Nursing to be UCF's 12th college

The School of Nursing will become the College of Nursing by July and a part of the College of Medicine by 2009, President Hiatt announced Tuesday.

The College of Nursing will be UCF's 12th college, marking a continued trend of expansion. UCF has been discussing the creation of the college for more than six months, in part to address the nurs-

ing shortages in Florida.

"It became clear that we needed it and that the program was ready for a college," Provost Terry Hickey said.

Nursing shortages in Florida reached a 12-year peak in 2001, when nearly 16 percent of Registered Nurse jobs went vacant in hospitals, according to a 2006 report by the Florida Hospital Association. Currently, 8.5 percent of RN jobs remain unfilled because of a lack of workers.

"Any expansion in [Florida's] nursing education program is certainly going to be beneficial," said Martha DeCastro, vice president of nursing with the Florida Hospital Association.

DeCastro said the nursing shortage in Florida is "going to get worse before it gets better."

"We're at the point where a lot of our baby-boomer nurses are starting to

THE BATTLE FOR GREEK ROW

PKA, SAE embody trend toward UCF oversight of Greeks

The three rules of real estate are alive and well on Greek Park Drive: location, location, location.

Lot No. 1 on Greek Park Drive, prime real estate on the UCF campus, is caught in a legal battle tugging it in two different directions. Both the school and the property owners are trying to take control of the 10,000-square-foot house at 4100 Greek Park Drive — and it's costing the university and the owners hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Gregg Ormond, the attorney for Pi Kappa Alpha, stressed the significance of the case.

"[This decision] will impact not only SAE but any other fraternities or sororities in Greek Park, should they have similar problems in the future," Ormond said.

The two-story house, vandalized after being left vacant, was formerly occupied by the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity until the UCF chapter had its charter revoked in Feb. 2005 after hazing incidents. Since then, a legal battle over the house — which has an estimated value of over \$1 million — has resulted in more than \$250,000 in legal fees for UCF.

It started a year and a half ago when UCF sent a default letter to the house's owners, demanding they make repairs on the home within 15 days.

When the owners did not comply, the university filed suit for breach of contract, according to court documents. UCF wants to

terminate the sublease.

"It's the fraternity's position that the university wrongfully attempted to terminate the lease agreement, and is liable to the fraternity for our loss of income and repair costs," Ormond said.

Judge Cynthia MacKinnon is deliberating the case right now. The trial lasted from August to October in Orange County Circuit Court.

Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity Corp., the

SAE house's future still uncertain

As the former Pi Kappa Alpha house sits empty, the future of other Greek housing also remains uncertain.

One such organization may be Sigma Alpha Epsilon. SAE was suspended from UCF for six years after a Nov. 17 hearing where UCF found the fraternity in violation of university policies on hazing, drug- and alcohol-related misconduct, and disorderly conduct.

SAE occupied a house on 4321 Greek Park Drive. It too is now up for grabs, like the former Pi Kappa Alpha house.

"SAE hasn't been decided yet," said UCF spokesman Tom Evelyn. "We'll be talking with the housing authority."

In the meantime, the 33 men who now live there will leave sometime after the holidays, Evelyn said.

"Leasing it out could be an option. But we have to see what the housing

Teacher Evals rates classes, professors

SGA says site is similar to RateMyProfessors, uses evaluation forms

SGA has unveiled its own online professor-rating database, dubbed Teacher Evals, compiled from the evaluation forms students fill out at the end of every semester.

Junior business major Benji Rabhan, creator of the Web site, said that many other universities offer a similar service, and that SGA wanted students to be able to see and use the results of the evaluations they fill out.

Evaluations for 1,500 instructors from the Fall 2005 semester were available as of Nov. 28, but according to Rabhan, the evaluations from this year are currently being added and will be available soon. There is no fee or registration necessary to use the site.

For years, UCF students have been relying on national professor-evaluation sites like RateMyProfessors.com to help them research classes and to voice their opinions via the Internet.

"It tells you what to expect from certain professors and if their teaching style will work with you or not," said 21-year-old Ryan Rice, a psychology major.

Briana Stevens, a 21-year-old legal studies major, said she'll be using both Web sites — RateMyProfessors and Teacher Evals — from now on when picking her classes.

"It can't hurt to have more information on a class," Stevens said. "I'd compare both sites to see what everybody had to say ... and make sure I got a well-rounded view of what the class was going to be like."

UCF graduate association asks SGA for funds, status

In an attempt to raise what the organization called its "severely muted voice," — as well as its influence and budget — the Graduate Student Association has proposed to become an agency under SGA.

"Graduate students represent one of the largest student bodies on campus ... but last year, the total amount of funding allocated to GSA was less than a dollar per student," said GSA treasurer Sami Durrani.

GSA, which comprises about 30 graduate clubs and more than 7,000 students, is currently classified as a registered student organization. SGA's Activity & Service Fee Committee, which oversees annual disbursements for both agencies and organizations, plans to meet Monday.

