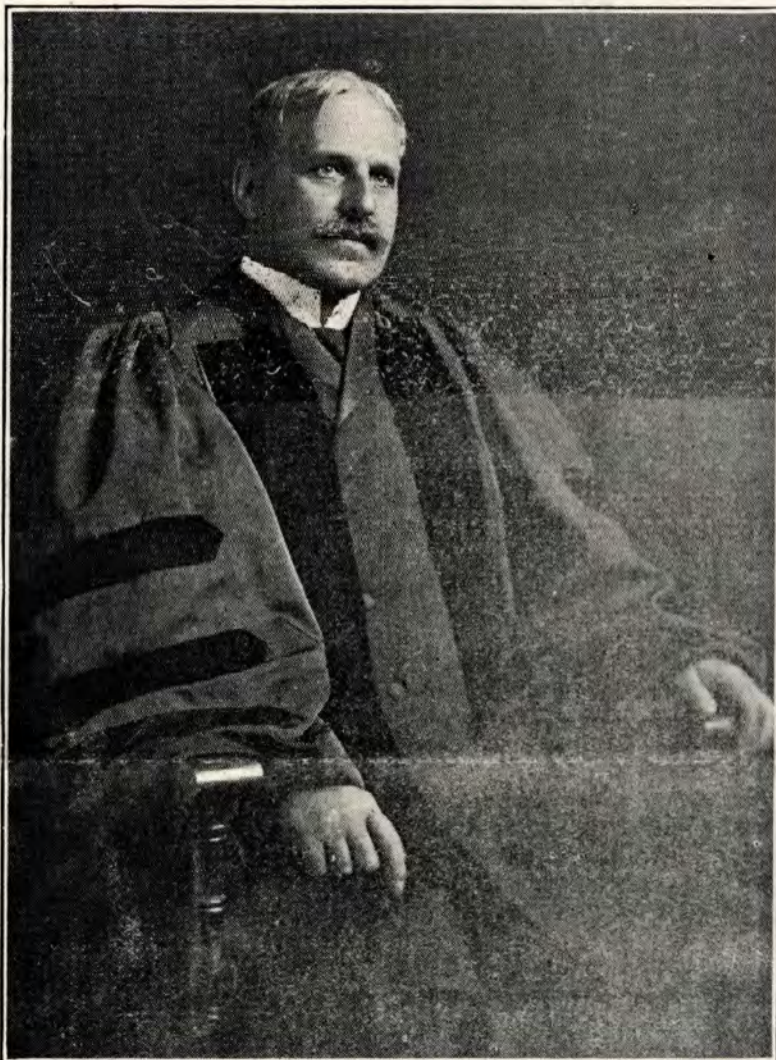

A RED CROSS SOCIETY IS ORGANIZED

Tuesday afternoon, November thirteenth, Mrs. French called a meeting of Rollins girls for the purpose of organizing a Red Cross Auxiliary. Miss Rand, president of the Society in Orlando, Miss Peshmann who trained in Chicago, Mrs. Dyer and Mrs. Blackman were present. Mrs. French called the meeting to order and stated briefly why Rollins girls should organize such a society; not because they were not already doing good work for the Surgical Dressings Committee here in Winter Park but because this work would soon be taught in our public schools, and girls graduating from Rollins would want to know all they could about it.

Miss Peshmann showed a number of dressings sent her from Chicago.

Mrs. Blackman spoke of the meaning of the Red Cross and Surgical Dressings. While they not exactly the same organization, she said, the work of each goes where most needed; to our hospitals or those of our al-

lies. The surgical dressings usually going to the French.

Margaret Smith was elected president; Dorothy Richards, treasurer, and Mary Conaway, secretary.

Monday the first meeting was held and very good work done.

MRS. DYER ADDRESSES Y. W. C. A.

Mrs. G. H. Dyer of Winter Park, addressed the meeting of the Young Women's Christian Association in Cloverleaf Tuesday evening, on Hawaiian Ways and People. Mrs. Dyer's fascinating stories of her personal experience charmed all her hearers, who listened with intense interest to all that she had to tell.

Miss Alice Waterhouse lead the devotional part of the meeting.

The "Y" which was placed in a prominent window in the business section in Winter Park has shown during the past week how much Winter Park wishes to help the boys who are "With the Colors" as well as those who are held as prisoners.

