ross made it half-way through his pass when he fell after failing to gain enough speed for a somersault. Still, he gained some valuable points for the Tars by finishing tied for 11th.

The top tricker for Rollins, Russell Gay, sacrificed a possible personal first place finish after bobbling near the end. Instead of pushing through and increasing his chance of falling, he held back, recovered and finished for the team.

"I wanted first place real bad," said Gay. "But my main goal was to stand up for the team."

He ended up finishing in second, only 40 points behind the leader.

Last week the Lady Tars' volleyball team defeated two conference teams and easily wiped out Nova, giving them a 3-0 record for the week.

Coach Suzanne Patterson was impressed with how well the Tars played against the weaker Eckerd team last Tuesday. "We had 100% service receiving for the entire game, which is virtually unheard of. I was pleased with the way we controlled the game from the very beginning," she said.

On Friday, the Tars defeated Barry University, which is currently ranked fourth in the conference. "Barry is a much tougher team now than they were at the beginning of the season, and I look for them to be one of the top teams in the conference next year."

"In the position we're in right now as far as our mental state is concerned," said Fall about the upcoming week, "it'd be nice if we had a couple of easy games to try and get the kinks out and get us back on track. But Flagler's a good team. They took Tampa into overtime and playing them at home is going to be tough."

However with the right attitude, a good week of practice and a little luck, Fall is optimistic about his team's chances, "if we play well, we should be able to beat them."

This Saturday at 12 p.m. on the Sandspur Field, the Tars take on the Rollins Alumni.

Saturday night will mark the Tars' last home game of the season as they face-off against the University of South Carolina at Spartanburg with kick-off at 7:30 p.m. on the Sandspur.

In the men's slalom event, the Tars displayed what Witherall described as "Big-League" skiing. All five men skied at 35 feet off line for the first time ever.

The women slalomers, led by world champion Kim Laskoff (first place, 4 at 35 off), took first. Kjellander was close behind at 2.5 at 35 off.

The win finally ended the Tars quest for its first National Title that had narrowly eluded them the past two years. Two years ago they finished second and last year they finished third.

"It's awesome," said Gay. "We've had a great team ever since I've been here, and we finally won it."

Witherall echoed that, "Of all my coaching days I've spent in my lifetime, this was the best. It was a great team effort."

## Rollins Rises to Occasion at Invitational

Due to a tragic computer error, the New Sandspur was unable to report on the success of the Men's Varsity Soccer team as they placed third in the Rollins Invitational Tournament over the weekend of October 14th and 15th. Not wishing to diminish their accomplishment, we have included the article below, as it would have appeared last week, with the hope that even though it is outdated, late is always better than never....

Two weeks ago, the Rollins Invitational Soccer Tournament roared onto the Sandspur field, and when the dust had cleared, Rollins emerged victorious with two superbly played games, a stunning win over the #6th ranked team in the nation, and the tournament MVP in the form of Declan Link.

After two successful practices Thursday and Friday, Fall decided that his team was ready for the tournament. He couldn't have been more prophetic, for

Rollins rose to the occasion and played like a team possessed.

On Saturday, Rollins faced off against the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, the #2 ranked team in the nation and eventual winners of the tournament. Rollins was relentless on goal, far outshooting the UNC Spartans, however a few mistakes led to three easy goals for UNC which was enough to beat the Tar's two, scored by Declan Link and Dan Girse.

Yet despite the Tar's goal deficit, their performance was excellent and

they far outplayed their competition. Still, asco-captain Declan Link stated, "we played really, really, well, but then we ended up giving them three goals, we gave them those goals. We don't want to be known as the team that plays well and loses, we want to be known as the team that plays well and wins."

Link made his own wish for victory

come true on Sunday by scoring the two goals that gave Rollins a 2-1 win over #6th ranked University of Missouri at St. Louis.

"Declan beat UMSEL, I mean he was the one that beat them," said Fall. Link's magnificent performance over the weekend led to his award of the MVP of the entire tournament, and as Fall explained, the vote was practically unanimous, "the coaches agreed that there wasn't a forward at the tournament that could even compare to Declan."

In addition, Link climbed to third place on the Rollins All-Time Leading Scorers list with a total of 42 career goals after just three seasons.

Despite Link's offensive surge over the weekend, he is the first to admit that Rollins' win last Sunday was not achieved solely through the efforts of one player, "I get the icing on the cake," he said, regarding the MVP award, "but, as always, it's really been a team effort."

Link didn't score Sunday's goals alone, for Doug Kriska and John Gurke assisted in the effort.

As Fall explained, "They (UMSEL) overlooked us, and we out-played their team. Our guys just played tremendous and we did everything we needed to win."

The tournament final resulted in a first-place position for UNC at Greensboro, who soundly defeated second place Tampa 3-1, for the championship. Rollins took control of third place with UMSEL placing fourth in the competition.

