ROLLINS COLLEGE GLEE CLUBS ARE AT HEIGHT OF MOST SUCCESSFUL SEASON IN YEARS; MAKE BIG HIT

The Rollins College Glee Clubs are in the midst of their most successful season in years. The clubs, having gotten an earlier start this year than in previous years, were able to schedule many trips, including Daytona, Mt. Dora, St. Petersburg and Tampa, to say nothing of numerous concerts in the vicinity of the college, which included the Seminole, Alabama and Virginia Inn Hotels in Winter Park and the Hotel Wyoming in Orlando. The first home concert was given in the Congregational Church, for the benefit of the organ fund.

Much credit for the success of the season is due to Miss Edna Wallace, the director of the Men's Club. Miss Wallace also sings with the Girls' Club and plays the flute in the Rollins Trio. Prof. C. L. Jaynes, director of the Rollins School of Music and Fine Arts, directs the Girls' Club and the Male Quartette. May More, the accompanist for the Men's Club and manager of the club, is in a great degree responsible for the excellent schedule of trips which the clubs have taken. The clubs are to broadcast a concert from Rollins College station, WDBO, some time in the near future.

Men's Glee Club.

The Men's Glee Club gave a recital at the Congregational Church on Friday evening of last week. They were assisted by the Girls' Club, Miss Ruth Amy and the Rollins Trio. This was the first recital this year given by the men in Winter Park, and was exceedingly good. The appreciation of the audience was shown by a liberal contribution which

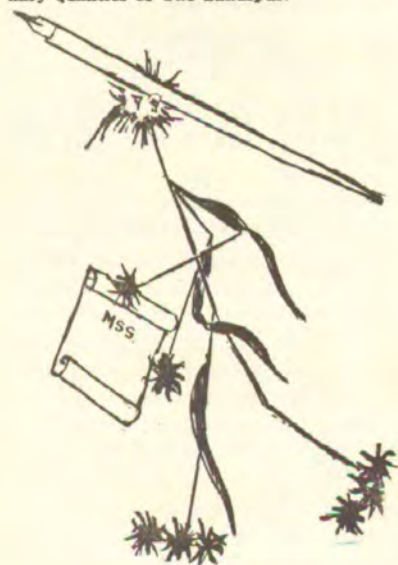