CAMP TRAINING

"Mac" Now at Ft. McPherson in Medical Corps

An interesting account of the training in the army camps has recently been sent to the Sandspur by Mr. Edwin A. McQuarters, a member of last year's graduating class from the college. It runs as follows:

"We were sent out—a party of twenty-two of us—from Ft. Screven where we had been receiving inoculation, vaccination and good stiff infantry drills under various U. S. R. officers who had just come from the schools. They evidently believed in giving us all they had; although I have always considered myself tough yet it was too strenuous for me as well as for several others, and we were laid up in the hospital for a week for being overheated while on the drill grounds. On account of this illness—lucky for me—my departure from the fort was postponed until a later date and so I was not sent to Ft. Oglethorpe with the boys with whom I began my training but was detained for several weeks more of excellent training, and finally assigned to Ft. McPherson, which I understand is more comfortable than the ordinary fort.

"Shortly after our arrival * * * I was given clerical work to do in the Recruiting Office which has to do with the physical examination. I was somewhat disappointed at not being placed in one of the hospital wards but as only a few places were to be filled in the hospitals we could not get in.

"Every afternoon for an hour or so we have the regular medical Corps maneuver, drills, and also drills with the stretchers. My shoulder is now black and blue from hanging the heavy stretchers down on it for a stretcher is three or four times as heavy as a gun and has to be carried very much like one. We are supplied with a Colt revolver—the same pattern as the officers carry—and a large knife big enough to chop a man's head off.

"Ft. McPherson is about four or five miles from Atlanta by car and when we get off in the afternoon or evening most of us go to town for excitement or entertainment, lest the monotony of a post, such as this one, grow too much for our fragile nerves and we all go to the lunatic ward.

"The Y. M. C. A. here is quite active and does all that it can to furnish entertainment and accommodations to the soldiers. This writing material that I am using now is all furnished

NOTHING TO WORRY ABOUT

Here is the French Soldier's philosophy of war. It is one of the litanies which the men at the front recite over and over to themselves and in chorus. It is characteristic of the many expressions of soldier philosophy which has been taken up by the whole army:

"You have two alternatives; either you are mobilized or you are not. If not, you have nothing to worry about.

"If you are mobilized, either you are in camp or at the front. If in camp, you have nothing to worry about.

"If you are at the front, you have two alternatives; either you are in reserve or on the fighting line. If in reserve you have nothing to worry about.

"If you are on the fighting line, you either have a scrap or you don't. If you don't you have nothing to worry about.

"If you scrap you either get hurt or you don't. If you don't, you have nothing to worry about.

"If you get hurt you are either slightly hurt or you get badly hurt. If slightly hurt you've nothing to worry about.

"If badly hurt you still have two alternatives; either you recover or you don't. If you recover, you have nothing to worry about. If you don't recover, you have done with worry forever."

DR. VINCENT ADDRESSES THE Y. M. C. A.

Dr. C. A. Vincent, pastor of the Congregational Church, spoke informally at the weekly Y. M. C. A. meeting last Tuesday evening. The meeting took the form of a questionnaire, in which the speaker wished to answer some of the perplexing questions that come into the life of a young man.

One of the questions which the speaker took up in detail was: "How shall a college man find his place in the present crisis." Dr. Vincent emphasized the need of specialization and thorough preparation for whatever service was most fitted to the individual abilities; and made evident that the war operations increased the need of able men in every walk of life and enhanced the value of each individual worker.

"What is a workable belief for a young man" was discussed with the characteristic finality of the speaker, and in such a comprehensive way as could be easily grasped by the man in doubt. He said that there were two ways of meeting a doubt; to give up and the other to find a solution which will answer the question; one of course fatal and the other the way of the courageous and honest man. He suggested three elements that should together make up a practical belief for the Christian; first reverence, reverence for the great and good things of the universe and in life; second, a well-understood relationship to Jesus Christ as the example and pattern of our lives and the revelation of God in man; third, a sharing relationship to our fellow-man, our brother.

BASKET BALL

(By Chas. Bradley Scofield)

Basketball is a sport which, almost unknown in past years, has come to be an important link in the great chain of Athletics. A game unheard of by the generation preceeding this has developed until now every college and school in the United States puts as much care and time into the training of the basketball squad as its foot ball or baseball teams.

It is a game which requires quick thinking and even quicker action. It requires steady nerves great endurance and self-control. As in any sport, the team which pulls together, which runs like a piece of oiled machinery, which can buck up and turn defeat into victory, is the one that comes out in the first place in the end. The team that takes the long, hard period of practice before season without a murmur, the team that masters absolutely each point of the game is the team which will carry off the laurels. Such is the team which will represent Rollins for the year of '17-'18.