GSA anticipates a response from SGA in early January.

Out of the \$32,000 budget GSA requested for the 2006-2007 fiscal year, it received \$6,000, as well as \$600 in allocations.

"If you tell someone that GSA at UCF receives \$6,000 or \$7,000 in activity and service fee funding every year ... people actually laugh at you," said Adeel A. Bhutta, GSA president.

SGA Student Body Vice President Jared Stout said the decision to make organizations into agencies is not necessarily based on the size of the group.

WORKING FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Students looking to make some extra cash in their free time over the winter break may be in luck this year, according to a nationwide survey of hiring managers.

The CareerBuilder.com survey, which polled 1,150 managers, revealed that 23 percent said they're recruiting for holiday positions, and 24 percent said they're planning on paying more than last year.

Although local stores are currently hiring for seasonal positions, most managers said what job applicants are paid depends on how much experience they have and how available they are to work shifts.

CareerBuilder.com identified hot spots for holiday jobs this year including retail, hospitality, customer service, delivery and office support.

"We needed 80 people for this holiday season, in addition to our core staff which was about 25 [people]," said Kristy Godbout, co-manager of Bath and Body Works at the Mall of Millennia. "Right now we're at about 60."

Pay is solely based on how much an applicant wants to work, Godbout said.

Rates for the Banana Republic at the Mall of Millen-

nia start at around \$8.50 an hour and go up to \$9 or \$10 an hour, depending on experience and the position within the store, an employee told the *Future*. He said the store only hires part time for seasonal positions.

Michaela Stamm, who recently became a server at the Houlihan's on University Boulevard, said it's been her experience that retail jobs generally pay better than restaurant jobs during the winter break, and location of the business is key.

"A holiday job in the restaurant business, especially when it is on University Boulevard, right around a college campus, is going to suck," Stamm said.

Due to the location of Stamm's new workplace, she expects to make less money compared to last year, but she plans on making it up by bar-

tending this holiday season.

Most local employers would not comment on how much workers get paid hourly or if it differs from last year. But Godbout said pay does take into consideration the minimum pay raise that went into effect last year, which raised the minimum wage from \$5.15 to \$6.67 per hour.

Some college students working over the winter break don't anticipate a pay raise but will probably earn more by taking on more shifts at work.

"I get paid \$3.39 an hour, all of us do," said junior advertising/public relations major Kelly Lofgren, another Houlihan's server. "We make our money from our tips. Obviously minimum wage went up ... but no we don't get paid any more. We're lucky, and we get good shifts."

Junior biology major Matt Boomer is a host at Uno's

Chicago Bar and Grill — he receives no tips, so his only option for making extra money is working extra shifts.

Applicants for seasonal work aren't limited to students out for the break. Several managers said they have people from all walks of life looking for a little extra cash during the holidays.

"Honestly, this year has been very interesting," Godbout said. "We have gotten nurses who want to pick up extra hours for the holiday, teachers and college students."

Management at American Eagle Outfitters in Millennia said that they are already "staffed-up."

Many of the jobs given to seasonal employees are offered as a choice after the holidays, but many workers don't keep their jobs going into the spring, an employee at Banana Republic said.

"We can't keep everybody, and that is made clear when they interview actually, that it is just a seasonal position, and then we do evaluations," Godbout said.

"Mostly everyone will continue to work here after the season just because of the hustle and bustle, and we are all busting our butts to bring in that extra money," Lofgren said.







Univ. of Michigan, Wayne State move ahead with diversity policies

DETROIT — Two of Michigan's largest public universities are moving ahead with policies to encourage diversity despite a voter-enacted ban on affirmative action programs.

Officials at the University of Michigan say they will continue the school's policy of setting hiring goals for women and minorities and will monitor whether those goals are met.

Not doing so, they say, would violate a presidential order that large institutions must have affirmative action policies to receive government funding.

Also, faculty at Wayne State University's law school met in Detroit Wednesday and approved a new admissions policy designed to maintain the school's diversity.

Under the policy, all students who meet certain grades and test scores are automatically accepted.

But faculty allowed more than two dozen broad exceptions — including giving weight to applicants from a geographical area that includes Detroit — that can help students who fall short of that level.

Proposal 2, which bans the use of race and gender preferences at public universities and in government hiring and contracting, was approved last month with 58 percent of the vote.

The measure was prompted by a 2003 U.S. Supreme Court decision that upheld a general affirmative action policy at the University of Michigan's law school but struck down the school's undergraduate admissions formula, which awarded points based on race.

For retirees, it's back to school, but just for a day of lectures

HARTFORD, Conn. — Ed Kepler got his master's degree from Princeton more than half a century ago, but that hasn't kept him from going back to college — even if only for a day. Kepler and his wife, Eleanore, were among an estimated 250 people who came to Hartford on a recent Saturday to hear an all-star lineup of Ivy League professors give their signature lectures on topics ranging from astronomy to the movies.

The program at the Hartford Marriott Downtown was the sixth in a series that brings together some of the nation's leading minds in a new project known as One Day University.

