## MUSICALE BY PROF. POPE AND MRS. KRAUSS

Thursday evening, December 9, the annual Faculty Recital of the Rollins School of Music, under the leadership of Professor Homer Stanley Pope, Director of the School of Music, was held in Knowles Hall. The program was exceptionally varied and interesting and was the most important musical event of the season so far in Winter Park. Many alumni town, and out of town guests were present to fill the auditorium.

Prof. Pope, tenor, opened the entertainment with a series of charming German songs, including "Das Fischermädchen." His voice was rich and full of resonance and his control was, as usual, masterly. Miss Isabel E. Denison, B. M., emphasized again her thorough musicianship in her accompaniments. Miss Elizabeth K. Krauss, whose music is always such a delight to her hearers, was never better in her rendition than on this occasion, displaying complete poise and wonderful technique. Her numbers were "Concerto Op. 76," "Au Bord d'un d'uisseau" and "Alla Zingaresca" in all of which she showed a wide scope of tone color.

**ASTRONOMY PROF. PALMER'S  
SUBJECT**

Prof. A. S. Palmer gave a very interesting lecture on Astronomy at the Thursday assembly this week. In the first part of the lecture he gave the history of Astronomy as it was developed through the ages. The remainder of the lecture was given to the description of the bodies belonging to the Solar system. After discussing the sun he gave the peculiar characteristics of each planet in the order of their distance from the sun. Having spoken of the interesting way in which some of the planets were discovered, he gave some concrete illustrations of the relative size of the solar system.
