The Rollins Academy football team met and defeated the Sanford high school team on Morse Athletic Field yesterday in a well matched game.

The referee's whistle sounded soon after 3 o'clock and the game was on. Rollins kicked off to Sanford, but after a short scrimmage Rollins recovered the ball and made a touchdown. Lutz starring during the quarter on pretty tackling.

The second quarter opened with the ball near Rollins' line. A center rush brought another touchdown, making the score 12-0. Joe starred in this quarter in dodging, smashing through the line, throwing off the opponents repeatedly after seeming to be stopped.

Sanford kicked to Rollins in the second half. Rollins lost the ball but regained it and little Joe starred again with a pretty end run. The ball was found in the center of the field when time was up on the third quarter.