"I think it's a great idea," said Kepler, a retired United Technologies Corp. aeronautical engineer. "You get some of these experts together — they're so much more enlightening than the average teachers."

That is the main idea behind One Day University, where participants paid between \$189 and \$289 to hear experts such as Columbia University astronomer David Helfand give a lecture titled "Astronomy: We Are Not Alone" or Brown University's Rachel Friedberg discuss "Fear, Myth, Reality and the Economics of Immigration."

"At each of these top schools, there are two or three professors [whose courses] are fascinating to take — and everyone on campus knows it," said Steven Schragis, co-founder of One Day University.

"Sometimes they're in the political science department, sometimes the theater department. Almost all have a touch of entertainer in them," he said. Schragis got the idea two years ago when he took his daughter to Bard College in Annandale-on-Hudson, N.Y., where several professors introduced themselves to parents by giving brief talks.

Lawyer denies that key figure in Litvinenko case is in coma

MOSCOW — A key figure in the poisoning case of former spy Alexander Litvinenko fell into a coma after being questioned by Russian and British investigators, the Interfax news agency reported Thursday. A lawyer close to the case denied the report.

Dmitry Kovtun, a businessman and former Russian agent who met with Litvinenko in London, had developed an illness connected with a radioactive substance, the prosecutor's office said.

Interfax, citing unidentified sources, said Kovtun fell into a coma immediately after being questioned by Russian investigators and Scotland Yard detectives.

The sources said Kovtun's condition was critical, Interfax reported.

But Andrei Romashov, a lawyer for another key figure in the case, told The Associated Press that he contacted Kovtun's representatives after the report, and they told him Kovtun's condition was "the same as it was when he met with prosecutors."

Romashov declined to identify Kovtun's representatives.

Somalia's Islamic militants warn U.N. resolution will provoke war

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Islamic militants in control of most of southern Somalia warned Thursday that war will erupt over a U.N. decision authorizing an African force to protect the country's virtually powerless government.

The U.N. Security Council unanimously approved the resolution Wednesday, hoping to restore peace in Somalia and avert a broader conflict in the region. Prime Minister Ali Mohamed Geddis welcomed the decision and urged its immediate implementation.

The U.S. resolution, co-sponsored by the council's African members, also partially lifts an arms embargo on Somalia so the regional force can be supplied with weapons and military equipment and train the government's security forces.

In a possible indication that countries may be hesitant to contribute forces, Uganda — the only country thus far to volunteer troops — said it may hold off until the security situation improves. Deputy Defense Minister Ruth Nankabirwa said the situation had changed since Uganda first backed the peacekeeping proposal in January 2005.

Gunmen attack Nigerian oil installation, take 4 hostages

LAGOS, Nigeria — Gunmen attacked a southern Nigerian oil export terminal belonging to a subsidiary of Italy's Eni SpA early Thursday, taking three Italians and a Lebanese hostage and killing another person, officials said. Bayelsa state Police Com-

missioner Hafiz Ringim confirmed the attack just before dawn on the Agip oil export station, which exports some 200,000 barrels of oil daily from the town of Brass.

Eni and Italy's Foreign Ministry said three Italians and a Lebanese were kidnapped. Another Lebanese worker was wounded in the firefight, the ministry said.

The identity of the dead man was not immediately clear, although it appeared he was a bystander rather than one of the attackers or an Agip employee, Ringim said.

The Italian Foreign Ministry said they had been in contact with the Nigerian authorities and hoped the captives "could soon be freed without undertaking any action that could put them in danger of getting hurt."

Such attacks — common in Nigeria's oil-rich southern delta — usually aim to take foreign hostages who can be traded for ransom or political influence.

Lawsuit claims negligence by Taco Bell led to E. coli outbreak

GARDEN CITY, N.Y. — An 11-year-old boy's family is suing Taco Bell, claiming negligence by the restaurant chain caused the child to fall ill to E. coli amid an outbreak that has sickened nearly four dozen others.

The lawsuit is believed to be the first from the outbreak that has been linked to Taco Bell restaurants in three northeastern states.

The chain removed scalions from all 5,800 of its restaurants Wednesday after preliminary tests linked them to the bacteria. State and federal investigators also are scrutinizing other non-meat ingredients on the Taco Bell menu, such as cheese and lettuce, as they try to pin down the source.

The boy became ill after eating three tacos with cheese and lettuce at a Taco Bell on Long Island, on Nov. 24.



GSA claims its importance is not matched by SGA funding

"Agencies are created not just to reward large organizations or successful organizations," Stout said. "They are created specifically for SGA for a certain mission for the entire student body."

He added: "Student Government does not make decisions based on threats or press releases. ... The process of evaluating the GSA proposal will be handled fairly and based on object [sic] information, not subjective threats."

GSA leaders feel that becoming an agency would allow it to have a greater impact on the graduate school population, as well as the reputation of the school as a whole.


