Captain "Lefty" Moore and the Pickard brothers are the only letter men who failed to answer the roll call Tuesday. "Lefty", flashy little halfback of last year, will not return because of sickness, but the Pickard brothers sent word that they would arrive soon to take their berths in the line.

"Buddy" Goodell, speedy little quarter, has returned to the squad after a year lay-off caused by injuries. Buddy bids well to give someone a real fight to keep him from his former berth on the varsity eleven.

With the varsity returning practically intact and the help of several members of last year's freshman squad, Coach Bailey promises to pass out many surprises this year.

Cultural Opportunities Offered at Rollins

The Rollins student has an unusual opportunity to come in contact with men who are outstanding successes in their particular field. His college is located in a center which attracts the travelling celebrity on his winter vacation. At the same time his college is small enough to give each student an ideal opportunity to study at close range the personalities of the great.

One contact between students and such personalities is made possible through the Tuesday Evening Lecture Course sponsored by the Chapel Association under Dr. Charles A. Campbell. On the list of widely known men who will appear on the lecture platform this year is Count Sferza, the Prime Minister of Italy in the Nitti Cabinet. He was a former minister to China as well as the former Italian Delegate to the League of Nations. Count Sferza comes to Rollins under the auspices of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, and it is expected that he will remain in Winter Park for six weeks with the Countess and their two children.

Lieutenant-General Robert Lee Bullard is another well-known man who will pay Rollins a visit this winter. He commanded the Second American Army in France and has received many decorations for his service at that time. He will be one of the speakers on the Lecture Course and may tell the Rollins students of some of his experiences.

George Haven Putnam, author and publisher, will also sojourn at Rollins during the winter. Mr. Putnam is remarkable for two things: he is the head of the famous book publishing firm of G. P. Putnam Sons, and was at one time a personal friend of Abraham Lincoln's.

Edwin E. Slosson who came to Rollins last spring will return this year for a longer stay. He is a celebrated author, editor, and scientist, and is the director of the Science Service in Washington, D. C. His book, "Creative Chemistry" is widely used throughout the country. During his stay at Rollins this year, Dr. Slosson will hold the chair of "Professor of Things in General," the first of its kind in educational history.

Rollins is fortunate this fall in securing six foreign students through the Institute of International Education. Dr. George Kartzke of Germany will also be sent to Rollins by this same Institute in order to study at first hand the modern educational methods of America.

At some time during the school year President Hamilton Holt, himself, will give one of the Tuesday Evening Lectures. He will present to the students "Japan Today" and his talk will be illustrated by slides colored by Japanese artists.

The Tuesday Evening Lecture Course has become an institution of great popularity. The men mentioned above represent only a part of the entire group of vital personalities who will appear on its programs. Many of these men will remain in Winter Park for six weeks to further acquaint themselves with Rollins students and the Rollins spirit. As education of the lasting sort comes through contact with per-

sonalities of this type, the Rollins student has every opportunity to develop himself through this contact. It is, indeed, an important factor in the "common sense adventure in

higher education" upon which Rollins is embarking.

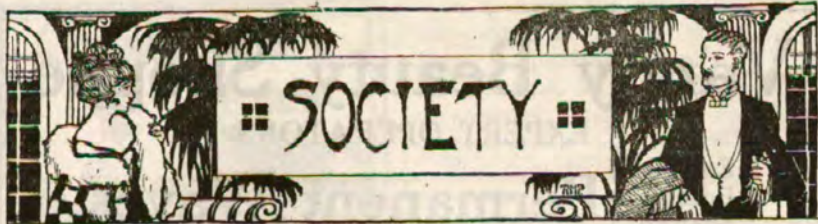

Mr. Nice has enjoyed many notable connections in the past, among which are: Guest Conductor of Philadelphia Orchestra at the Sesquicentennial and three years with the La Scala Grand Opera company.

Clarence C. Nice, director of the Rollins college conservatory, has completed plans for the opening of many new musical activities for the coming college year. Dr. Nice succeeds Frederic Sturges Andrews as director. He will have general charge of the vocal department and expects to have some worthwhile singing organizations in Rollins this year. Dr. Nice is not only a very fine director but is also an artist. He was formerly musical director of the La Scala Grande Opera company, which was in Orlando two years ago. Mr. Nice has proven himself a musician many times over. Last spring he organized and conducted the First Annual Orange County Music Festival, probably the finest musical program that has ever been given in this part of the country. Mr. Nice has a great many ideals for the further development of the conservatory. Many of his plans are already in operation and he will go far in making the Rollins School of Music one of the best in the South.

Musical Plans For Rollins

Clarence C. Nice, director of the Rollins School of Music, has completed plans for many new musical activities for the coming college year. The faculty is as follows:

Miss Gretchen Cox, graduate of Chicago Musical College and successful concert artist, in the violin department.

Miss Helen Moore, graduate of the University of Illinois and winner of the Juilliard scholarship in New York, will be in the piano department.

Herman Siewert, F. A. G. O. graduate of Guilman Organ School of New York, concert organist and composer is in the organ department.

Harvey Clemens, who was formerly connected with Northwestern Conservatory is the instructor in theory.

Mrs. Hilda Knapp, formerly of Northwestern Conservatory is instructor of harp.

Louis Benton will be teacher of bassoon and saxophone.

Miss Helen Warner, graduate of Northampton Music School, instructor in public school music and viola.

Miss Emelie Sellers, graduate of Wellsley has been engaged as secretary — accompanist and will teach a class in the art of accompanying.

C. L. Ebsen is director of the new department of the dance. He will be assisted by Miss Vilma Ebsen.

Other teachers who will assist in the different departments are being considered.

New Conservatory Ideals

Rollins School of Music is keeping pace with the college and will help in many ways to make Rollins the best small college in America. Branches of the conservatory are to be opened in Orlando, Sanford and possibly Winter Haven. This will give school children an opportunity to study music and will prepare

them to enter the conservatory for the serious study of music later. These preparatory schools will enable students to graduate from the conservatory and become successful concert artists and teachers.

The department of public school music has made a distinct step forward this year. New students will have the opportunity to specialize in instrumental supervising. The instrumental side of public school music is a comparatively new field and also a very wide one. Mr. Nice plans to get in touch with the state and also with local boards of education to show them the importance of instrumental work and supervision in schools.

Another notice that should interest Rollins students is that credit will be given for music work toward an A. B. degree. This is being done for the first time this year.

Dr. Nice has ambition for the conservatory. That will do a great deal toward making this the most successful musical year that Rollins has ever had.
