Winter Park Club Prints 50,000 Letterheads Advertising the Town and College

The recently organized Business Men's Club of Winter Park has, in the loyalty of its purpose toward the town and college, started a very unique and effective system of advertising. This is being accomplished by the printing of 50,000 sheets of stationery with a very attractive group of cuts of the town and college on the back of each sheet. That the effect may be made more prominent a slogan reading, "Winter Park, The Home of Rollins College," has been printed in among the cuts. A variety has been gained by the use of four different groups of scenes, including such views as Rollins from the air, a panorama of the campus, lake scenes, and views of the town's chief points of interest.

ROLLINS APPROVES THE NEW POINT SYSTEM

Unanimously Adopted by Student Body. No One Can Carry More than 15 Points

Rollins has gone on record with the recent adoption of the Point System. The matter was given student approval by a unanimous vote in chapel. It would be advisable for each student to make a copy of the following outline of the system for reference:

Point System

(1) Offices held by students shall be valued by points.
(2) No student may, during the year, hold offices amounting to more than fifteen (15) points, except by special vote of the faculty committee on rules and regulations.
(3) Any entertainment, pageant, etc., requiring more than three hours of preparation per week shall constitute a "stunt" and be subject to the point system.

(4) Points held in captaincies, managerships, plays, etc., shall not be dropped at cessation of practice, but shall hold throughout the year. This system may be revised when

Phi Alpha Fraternity was founded at Rollins in 1906, and has established a record of high character and leadership which lends to the organization a moral stamina which has enabled it to withstand the adversities encountered in a small college and to now stand strong in its alumni scattered throughout the United States.

The fraternity has for more than a decade occupied the large room over the entrance to Lyman Gymnasium, having remodeled and furnished it by permission of the college. During the last two or three years Phi Alpha has generously opened its reception hall for the meetings of other student organizations, owing to the crowded condition of the buildings on the campus. "The Phi Alpha Room" has been the scene of many an "afternoon tea," the traditional function given in honor of new initiates, (at which function the initiates are often permitted to serve).

This year Phi Alpha has rented the Ingram House on Comstock and Chapman Avenues, a delightful location, being near the campus and on the main street to town. The maintaining of a separate house for the boys of the fraternity in a small college has been against the democratic ideals of Phi Alpha, but the overcrowding of the dormitories on the campus has made the providing of other accommodations imperative. Members of the Fraternity living in the house express themselves as highly pleased with the arrangement so far.

Plans for the new home of the fraternity have not yet been announced, but it is understood that the lots are near the campus, and that construction of a modern chapter house will start as soon as certain business arrangements are completed.

STUDENT ASSOCIATION TICKET VALUABLE

Save that little Blue and Gold ticket you got in the Treasurer's office on registration day. You will need it. It's your passport to all Rollins activities.

In nearly every state university of the South, notably the Universities of Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama, and Georgia Tech, the student association plan has been carried out most successfully. It has been in operation at Rollins for several years but is being carried out more extensively this year than ever before.

Last year the charge was \$6.00 but the sum was so small that little could be accomplished. This year it is \$7.50 a semester or \$15.00 for the year. The ticket issued, showing payment of the fee, entitles the holder to a subscription to the Sandspur, admission to all athletic games (football, basketball and baseball), membership in the Delphic Society (which support will go toward lectures, concerts, dramatics, and debates).

This \$15.00 paid in by each student will be distributed by a committee composed of students and faculty. Thus, for example, with an enrollment of 300, the total receipts would be \$4,500, which sum will be used by this committee to finance athletic games, print the Sandspur, and bring noted lecturers and concert artists to the campus.

Under this plan the student will be admitted, by the season ticket, to all functions on the campus and will not be hounded from time to time to buy tickets and pay dues to this, that, and the other thing.