It would also give graduate students their own forum for presenting information and voicing graduate-specific problems, GSA Vice President Elizabeth Hannum said.

"Most graduate students do not feel comfortable with presenting their conference information in front of undergraduate students," Hannum said. "They would rather go through an organization filled with other graduate students who are more likely to have experienced what they have."

GSA calls itself an "advocate of graduate students." It provides a twice-weekly forum for graduate issues and works to enhance the UCF graduate program through speakers and workshops, according to Bhutta.

To become an SGA agency, an organization must file a proposal through the Campus Life Facilities and Services Advisory Board, which then must be approved by Student Body President Mark White.

The A&SF committee, which generated this year's \$11.3 million budget through students' activity & service fee

dollars, is "handcuffed by the budget," according to Joe Sciarino of the A&SF Business Office. "A&SF looks as to what is going to impact the student body most."

A&SF chair Rafael Padron said 90 percent of the money is given to agencies and clubs. The remaining 10 percent is used to maintain the Student Union.

If GSA becomes an agency,

Stout said, "their budget [will be] directly created to benefit their mission."

Alan LaCerra, a GSA advisory board and executive member, via e-mail that "The question is, 'does GSA, the organization representing all of UCF's graduate population, belong in a category with the Chocolate Club and Rock Paper Scissors Club ... or with the Multicultural Student Center and Office of Student Involvement?'"

The 2006-2007 budget for agencies varied widely: The Recreation & Wellness Center took in the most with \$3,093,316 and Knightcast, a student-run Internet radio station, took in the least with \$23,900.

Greek Council was the best-paid registered student organization with a \$32,000 budget, while many organizations were allotted no funds.

Allocations are given throughout the year by the SGA Senate. During the 2005-2006 fiscal year, the legislative allocations were \$441,590.



retire," she said.

The current director of the School of Nursing, Dr. Jean Leuner, will become the college's founding dean.

"[Leuner] was a logical choice," Hickey said. "She does an excellent job and has strong support from the faculty and the community."

Joyce Dornier, HPA's interim dean, was also supportive of the new dean, which will help smooth the transition.

"She and I have had a working relationship for a significant period of time — on a daily and weekly basis," Dornier said. "The college and everyone is delighted with the recognition of the nursing program being recognized as an established

college."

The School of Nursing is currently funded through HPA's budget. For now, the funding will stay the same. But in 2007's new fiscal year, the College of Nursing will get a separate budget.

The new college's home will eventually be at the Health Sciences facility at Lake Nona, along with the highly anticipated College of Medicine, expected to open Fall 2009.

"There may be money for the school and specific programs," Hickey said, "but it would take \$40-50 million for a nursing facility at Lake Nona."

The UCF Foundation has set a goal of \$20 million to \$25 million for construction of the new building. The rest of the money will come from a match by the

Florida State Legislature.

"We absolutely do have plans under way, and those plans are built around the needs of the college," said Dr. Bob Holmes Jr., chief executive officer of the UCF Foundation.

UCF has also spoken to Dr. Deborah German, the founding dean of the College of Medicine, about possibly combining infrastructure between the College of Medicine and the College of Nursing, Hickey said.

"A strong College of Nursing will be an important partner for the biomedical sciences complex and for continually raising the bar for health education in Central Florida," German said. "I think the nursing programs will get even stronger with the new designation."

Leuner also said they were looking into working with the College of Medicine. "By creating a college we are hopeful that we can recruit faculty and funds and be able to work with the College of Medicine to develop interdisciplinary course content," Leuner said.

Dan Razzano, treasurer of the American Medical Student Association and a molecular and microbiology major, also expressed the possibility of collaboration between the colleges. "With the opening of a new UCF med-school, the new College of Nursing will allow for a symbiotic relationship between medical students and nurses in the UCF community," Razzano said. "It's exciting to know that the strong need for both doctors and nurses is being addressed at UCF."

The College of Nursing will also affect nursing students at UCF. Currently, the School of Nursing has enrolled 542 undergraduates, 215 master's students and 36 doctoral students.

"Hopefully, it will attract more faculty members, so they

can open up more opportunities for the programs — there are so many people and so few positions," said nursing major Deanne Fenton, the president of the Student Nursing Association.

"I'm glad that the program is moving forward," Fenton said. "I plan on getting my master's [degree] in a few years. I'd come back to UCF."

Students can search for teachers or classes by typing the class subject, instructor's name or catalog number into the search engine. Results will appear with a list of teachers matching the search criteria and an average rating for each teacher, a feature designed to make comparing teachers easier.

Students can then click on a teacher to see ratings for each class the teacher taught during that semester.

The rating system, which ranges from one, the lowest score, to five, the highest score, is calculated by taking an average of the eight standard categories on the student evaluation sheet.

The categories range from a ranking on the professor's description of the course and its objectives to an evaluation of the facilitation of learning and an overall assessment of the instructor.

Some teachers, like Spanish professor Ali Korosy, feel professor-rating Web sites may tarnish reputations and encourage academic laziness in students.

