Monday morning in the study hall of the Winter Park High School Dean Carrothers gave about a hundred of the Rollins students who were interested in such matters a sample of the intelligence tests which students desiring to enter here next year will have to pass. It is alleged that the Dean had a further reason in giving these tests, that he was harboring some doubts fostered by malicious aspersions against the present mentality of the Rollins students.

The filming of this event will bring pictures of these Florida High School Swimmers at Rollins College before more than twenty millions of people. Grown as it has since its beginning seven years ago the Aquatic Meet has become prominent enough to warrant filming by Pathe News.

As an appreciation to Pathe News for this consideration, Col. Franklin O. King, Chairman of the Governing Committee for the Championships announced last evening that exclusive film rights for the event had been given to Pathe News.

But this week one of the Rollins Students seems to have had a severe case of compound ill temper, indigestion and childishness. Will you just look at the dreadful, dreadful "Anonymous Letter" he, or she, has handed in to us? We beg of you not to take it too seriously. The author will undoubtedly recover and repent but in the meantime we can all have a good time with it. Madame Bowman would make a pretty gesture and say "C'est a rire." And we can do the same. The only thing that has us worried is the signature. "Sinclair Lewis II"! Supposing our many subscribers up in Boston get ahold of this issue and see that name. Our reputation, whatever it may be, will be lost forever.

Editor Sandspur:

If a certain member of the faculty would not contradict himself so often he would not only be more popular with the students but also we would know where we stand. This is the statement which has been made not by one student alone but by many. How can anyone know what he means if he says a thing one day, contradicts himself the next and goes back to the first statement the next? According to many this is the state of affairs. Whether he or the students or both are to blame, there is a noticeable antagonism in the air.

On the other hand, what is the matter with the students at Rollins? Are they dumb, half-witted morons or are they merely, shall we say, in-different pleasure-seekers? Why is it that we have to pay four dollars (out of the Student Association fee)

plus three dollars (for pictures) plus five dollars (a total of twelve dollars) for the year-book? This minimum total is increased if one belongs to an organization having a page in said year-book. Why are we not told where all this money is going to? It is probably because most students here don't give a hoot where, how, or why anything happens. Why doesn't the student-body raise a few questions and have them answered? We are told the Tomokan is to cost so much but are we given an itemized list of expenses so that we may see why? Why not? There isn't a man in this whole college who dares to get up in student-assembly and say what he thinks. WHY?

Why is it that one man is Editor-in-Chief of the three publications on the campus when one of them requires all the time a man can spare? No doubt there is a reason for it, but where? Is it that there is only one man on the campus who is capable of heading our publications? If such is the case, what a sweet bunch of dum-heads we are!!

"This bunch of students is the most unsportsmanlike group of students I have ever seen," says one student. Isn't he about right? One is inclined to think that we have here a bunch of dumb eggs who have no thought in life but how much they can get away with.

If I am not greatly mistaken we have a Student Association. Is it doing anything or are the officers merely smirking yes-men? Are they working for the interests of the students and, if so, have the students any interests which these officers can work for?

These, Mr. Editor, are only a few of the questions I would like to have answered by those who do or ought to know. Why not lay all the cards on the table?

Not long ago Percy Marks, noted author of the present age, compiled his answer to the somewhat raucous words of the novel "The Goose Step" by Upton Sinclair. This group of ideas on the present day institutions of higher-learning made its appearance under the title of "Which Way Parnassus?"

In Mr. Marks exact words, "The Goose Step so carefully and obviously avoided the virtues of the colleges and shrieked the catalogue of faults so raucously that the faults, lacking any contrasting virtues to give them reality, simply inflated themselves into grotesque exaggerations, gargoyles that were more amusing than awesome."

Contrary to the opinions of today with many Mr. Marks does boost the colleges of America. His book covers every phase of school activities from the freshman class to the alumni. From the groundkeeper to the board of directors and the best part is that he gives his unbiased opinions on every topic and points out the apparently obvious faults of all. He is not receptive to the comments of listeners and is endeavoring to place before the public, and especially the younger generation a truthful and clear conception of the universities.

Mr. Marks is a loyal past student of the University of California and also taught four years at Mass. Tech. and is quite capable to lead us all on a comparatively new path through education.

His book is not an adventure, unless it is through the four years of college life. It is neither a romance though it provides a great stimulus to any lover of his Alma Mater. But "Which Way Parnassus" to the

reader presents one outstanding characteristic. The truthfulness of the material presented and the great education which can be digested from every page and line. This collection of material of present day educational needs should hold an important place on the bookshelves of every student at Rollins.