The squad looked promising at the beginning of the year. Although Rollins has taken no great part in intercollegiate basketball in the past, when the call came she responded nobly. The scarcity of material has given no trouble and coach Fletcher has been able to select a winning first team and a strong second team to back it up. The nightly practice of the past month has developed the material into a compact team which will prove no mean opponent for any school or college in the South.

Fletcher at forward will be a main

factor in the future victories of Rollins. His long distance shots go in with uncanny precision, while his close shots are never missed. His quick head work and his ability to cover his territory are a strong help to the rest of the team.

Ward at forward, while a good shot is better on passing and floor work. He is by far the fastest man on the team and his team work in connection with Fletcher's will account for a large percentage of Rollins' scores for the coming season.

Arrants at center has no equal. Ideally built for the position, he will prove a hard man to out jump. His ability to carry the ball down the floor serves him in good stead while his quick, close passing is excellent.

Hanawalt at guard fills the position as no one else could. His speed and endurance are both strong points while his ability for intercepting passes is wonderful. His passing is sure and his floor work is good. He has acquired the difficult art of seemingly being everywhere at once.

Tilden at guard, while this is his first year is showing up very well. His passing is sure and swift. His floor work is quick and is excellent at sticking to his man. Any scores that are shot over this combination of guards will be well earned.

Vincent has made the position of sixth man on the team. He has improved greatly from the first of the year and is playing a hard, sure game. His ability to "cover up" is a big feature.

The second team under proper train

ing is showing up exceptionally well. Tompkins and Scofield as forwards are taking hold more firmly at each practice.

Under training their shooting is becoming sure, while they get good team work and play together well. Only once this year has a practice gone by in which the second team made no score. Cleave at center and Miskosky, Hilyard, and McGaughey at guards are putting out a good game.

Rollins is going to put out a good brand of basketball this year. "Clean Basketball" is her slogan and she is sure to live up to it.

Back them up! Lets get into this and give them all the support we can. Let's put Rollins on the Basketball Map in capital letters this year

The first important game to be played at Rollins will be the Sanford Game. The reports indicate that Sanford has an exceptionally strong team this year and are already in training for the contest of December third. The Rollins team is rounding out into wonderful form and by December will be able to "swallow Sanford without water."

It is time we were starting our Pep Training. Lets be able to back Rollins up in the right style when she goes up against another team for the first time. Show Sanford that we have some spirit. The team will play as it is backed. We must do our part. Show the team that we are back of it from the beginning until the final whistle.

GIRLS' BASKET BALL

Not for many years has a Rollins coach had such promising material for a girls' basketball team as Coach Hanawalt has this year. Among the shining lights are Norma McFadden and Hildegard Slaughter as forwards, Pat Richards and the Waterhouse Twins as centers, and the Stone Sisters as guards.

A meeting was held in Cloverleaf last Wednesday afternoon at which time a manager was chosen. Pat Richards was unanimously elected. The girls decided to wait until the team was chosen before electing their captain.

There has been much interest created lately by Clark Griffith's "Bat and Ball" Fund. Mr. Griffith, the manager of the Washington American League Team, conceived the idea of sending baseball supplies to the Sammies in France. At first he called for second hand goods. Donations were liberal and he soon had a many supplies in France.

It was then decided that 1 per cent. of the total receipts of the last World Series Games should go to the cause. The first shipment, eight hundred dollars worth, fell prey to a German Sub, but the second, a smaller shipment got safely over.

Mr. Griffith has sent out large posters advertising the movement. He has met with great success in all parts of the country. New shipments will be made in the near future.

"Indiana University is the oldest of the institutions west of the Alleghenies commonly recognized as state universities, and the earliest to become co-educational. The university was established by the state legislature in 1800."

"Four thousand students of the University of Nebraska recently paraded through the streets of Lincoln at a patriotic rally."

"The new \$600,000 hospital at the medical school of the University of

California is just being completed."

"Hunter College has the distinction of holding the first class in the world which gives to women a complete course in wireless telegraphy."

"A student senate, composed of four seniors, two juniors, and one Sophomore, has been instituted at Allegheny College. It is to have charge of all college functions in which the student body is interested, to represent the student body in interpreting traditions, customs, and laws of the college; and to constitute the honor court in cases of violation of the honor pledges by students in examinations."

"It will bear twenty-eight blue stars on a field of white surrounded by a wide band of red, and on each star will be embroidered the name of one of Tech's enlisted men. An oval design has been worked out that will permit the number of stars to be increased to fifty-nine."—The Tech Collegian.

"The Georgia Military College, four times Southern prep champions during the past six years, and having won every game played this year, added another to its list of victories here last Saturday by defeating the Chick Springs Military Academy eleven."—The Red and Blacks.