Korosy said, "[The evaluations] are knee-jerk, gut reactions from students who, upon further reflection about what occurred in the class, begin to realize that it was actually a pretty good course with a tough teacher who cared about the students' future more than whether the students loved him or her."

To break up all the numbers, Rabhan also added a graphic feature to the database.

"I created a 'thumbs up, thumbs down' color-coded system for the primary visual learners, which generates a different thumb for each rating

one through five using red, yellow and green," Rabhan said.

Will students leave their old professor-ranking sites behind for a new, UCF-only version? It may be too soon to tell, but according to Rabhan, the Web site has already recorded 6,500 separate visitors in its first five days running.

Josh Jeffery, a 21-year-old nursing major, said he can't imagine why students wouldn't use the Web site.

"If you can get an easy A professor in a class, or you can get a class where you're going to have to bust your butt ... why not use it and get the advantage?" Jeffery said.

Rabhan doesn't foresee competition between the two sites becoming an issue, though.

"The information presented on this system is from forms compiled from the majority of the students in the class," Rabhan said. "Web sites such as www.ratemyprofessors.com offer ratings from only a few students per class.

He even called Web sites like RateMyProfessors a "great compliment to our site."

The only concern Rabhan has for the site, he said, is the possibility of crashes because of high traffic.

But Jeffery worries about the seriousness students put forth when filling out the evaluation forms.

The forms are typically filled out in the last few days of class, when students may be worn out or preoccupied with final exams.

"We don't care about those things at the end," Jeffery said. "We fill them out because they ask us to."

UCF denied request to rent out property

national organization, also countersued UCF for more than \$169,000, saying that the university wouldn't allow them to make repairs to the home. They are also seeking damages related to lost rental income.

The owners said the university wouldn't allow them to obtain building permits needed to make repairs on the home because the property is the subject of ongoing litigation, according to court documents.

"Part of the sublease agreement is that they are to be maintained in good condition at all times," said Greg Mason, director of Fraternity/Sorority Housing and Development. "It was deemed that that was not being done; we then have the option to terminate the sublease."

UCF declined to officially comment on pending litigation. According to court documents, attorneys for UCF argue that the owners breached their contract by not maintaining the home to begin with.

Richard Mitchell, an attorney representing UCF, said that, since 2004, the fraternity was given a laundry list of things to do that were never done, Mitchell said in his opening statement of the trial.


"The house does not meet compliance standards ... Many items that have been marked for repair have remained on the list for many semesters," Mitchell said in his opening statement of the trial, according to transcripts of the proceedings.

Some of those items that needed repairs included "multiple violations, most significantly a nonfunctional fire alarm," Mitchell said.

The 2004 hurricane season caused significant damage to the house's fire system, according to court documents.

The documents also reported that there was "Additional damage to the structure by the undergraduate Chapter including vandalism, general disregard for condition standards and neglect."

In his opening statement,



Mitchell said that "the University of Central Florida decided the liability and the risk to the lives of the students were just too great."

In January 2005, UCF Building Office officials posted a sign on the front door of the building that stated: "Danger - Unsafe Structure."

According to court documents, the fraternity claims that the sign was unwarranted and that they were making progress in the improvements. For example, they attempted to contact companies about making repairs on the home.

Even so, on Jan. 11, 2005, the fraternity pled in violation of disruptive conduct and hazing in an Office of Student Conduct hearing.

In that same month, the university and Jason Belland, director of Chapter Services for Pi Kappa Alpha, found out that former members of the organization had entered the house after it was shut down.

"These trespassers or others ultimately caused significant additional damage to the property through vandalism ... [there were] damaged doors, windows, graffiti, holes in walls and other vandalism by students," according to court documents.

"The kids didn't like getting thrown out of their home, so they created vandalism, not failure to maintain," Ormond said. In February 2005, after the

vandalism and the hazing incidents, the local fraternity's charter was revoked. At that point, the Eta Phi Alumni Association, which owned the house and rented it out to Pi Kappa Alpha UCF, began seeking alternate tenants.

Eta Phi showed the house to the Chi Omega Sorority and also Kappa Alpha Theta Sorority with the possibility of renting out the home to them. Both sororities had contractors evaluate the necessary repairs, and the estimates came back at between \$100,000 and \$150,000.

Chi Omega was also willing to pay \$10,000 per month in rent on the home, according to court documents.

UCF denied Eta Phi's request to rent out the property. According to court documents, the UCF Counsel's Office takes the position that the original lease requires the university's approval before the organization rents out the property.

However, Eta Phi said that since they own the house, they are able to rent out the property to other Greek organizations without any prior approval.

The lease, which was signed in 1988, is the same as the one that was offered to all 12 houses on Greek Park Drive in the late '80s and early '90s when the properties were being built.

Until the flurry of lawsuits and counter suits subsides, the house needs repair. The grass by the basketball court is long and shaggy. The windows are boarded, and the fraternity's letters are barely legible over the entrance.