## Fieldhouse Facelift

No one knows when, or even exactly how, yet nevertheless what shines through this dense fog is the fact that Rollins is planning a major expansion of the Enyart-Alumni Fieldhouse. The renovation is part of the recently completed Capital Campaign, which funded various completed projects and renovations on campus, such as the Olin Library, the Johnson Center, and the Walk of Fame, to name a few.

According to Rollins Athletic Director, Gordie Howell, the estimated cost of the project would be about \$2.25 million. Rollins has already been allocated \$1 million dollars worth of "challenge money", and has received a \$250,000 escrow, however the remaining million is up to them to raise and the project cannot begin with the funds in their entirety.

There is no doubt that the sooner the project begins the better, for as Howell explained, "the fieldhouse is twenty years old, but it's really forty years old in terms of utilization." This refers to the fact that in addition to athletic events, the fieldhouse has been used as the main facility for commencement, graduation, social, and community events as well as intercollegiate and

physical education classes. Howell put it concisely by saying that, "the building has simply aged prematurely."

In addition to the wear and tear sustained from excessive use, the fieldhouse has never been equipped to handle women's athletics. "At the time it was built, Rollins and women's sports were not as extensive as they are today," said Howell, "everything on the women's side needs expanding, for there just isn't enough room."

Additional factors playing a part in the expansion plans include the need to modernize athletic training and strength apparatus rooms, as well as improving visitor's dressing rooms.

Rollins' expanding curriculum has also called for the expansion as increases in physical education classroom courses have put teaching space at a premium.

According to Howell, the projected plan for the Enyart expansion should more than dissolve these inconveniences. The renovation will consist of extending the North side of the fieldhouse towards the Martin Tennis Courts, and the East side back towards the lake. Additions include men's and women's varsity dressing rooms, (which will free up the original rooms for visiting teams,) as well as men's and

women's student dressing rooms. There will be an expanded men's and women's athletic training room for those athletes requiring therapy, taping or whirlpool use and an equipment issue room where students will be able to borrow athletic equipment for recreational play.

Sweeping around the ground floor on the East side will be a multipurpose room for volleyball and basketball, which, according to Howell, "will make it possible so that when the court is taken up for varsity play, you won't just have to stop playing."

Also to be located on the ground floor of the East side will be two racquetball courts and a squash court for recreational play.

On the top level of the expansion project will be two small offices for the intramural director and instructors as well as a student lounge, a la the Cornell Cafe, where students and athletes will be able to enjoy light snacks and beverages.

Located on the same level will be two new exercise and science laboratory classrooms in support of the two physical education courses Rollins offers.

There will also be a conference room which will be used for student and staff meetings, as well as booster club functions.

Rounding out the top floor will be an expanded free weight room and a strength apparatus room which will contain the latest in Eagle and Nautilus equipment.

The exterior of the fieldhouse will also be receiving a needed facelift. Gordie Howell explained the change, "there will be an entrance in front of the current front entrance which will have a place to sell tickets, an information window, and a concessions area." There will also be "renewed" landscaping to coincide with the expansion."

There is a definite need for this expansion and Gordie Howell is both confident and optimistic about its commencement and completion, however without the money in our hands it will probably be a long way down the road before Rollins will be enjoying the benefits of the Enyart-Fieldhouse renovation project, still, it doesn't hurt to dream.

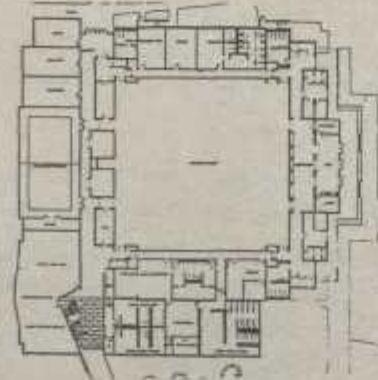
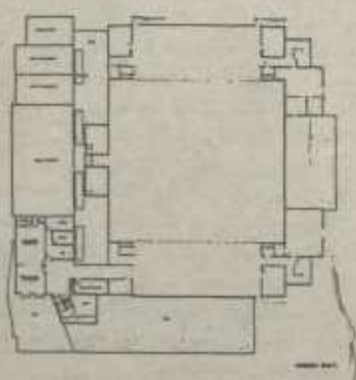
They're getting better all the time."

**Miami wins third Straight, Buffalo Showdown Next**

### Miami 23, Green Bay 20

Pete Stoyanovich kicked a 33 yard field-goal with no time left to give Miami their third straight win. Dan Marino completed 24 of 37 pass for 333 yards and two touchdowns as Miami remained one game behind front-running Buffalo. The Packers tied the game with 56 seconds left, but that was just enough time for Marino to engineer the winning drive. Miami goes to Buffalo next week in a showdown for first place.

### Washington 32, Tampa 28

Mark Rypien completed 24 of 36 attempts for 200 yards and 2 touchdowns, while Gerald Riggs rushed for 99 yards and one touchdown. Gary Clarke helped out by catching 10 passes and the Redskins defense held the Bucs to one yard rushing. Vinny Testaverde tried to rally the Bucs in the 4th quarter and ended up throwing for more than 300 yards and three touchdowns.