The house will stay this way until the court issues its ruling.

New Greek housing plans underway

[corporation] has in mind," Evelyn said. Houses on Greek Park are in high demand by many Greek organizations seeking the perceived prestige of an on-campus house.

There are more than 40 Greek organizations on campus but only 12 houses.

The leases could change in the future, however, with the development of Greek Park II, the second phase the university is planning for Greek Housing.

Plans for the second phase are still underway, but so far the community is expected to be located on 6.7 acres in the northwest corner of campus, according to the Department of Housing and Residence Life's official Web site.

"The housing in that section will be much more dense," Evelyn said. "That might create some different issues that we need to consider. We are working with Greek Affairs to figure out how those housing will be handled."

Proposed designs for the new facilities would be something like townhouse-style houses, according to the department. The housing would double the amount of Greek housing beds available, which are now at more than 400.





Coaching Strategy: NC

Men's soccer lacks experience necessary to win

This season, the men's soccer team failed.

Their offensive and defensive performances were nothing short of talented, and they proved game after game, they had the ability to play with the nation's best.

Fortunately, what the men's soccer team lacked was the one thing that can only get better with time — experience.

I said it at the beginning of the year, and I'll say it again. A successful season cannot and should not be based on a record.

It doesn't prove how talented a team really is.

The 2006 Men's Soccer team, for the second straight season, is exhibit A.

Finishing the year with a 6-9-2 record is nothing short of a disappointing, they know that. But they can be thankful for one thing this holiday season: the talent that they know they truly have.

So here it is: a little insight into an otherwise disappointing year. Drum roll please.

Offense

Compared to the opposition, the Golden Knights came up short in every offensive category except shots on goal percent-

age. In this, the Knights held a .495 average over their opponents' .456. The Knights, however, trailed their opponents in shots per game by only 2.7 shots and were just .069 off their opponents' goals scored average. The Knights scored a total of 21 goals this season, while their competitors posted 33.

Leading the Knights offensively was sophomore Zak Boggs. Boggs came on strong toward the middle of the year and never let up. He led the team with five goals and 29 total shots. Boggs was recently named to the 2006 National Soccer Coaches Association of

Former Cyclone Skladany to head defensive staff

The 2006 UCF Football season was a season filled with disappointment, as you probably know by now. However, in any successful or unsuccessful season, there are always bright spots that leave players, coaches and fans optimistic for a better following season.

This is the case for five Golden Knight football players who were named with first and second team all-conference honors.

Senior Mike Walker and sophomore Joe Burnett were both named first-team all-conference by the coaches.

This is the first time in the twelve-year history of the league that coaches have ever chosen a separate all-conference team. Usually, the media and coaches combine to choose the honorees.

Among those chosen to the all-conference second team were sophomore Kevin Smith and junior Mike Buscemi. Also honored was offensive guard Jeremy DeVane, who was named to the all-conference freshman team.

Walker was also chosen as an all-conference first team honoree by the media. Walker's five 100-yard receiving games, seven touchdowns and 1,178

total yards all added to Walker's stellar career. On top of that, he managed to break the UCF single-season reception mark with 90 catches.

Burnett, the second first-team selection for the Knights, also proved to be a bright spot in an otherwise questionable roster.

Burnett averaged 12 yards per punt return this season, with 14.7 return average in C-USA games. Burnett's longest punt return was for 50 yards.

Aside from these selections, the coaches' also honored six players with honorable mention all-conference honors: wide receiver Rocky Ross, defensive end Chris Welsh, offensive tackle Patrick Brown, offensive guard/center Kyle Smith, and safety Sha'reff Rashad.

The coaches' individual C-USA awards will be announced on Wednesday.

At the same time several UCF players were being named to the all-conference teams, UCF head coach George O'Leary was making changes to his defensive coaching staff.

It was announced last week that defensive coordinator Lance Thompson was being demoted and defensive backs coach Miles Aldridge and defensive line coach Peter McCarty were being fired.

To fill the role of defensive coordinator, O'Leary announced Monday that John Skladany would take over for Thompson.

Prior to UCF, Skladany spent the past 10 seasons as the defensive coordinator for Iowa State University.

"We are very fortunate to bring in a man of John's quality to be a part of our coaching staff at UCF," O'Leary said in a release. "His prior successes will help bring this program to the level we want it to be."

During his time at Iowa State, the Cyclones advanced to five bowl games. Skladany himself, however, was responsible for dramatically improving the Cyclone's defense and in 2005, when it ranked 12th nationally against the run and 35th in total defense.

Skladany was an assistant coach at Colorado State from 1993-95, as well as coaching for teams like Northern Arizona, Ohio, Maine and The United States Merchant Marine Academy.

"I have known coach O'Leary for a quite a while and this is a great opportunity for me to come in and work with a man of his stature in this profession," Skladany said in a release. "The potential at UCF is remarkable with the new facilities, the recruiting base and to be in a city as vibrant as Orlando."

America NCAA Division I All-South Region Third Team as well as receiving All-Conference USA honors.

Freshmen Cam Jordan and Akin Akinrinade also received All-Conference USA honors.

Unfortunately, the Knights will need to rely on more than one foot to lead their team. Players such as Ryan Roushanel, Jake Howard, James Georgeff and Jamal Robinson, who all scored two goals apiece this season, will need to step-up their game in order to provide the Knights with a more well-rounded offensive attack next season.

Grade: B-

Defense

The Knights' defense, anchored by freshman Akin Akinrinade and sophomore Bryan Haisley, gave a lot of heart and a lot of hustle this season.

Goalkeeper Marcus Rein, who started 11 of 17 games for the Knights, posted 53 saves and three shutouts. An injury late in the season, however, sidelined Rein for the remainder of the season. Rein's replacement, Brian Pope, had big shoes to fill, but successfully did so, posting 28 saves and two shutouts in just six games for the Knights.

The Knights' defense allowed 33 total goals on the season, with just two coming off penalty kicks. The Knights lost six of their games by a one point margin and managed to hold their opponents to just two goals or less in seven games during the season.

Grade: B+

Experience

The 2006 season brought 19 fresh new faces to head coach Brent Erwin's roster — 13 of those were freshmen, and just nine of the 27 players that filled this year's roster were returning members. What this means is the men's soccer team lacked experience both at the college level and playing as a team.

A team, no matter how talented, cannot play successfully without chemistry on the field. For a team like this, with many players having never played together before, this chemistry is the one ingredient the Knights will need to work on in the offseason.

The talent is there. Freshman Cam Jordan was ranked prior to the season as one of the 100 top freshmen recruits according to College Soccer News. Jordan proved to be a great asset to the team, posting one goal and two assists for the Knights and provided great depth both as a starter and coming off the bench.

Also, of the remaining freshman, three were consistent starters and six played in an average of 13.6 games out of a total of 17.

Luckily, with one season under their belt, the younger players should have the college-level experience they need and the entire team should know the ins and outs of their team members and how they can play collectively.

Grade: F

Intensity

One thing that proved to be detrimental to their season was the Knights' ability, or lack thereof, to finish off a team.

The Knights undoubtedly gave every ounce of effort they had this season and it truly showed in every game. Unfortunately, the Knights lost six games after leading or being tied with their opponents at the half.

After most of these games, the players and coaches confessed to it being a lack of intensity that caused for the breakdown. They said they just came out lax and unfocused to start the second half of play.

Two very prominent examples include two UCF opportunities to hold of the No. 18 and No. 1 teams in the country, but fell short both times.

UCF's first chance came on Oct. 11, when they led the Kentucky Wildcats going into the second half, but two quick, early second-half goals from Kentucky would end the Knights' vision of an upset.

UCF, just a game later, had a similar chance to put SMU, the highest ranked team in the country, in their place, but came up short because of a late second-half goal that caused the game to go into double overtime and end in a tie.

It was games like these that showed the team's true, raw talent, but managed to show their lack of experience and underdevelopment as well.

Grade: B-

Schedule

You've probably been asking yourself this entire time, just how a team that posts a losing record, can, like I've continually stated, still be talented. Here's your explanation.

C-USA, unlike most college conferences, is arguably one of the toughest conferences in men's soccer. Four of the ten teams that make up C-USA were ranked in the top 25 teams in the nation. UCF, overall, ended its season taking on six nationally ranked teams including, No. 1 SMU, No. 3 Wake Forest, No. 14 North Carolina, No. 18 Kentucky, No. 23 UAB and

No. 25 South Carolina.

In those matches, UCF managed to tie both SMU and UAB, and lost to Kentucky, North Carolina and South Carolina by just one goal. What that means is that the Knights managed to hang with the best teams in country, proving in each that a win was never underestimated. 

Disney houses Hawaiian haven

'Cousins' serve up family-style cuisine

What better way to conclude a grueling semester than by treating yourself to a plentiful, lavish meal in the most magical place on Earth?

Ohana, which means "family" in Hawaiian, is the name of the restaurant located on the second floor of the Grand Ceremonial House in Disney's Polynesian Resort.

When it comes down to atmosphere, Disney never fails. Tiki statues, thatched roofs and an 18-foot-long open barbeque pit adorn a cozy place where your server calls you "cousin."

This faux-Polynesian experience is heightened even more with the smell of burning oak permeating the air.

Dinner is served family-style. There is no menu, and more and more platters of food are simply brought to your table as you eat. Servers hover around tables with three-foot-long skewers of meat and poultry fresh from the barbeque.

The meal begins with crispy fried wontons, which are flavorful by themselves but are also delicious with a trio of sauces with Polynesian flavor. My favorite, which had me revisiting with bites of meat, was the peanut sauce. Sweet, tangy and garnished with crushed peanuts, it made every bite heavenly.

Along with the fried wontons, mixed greens tossed in honey-lime vinaigrette was served. The lettuce was fresh and crispy, and the dressing was light, flavorful and absolutely delicious.