### Kansas City 36, Dallas 28

Christian Okoye rushed for 170 yards on 33 carries and Steve DeBerg had his best game as a Chief completing 17 of 22 attempts for over 200 yards, however he had to leave the game. Kansas City remained the only team to keep each opponent from gaining 300 yards and Dallas still remains the only winless team.

### Houston 27, Pittsburgh 0

The Oilers won two games in a row for the first time this year and moved into a first place tie in the Central Division. Warren Moon was 17 of 29 for 229 yards and threw three touchdowns as Houston

jumped to a 24-0 halftime lead. Moon threw two touchdowns to Alonzo Highsmith from inside the ten and connected on a 51 yard bomb to Curtis Duncan for another touchdown. This was the Oilers first shut-out since 1980, when they blanked the Steelers, and it is the second time the Steelers have been shut-out this year.

### San Fran 37, New England 20

The move from Candlestick to Stanford Stadium didn't upset the 49ers as they defeated the Patriots 37-20. Joe Montana had to leave the game with a knee injury in the first half, but Steve Young took his place and did a good job with the help of Jerry Rice who caught six passes for 112 yards and two touchdowns. Steve Grogan, who is the third different quarterback to start for New England this year, was 15 of 29 for 240 yards and threw two touchdown passes to Stanley Morgan. With the Rams losing their second straight game, San Francisco took over sole possession of first place.

### Indianapolis 23, Cincy 12

Eric Dickerson rushed for 152 yards on 31 carries and one touchdown to help the Colts surprise the Bengals. This was the first game that Dickerson ran for more than 100 yards in over a month and Jack Trudeau complemented him by throwing for two touchdowns. Cincinnati's offense sputtered again as the Bengals lost their second straight home game after winning 12 in row in "the Jungle."

## Without Starting Backcourt Magic Fall to Heat

Orlando Magic Head Coach Matt Goukas elected not to play probable starters Sam Vincent and Reggie Theus in Sunday night's exhibition game against the Miami Heat in Daytona Beach which the Heat won, 111-106. Rather, with roster cuts approaching, Goukas wanted another look at some of the players who haven't had a great deal of playing time. The game was very close throughout the 2nd half; the Heat didn't ice the victory until the final 30 seconds of the 4th quarter.

The Magic, down by 2, gave the ball to shooting guard Nick Anderson who missed a short jump shot resulting in a Miami rebound. Heat point guard Sherman Douglas, the 1st selection in the 2nd round of this summer's college draft, sank two free throws after being fouled (why couldn't he do that at Syracuse??). The Magic were unable to convert several three-point attempts in the waning seconds and lost by 5 to the younger Heat.

The Heat were led by Douglas and center Rony Seikaly. Douglas, the NCAA I career leader in assists, scored 15 (6 for 11), made 3 steals, but dished out only one assist. Miami's scoring leader was Seikaly, with 16 points (6 for 9), who dominated the Magic's big men inside by blocking four shots and grabbing eight rebounds.

Orlando power forward Terry Catledge compensated for the absence of Theus by scoring a game-high (and high

thus far for the Magic) 27 points (10 for 17) and by grabbing 10 rebounds, more than any player on either team.

Catledge also was a leader in the

Magic's 109-97 loss to the Dallas Mavericks Saturday night at the O-rena. He scored 16 points (6 for 13) and grabbed 9 rebounds. Rookie Michael Ansley had his best game

versus the Mavs, shooting 6 for 12 (16 points), grabbing 10 bounds, and holding lottery pick Randy White to only 4 points. Dallas, playing all their starters for more than thirty minutes, held every advantage and easily turned back the Magic. Roy Tarpley led the Mavs with 26 points.

There still remains some mystery over who the Magic are going to cut in order to trim their roster to the twelve men allowed on opening day. The two Orlando players without guaranteed contracts, Ben Poquette and Perry Moss, seem unlikely to survive the cut. Moss has not played in any exhibition games because of an injured calf and Poquette saw only limited playing time in one game.

A total of four players must be cut and Coach Goukas will have a tough job to decide who the other two shall be. The Magic have four point guards, so it is likely that at least one will not make the team. Frank Johnson, an eight year veteran, seems to be the most likely candidate for release. The final position may be between forward Jeff Turner and point guard Scott Skiles, a crowd favorite. Turner may have helped himself by scoring 7 points (3 for 4) against the Heat.

The Magic played the Philadelphia 76ers Tuesday night in Lakeland and take on the Atlanta Hawks this Friday and Saturday. Their final exhibition game is against the Cleveland Cavaliers on Monday, October 30. Orlando should split with the Hawks and I'll take the Cavs by 14.

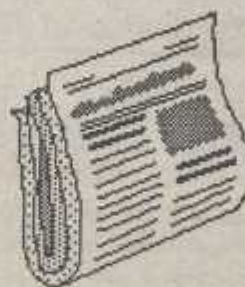