Next, I got my fingers dirty with you-peel sweet and sour shrimp and honey-coriander chicken wings. Both were delicious appetizers, foreshadowing the flavors that lay ahead in the main course.

A sorry excuse for stir-fried vegetables disappointingly landed at my table. Impatient cooks were likely the culprits to the inadvertently blanched,

finely chopped, unrecognizable veggies, which had so much cracked pepper surrounding them. Any other flavor was impossible to decipher. Those sat ignored on the table. A favorite, however, were the Maui scalloped potatoes.

One of my companions informed our "cousin" to "just keep bringing them, and we'll eat them." Little did she know of the amount of food that was about to arrive at our table.

Before we knew it, cousins, I didn't even recognize my table; it was loaded with huge oak-fired skewers of marinated sirloin steak, Asian-barbecued pork loin, mesquite-grilled turkey, and Hawaiian pork sausage with pineapple teriyaki glaze. The steak loin and pork loin were both favorites within my group.

My favorite was the mesquite-grilled turkey: the aroma and flavor from the oak-burning grill exploded in my mouth with every mouth-watering morsel. Dipped in the sweet peanut sauce from the fried wontons, the turkey's smoky flavor came alive.

After endless bottomless platters of food, we were all stuffed yet managed to find some room for dessert. Had I known that dessert was going to be that delicious, I would have paced myself a lot more throughout the meal.

Ohana bread pudding a la mode with bananas foster sauce was brought to our table. The smooth, comforting texture of the bread pudding married perfectly with the cool, creamy vanilla ice cream. I wanted to bathe in the bananas foster sauce, which was a creamy syrup with chunks of real banana incorporated into its smooth texture.

Overall, the food is plentiful and delicious. The price is a flat rate of \$25.99 per person, so this is definitely a special-occasion type of restaurant, but it is worth the money. Living a short distance away from one of the most popular tourist

attractions in the world should be taken advantage of. Park passes are not required at Disney resorts, so I encourage you to go out and explore all of them.

A nice surprise was the fireworks display in the Magic Kingdom, perfectly visible from the second floor of the Polynesian. They even played the music that is perfectly timed along with the fireworks, in the middle of Ohana. Other fun activities such as hula dancing lessons were taught throughout the meal.

The American-style cuisine mixed with Polynesian flavors yielded a delicious meal with surprising personality. I recommend Ohana for large groups of "cousins" out for special occasions.


Though I'm not much for math, there is one equation that makes perfect sense to me.

"Red Door Yoga focuses on whole health, not just physical," Jennings said. Aside from being a yoga studio, Red Door is also a school. Students can come here and get training to be certified yoga teachers. They also sell the art displayed and feature a new artist every month.

These steps I took are not universal, much less typical, and it is important to realize what other ways people shift from apathy to engagement. I am constantly learning how some people are willing and able to provide their time, money or both, to a cause that they deem worthwhile.

What then can be done to bring those who have not yet realized their potential to impact society? Fully answering such a question takes much more than words, and new solutions are

continually found for each generation. The tried and tested methods of focused mentoring, role-model parenting, business and non-profit partnering, value-added sponsorship, and word-of-mouth will continue to play vital roles in positive activity, yet sometimes outright boldness is required to make drastic and lasting change in such listless times.

The ONE Campaign, an anti-poverty organization, uses celebrity status, not financial obligations and brand names, to reach several million Americans and Europeans in only a few years.

Invisible Children, the company formed around the film that inspired me, has gained a following of a few million youth, young adults and parents who have banded together against an unfathomable war fought by child soldiers in Uganda by screening the film to large audiences for free, writing letters to senators addressing the crisis and proving their support on their wrists with Ugandan-made bracelets. Many other organizations are starting to see the passion of Generation X and Y and are shifting focus accordingly.

Beyond these movements, much of the battleground is won in our own backyards and grocery stores in the daily chance encounters with curious and like-minded people. Having the opportunity to briefly discuss face-to-face what it is you are passionate about and then exchanging contact information or a Web site address will usually give someone more incentive

to then find out more about an organization or conflict than a newspaper article, unsolicited e-mail or graphic advertisement would. Of course these are successful methods but are not nearly as genuine. This can lead to a number of different paths for that person, and helps rebuild the natural phenomenon of community.

Blame for our apathy cannot be fully placed on one contributor; in fact, we are all guilty. One by one we justify our actions, or lack thereof, based on emotion, sloth, prejudices and cost. John Steinbeck identified such indifference in his book *America and Americans* from 1966, "I have named the destroyers of nations: comfort, plenty, and security — out of which grow a bored and slothful cynicism, in which rebellion against the world as it is, and myself as I am, are submerged in listless self-satisfaction."

This does not mean that civic engagement is so far out of reach; it's closer than we think. You can get infected by numerous means and at numerous levels, but nonetheless community, civic engagement and selflessness are terminal, having far more lasting change and satisfaction than the objects of desire we so often focus our lives on.
